New Book on '71 MPs slam AK Khandker

Air Vice-Marshal (retd) AK Khandker came under fire from lawmakers of treasury and opposition benches for the controversial claims he made in his recent book "1971: Bhitore Baire"

Khandker, who was the deputy chief of liberation forces in the war of independence, claimed in the book that Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman had mentioned "Joy Pakistan" at the end of his historic March 7 speech in 1971.

During the unscheduled discussion that went on for nearly two hours, MPs from the ruling Awami League and the opposition Jatiya Party demanded that the book be banned for "distorting historic facts".

Khandker might have been paid by "foreign agencies like Pakistan's ISI' for writing the book. AL lawmaker Sheikh Fazlul Karim

The prosecution brought contempt petition against HRW, its Asia Director Brad Adams and associate for HRW Asia Division Storm Tiv for allegedly demeaning the tribunal and its judges.

"On scrutiny of the dossier presented by the parties concerned [prosecution and defence], the issue [HRW report] in hands is found to be contemptuous against the opposite parties", said the tribunal in its 43-page order.

"Yes, in the case in hands judges have ample power to exercise their authority upon the opposite parties in accordance with law as it has been proven that the opposite parties made contemptuous remarks in their official website regarding the judges as well as authority of the tribunal in the name of freedom of speech and expression,' the order read.

"People like opposite parties [HRW] in a civilised society got no mandate to exceed the limit of law," the tribunal said.

"We are expecting more circumspection, understanding, discretion and judgement on the part of the opposite parties [HRW] because they are strongly claiming that they speak on behalf of the distressed and oppressed people and of their fundamental rights," said tribunal member Justice Jahangir Hossain Selim reading out the rule.

He said, "The instant contempt petition is disposed of with a note of desire that upon realising mistakes as narrated above the opposite parties shall be more careful, cautious and respectful in making any statement or comment with regard to the judicial

proceedings or the judges of the tribunals or any other courts of Bangladesh in future.

The tribunal had served a showcause notice upon HRW and it apologised for any inadvertent mistake it had made in its report on the verdict.

The tribunal said the defendants were non-residents of Bangladesh and lacked the knowledge about the contempt law and proceedings in Bangladesh. They did not know how their comments would be perceived in Bangladesh.

International affairs secretary of Ahle Sunnat Wal Jamaat, Faruqi, 60, was slain at his house in the capital's East Rajabazar on August 27.

The following day, his son Faisal Faruqi filed a murder and robbery case with the same police station against eight to nine unnamed persons.

The case was later handed over to the Detective Branch of police.

Law enforcers detained three people including a woman in this connection and later took them on remand.

Emran in the case statement complained that Faruqi was killed by religious fanatics in a pre-planned way as

per the conspiracy of the six accused. "Faruqi used to analyse and reanalyse Islamic laws at different discussions, seminars and on the

media on the basis of the holy Quran and Islamic history. As a result, a vested quarter had hurled abuses at him and also threatened him with life," mentioned the case statement.

A group of fanatics had attacked Faruqi in January 2010 and tried to kill him while he was on his way to Sunamganj to join a mahfil there. He escaped the attack with the help of local police and a journalist. Later, it was known that the attack was carried out as per a plan by Tareque Monwar, added the statement.

In 2012, Kazi Ibrahim had threatened Faruqi with life and also abused him verbally at a mahfil in Trishal, Mymensingh.

In the same year, Jafri and Ibrahim had called Faruqi and asked him to have belief in Jamaat ideology. As Faruqi refused to comply with them, the two threatened to kill him and put him on a "blacklist".

On August 22 this year, Monwar at a meeting termed Faruqi a "blasphemer" and called for unity among the attendees to go against him.

Haruni, Mukhtar and Bakshi were present at the meeting at Dhaka Trade Centre. The six accused sat in another "secret" meeting at the same venue, mentioned Emran.

Three days later, Faruqi at a mahfil in Tongi, Gazipur expressed fear that he might come under attack anytime.

The Daily Star could not reach any of the six accused for their comment.
