# US, allies strike IS in Syria

Five Arab nations join offensive; 120 militants killed; Obama says this is not 'America's fight alone'

AGENCIES

The United States and its Arab allies unleashed deadly bomb and missile strikes on jihadists in Syria yesterday, opening a new front in the battle against the Islamic State group. Dozens of IS and al-Qaeda militants were reported killed in the raids,

which Washington said had partly targeted extremists plotting an "imminent attack" against the West. Bahrain, Jordan, Qatar, Saudi Arabia and the United Arab Emirates joined

the operation, which involved fighter jets, bombers, drones and Tomahawk missiles fired from US warships. President Barack Obama, who had already launched strikes against IS militants in neighbouring Iraq, said "the strength of this coalition makes it

clear to the world that this is not America's fight alone. "It must be clear to anyone who would plot against America and try to do Americans harm that we will not tolerate safe havens for terrorists who

threaten our people," he added. Pentagon described the strikes as "very successful".

## Govt seeks to certify journalists

### Aims to amend Press Council Act

In yet another move to tighten its grip on mass media, the government has decided to amend the Press Council Act, 1974, to incorporate some stringent provisions in the law. Provisions in the draft amendment

include suspension of newspapers' declarations and journalists' accreditation cards for publishing false, instigating, slanderous and anti-state reports. Suspension of government ads and duty free import of newsprint for similar offence is also in the draft.

Under the existing law, the Press Council can only warn, admonish or censure the newspaper, the news agency or a journalist,

as the case may be.

But the proposed amendment drafted by the Council will suggest punishment also, including fine of up to Tk 10 lakh, for publishing reports that hurt the interests of the country or instigate chaos and destroy religious harmony, official sources said.

The amendment will also propose taking mandatory certificate from the Press Council for doing journalism.

Persons willing to take up journalism will have to take exams while those already in the profession will collect certificates from the Council through their editors, senior officials of the Council told The Daily Star yesterday.

## PM urges big nations to cut emissions

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday urged the large carbon emitting countries to make their robust voluntary carbon reduction commitment to save the motherly earth from onslaught of climate change.

"It's our commitment to low-carbon and climate-resilient development path. The large emitting countries should reciprocate by robust voluntary commitments like ours," she told the National Action and Ambition Announcement session of the UN Climate Summit-2014 at the UN headquarters in New York.

She assured that Bangladesh as a responsible member of the international community would never exceed the average per-capita emission limit of the developing world.

Adaptation, said Hasina, is the key for vulnerable countries like Bangladesh. "We can't be left to adapt to 'degradation' because of climate change"

she added.

The PM said the issues of "adaptation" and "loss and damage" are also crucial for Bangladesh for sustainable development. Critical balance should be maintained between adaptation and mitigation. Support to finance, technology development and transfer and capacity building is also important as well, she observed.

She said every country should have a clear, measurable and verifiable Intended Nationally Determined Contributions (INDCs). Bangladesh is working on her possible INDCs, but new and additional resources would be needed for their implementation, mentioned the premier.

Urging the world leaders to pay attention to "Carbon budgeting" and "de-carbonisation pathways", the prime minister said robust and early capitalisation of Green Climate Fund (GCF) is crucial for us.

## Formalin testing kit unfit: BCSIR

Formaldehyde Metre Z-300, a kit used in the country for detecting formalin in food for more than two years, has been found inappropriate for the test, said Bangladesh Council for Scientific and Industrial Research.



"Z-300 machine's reading of formaldehyde in soaked and fresh fruits varies depending on time, temperature and moisture," BCSIR said in a report.

"Even, it indicates gradually higher level of formaldehyde in fresh fruits in warm temperature. So the kit's reading of formaldehyde level won't be accurate if fruits are kept in warm temperature."


