




Bryan Singer to direct X-Men: Apocalypse

Film-maker Bryan Singer is to direct X-Men: Apocalypse, the next movie in the long-running blockbuster franchise.

The film, which is due for release in May 2016, will be the eighth in the



comic book series and the fourth directed by Singer.


He took the helm for the first two X-Men releases and returned for this year's Days of Future Past.

Apocalypse is set 10 years after Days of Future Past and will star Hugh Jackman as recurring character Wolverine, James McAvoy and Nicholas Hoult. The superheroes have to face their most unrelenting foe yet.

The X-Men franchise - seven films to date - has so far taken more than 3 billion USD in box office receipts around the world.

STATE CAN UPHOLD FATHER'S LEGACY ... Nurjahan Alim

Daughter of legendary folk singer Abdul Alim, Nurjahan Alim is walking in her father's footsteps. Immersed in folk music since her childhood, she recently released her debut album to a warm response from music lovers. The folk singer spoke to The Daily Star about her new project in a recent conversation.

Tell us about your new album...

Nurjahan Alim: My album, titled "Majhi", features seven tracks. Although music lovers of our time don't receive such albums warmly, it has hit the audio market on a positive note. Moreover, I have tried to sing the songs with dedication.

Why has it taken so long to release your debut album?

Nurjahan Alim: As it has a classical touch, it took time to put the album together. Besides, I wanted my album to reflect my father's devotion to music.

Do you plan to release an album of your

father's songs?

Nurjahan Alim: Definitely, for my own solace. As the daughter of such an illustrious father, it is also my duty to spread his songs among the new generation within and outside the country.

How did you learn to sing?

Nurjahan Alim: I grew up listening to my father's songs and entered the music world encouraged by my elder brother Zahir Alim. I participated in Natun Kuri and Kalakakoli of Bangladesh Betar. I trained with Zahir as he taught music those days. I also learnt classical music from Anup Barua of Chhayanaut.

What is the one thing that your father told you that you still carry with you?

Nurjahan Alim: In his lifetime, he said in an interview, "No one can be a real artiste without proper practice," and I believe this philosophy with my heart and soul.

At what stage did you decide to become a singer?

Nurjahan Alim: I dreamt of being a dancer as a child. Later, I decided to

become a singer as all my family members are involved in the world of music. Have all of your father's songs and music been preserved?

Nurjahan Alim: He rendered over 500 songs, half of which was in Bangladesh Betar and the rest in Pakistan Radio. We tried to collect these songs. The government can definitely help preserve my father's songs. I hope that his songs continue to be heard for centuries to come.

What is your dream as a singer?

Nurjahan Alim: I want to sing all my life. Besides folk music, I hope to render modern songs. Also, I want to sing my father's songs and do some good works inspired by him. I wish to win everyone's hearts through music.

To whom do you attribute your success?

Nurjahan Alim: Definitely my family. Today I'm known to people because of them. I also want to thank my husband Hisab Khatib Khan Babu, in particular, for my album seeing the light of day.

Artisans busy making clay idols ahead of Puja

Artisans are now busy making clay idols ahead of Durga Puja.

"As Mymensingh has acquired a reputation for its beautiful clay idols, we are receiving orders from other districts, including Netrokona, Jamalpur, Sherpur, Gaibandha, Pabna and Sirajganj," said one artisan from the town.

Still better news is that business may look up for owners of idol making units as puja mandaps are on the increase in the district. The most colourful puja mandaps will be set up at Daal Patti, Jilapi Patti, Biswanath Mandir, District Transport Owners Association and Raghunath Ghar Akhara of the town.

However all is not well. Said leading artisan Toyota Ghosh, "Over the last few days there has been incessant rain which spells trouble as it will delay the delivery of idols to the puja mandaps."

"The lack of workers is a major hurdle and we have to get idol makers from different places of the district to meet demand," informed artisans Ajoy Kar of Boro Kalibari area.

claustrophobic existence with her mother-in-law Rosie. Bringing up the cast is Savio, the angst-ridden hero (Arjun Kapoor) who is in love with Angie but can't garner the courage to tell her. It is in Savio's broken-down car that the odd group set off on their quirky adventure.

As the plot unravels, the five characters, thrown against each other, begin to bond. Yet they carry the burden of their past that must be purged before they can go ahead with their lives. And it is in their catharsis in the second half of the film that the strength of the movie lies.

Though the latter half of "Finding Fanny" does evoke emotion and a lump in the throat, one is left wondering why the film has raked in an astonishing Rs 28.09 crores in its very first week.
