## Trapped by rickshaws

2 hurt as train rams a car at rail-crossing

The black sport utility vehicle was stuck right in the middle of Khilgaon level crossing. A crazy mass of rickshaws blocked its way forward and back. And then the SUV driver saw the danger ahead -- a train was approaching.

The gateman rang the siren and brought down the bars on both sides of the crossing. But he then pulled up the bar on one side to allow the SUV to pass. Several people there tried to clear the

rail track. But their efforts went in vain as hundreds of rickshaws and vehicles created a long tailback making it impossible for the SUV to move.

"The speeding train hit the vehicle and mangled it along with three to four rickshaws. It all happened in a couple of minutes," said fruit vendor Abdul Ahad, who saw the incident from his makeshift shop near the crossing.

At a post-meeting briefing, the minister said the Zilhajj moon was not sighted anywhere in the country.

A UK citizen of Bangladeshi origin is now in Dhaka to recruit fighters for ISIS, detectives said yesterday after the arrest of "two of his recruits".

What was set up to protect the press and its freedom appears to be poised to destroy both. Recent newspaper reports have alerted us about certain changes that the Press Council is proposing to bring in its own law that we consider to be dangerously anti-free press and fundamentally contradictory to the very purpose for which the Council was set up.

Article 39 of our Constitution guarantees freedom of the press with reasonable restrictions. Basing on that the Press Council Act was promulgated in 1974. It's very first "objective" says, "The Council shall preserve the freedom of the press and improve the standards of newspapers and news agencies in Bangladesh." Objective 2(a) says, "Help newspapers and news agencies to maintain their freedom", objective 2(e) says, "To keep under review any development likely to restrict the supply and dissemination of information of public interest and importance".

As to its powers, it was given the right to "warn, admonish and censure." Under the above Act, the Press Council was set up in 1979 with the same objectives of promoting press freedom and enhancing quality of the press.

Following the formation of the Council, a 22-item "Code of Conduct" for journalists was adopted in 1993, again highlighting the centrality of freedom in the operation of the press. This "code" goes into details of what should be printed and what should be avoided and the steps necessary to ensure authentication of reports.
