to appear in Downton sketch




George Clooney is to appear in Downton Abbey in a specially filmed sketch for the ITV charity show Text Santa. ITV are not revealing any more details about the sketch, which will air at Christmas.

Hugh Bonneville, who plays the Earl of Grantham, became friends with Clooney when he appeared in his film The "Monuments Men". Clooney and co-star Matt Damon admitted they were fans of "Downton Abbey" at the UK premiere in February.

But Clooney said he didn't think he would be right to appear in the show, telling The Sun "I am too lowly for a part, I don't think they want me."

Series five of popular TV series "Downton Abbey" starts on ITV on September 21.

..... One of the most celebrated dance troupes in the world, the Akram Khan Company, is currently in Dhaka, news that will excite connoisseurs of performing arts greatly. The British Council, with help of the Bengal Foundation, is facilitating the 'homecoming' of worldrenowned dancer-choreographer Akram Khan -- whose roots lie in Bangladesh.

Akram will be performing his award-winning production "DESH" -- an 80-minute solo -- on September 18 and 19 at the Shilpakala Academy's National Theatre Hall, and his troupe is taking part in a

host of other activities. The first of which, a workshop on the 'Back Stage', was conducted at the Shilpakala Academy yesterday, conducted by Sander Loonen, the technical director for "DESH". A Dance Master Class-- with selective participants -- will be conducted on September 16 at the same venue by Jose Agudo -- rehearsal director for "DESH". A panel discussion will be held on the same day at the British Council with participation of Akram himself; Stephan Roman, Regional Director, South Asia, British Council; Luva Nahid Chowdhury, DG, Bengal Foundation and Asaduzzaman Noor, Cultural Affairs Minister. A roundtable on Creative Economy

will be held at The Daily Star Centre on September 17.

Of the performances, the first day will be an invite-only show with dignitaries and British Council's contest winners, while the second day's show will be broadcast on the Art Gallery Plaza of the Shilpakala Academy, as well as TSC of Dhaka University.

"DESH", a contemporary solo is termed the most personal work to date from Akram Khan. It draws multiple tales of land, nation, resistance and convergence into the body and voice of one man, trying to find his balance in an unstable world. Moving between Britain and Bangladesh, Akram weaves threads

of memory, experience and myth into a surreal world of surprising connection. Intimate and epic at the same time, "DESH" explores fragility in the face of natural forces, and celebrates the resilience of the human spirit in the rhythms of labour, in dream and story, and in transformation and survival. He has teamed up with Oscar-winning visual artist Tim Yip (Production Designer for "Crouching Tiger, Hidden Dragon"), lighting designer Michael Hulls, writer and poet Karthika Nair and Olivier awardwinning composer Jocelyn Pook.

Marking the inauguration programme of Prattay Project for education of children with disabilities, a cultural programme was held recently at the Chunarughat Upazila hall room of the Chunarughat Upazila in the Habiganj district. Prattay Project, a project of Caritas Sylhet Region organised the programme.

Performances of songs, dances and plays by over 125 differently-abled children were lauded by the distinguished guests and audiences.

The programme also included a discussion, and a meeting to chalk out strategies for the implementation of the project..

Francis Atul Sarkar, Assistant Executive Director (programme) of Caritas Bangladesh, chaired the discussion. Abu Taher, Chunarughat Upazila Chairman attended the discussion as chief guest and special guest Chunarughat Upazila Nirbahi Officer Md. Mashudul Kabir. Jhon Montu Palma, Regional Director of Caritas Sylhet Region delivered the welcome speech. The keynote paper was presented by Pius Nanuar, Regional Manager, Aloghar project of Caritas Sylhet Region and contacted by Prahlad Ray, technical officer of Prattay Project.

The speakers noted that the disabled individuals are often wrongly perceived as a burden. If provided with opportunities and proper education/training, they too can contribute to the society and live dignified lives. They need empathy, added the speakers.



At Dhaka Art Centre from September 5-11, viewers got to see mind-boggling photographs by Shafiqur Rahman. The photojournalist has found sculpture in rejected automobile parts and rickshaws, and has shown them as rusty, broken bits, being carried away by scavengers. This aspect of seeing beauty in rejects of machines, medical utility parts used by CRP was seen decades back in an exhibition at the Bengal Gallery, by Arhamul Huq Chowdhury. The photographs taken by Shafiqur Rahman portray remnants of four-wheel drives, reject private cars, and rickshaws with the beauty of rickshaw painters' arts of actors decorating its' backs -- rusted with time, they can now be seen as sculpture pieces.

The first work is on Fujicolor Crystal archiving paper. There are cars camouflaged all over, covered by leaves and creepers growing all over. There are small bushes on the six cars, growing in Nature's harmony. There are beautiful trees growing all around. The blue and red cars are covered by trailing

branches.

Another picture also shows harmony and beauty of camouflage. There are three cars at the sides, while behind are new cars -- which belong to visitors at the park. Dry banana leaves, branches of leaves,

trailers make for a peaceful setting. "Discarded" is done on crystal archive paper. Between banana trees and creepers is a part of a red car. "Spent life" is seen a part of a yel-

low truck which is covered with trailers. Behind through the mêlée of the green overgrowth is a man, maybe working at something. "Shattered" is an image of cars that are broken and rejected. The handles, tyres, and body are all that are left. The wall against which the cars are seen is also covered with rust. There is an iron rod in the fore ground. Everything in view is eaten

In another picture, a broken car is seen, rejected and dejected. The leaves on the trees are exquisite samples of the growth of Nature, in wilderness. "Light and Shade" has a rejected rickshaw, and resting against it is an old discarded blue topped jeep -- both covered by green as well as dried leaves. "Hide and Seek" has a rickshaw with its back cover, once upon a time painted over with heroes and villains of the cinema. These have moustaches, earrings while a third woman is also there. There are remnants of buses too with their

stripes of blue, yellow and red. We have then the photo titled "Anudeep" which includes a leftover Anudeep taxi cab. There are four rickshaws in the heap, forming a form of metal statuary. A part of rickshaw is covered with fresh emerald green leaves. "Sculpture" with scraped off paints, old tyres, rusty handlebars and worn-off seats form an amazing metal creation. Against the rejects, there are the tall contrasting multi-stories at the back. The blue sky forms the promise of a happy tomorrow in the picture --
