## Punish culprits

Orders minister on illegal cow fattening STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Fisheries and Livestock Minister Muhammad Sayedul Hoque yesterday directed all livestock officials and employees to go on field visits and take stern legal action against traders who are using steroids or hormone to fatten cattle before Eid-ul-Azha.

The directive came at a discussion with districtand upazila-level livestock officers and employees at the LGED auditorium. The Department of Livestock organised it.

"Very few cattle traders, I suppose, are involved in these unlawful activities as most farmers follow the scientific method sanctioned by the government to make the cattle healthy and fat," said the minister while addressing the discussion as the chief guest.

The governmentapproved method is an acceptable and established one which equally benefits both traders and consumers, he said.

Demand for fresh polls internal issue

US envoy says now DIPLOMATIC CORRESPONDENT

In a major policy shift, the United States has described the demand for political dialogue to hold a fresh election in Bangladesh as an "internal issue" that needs to be solved by political parties.

"I think that [fresh election] is an internal issue which the political parties of Bangladesh and the people of Bangladesh will need to resolve... they'll resolve that at some point, said US Ambassador Dan Mozena at a diplomatic talk in the capital yesterday.

Mozena called for fresh polls in Bangladesh by May or June during a diplomatic briefing at the foreign ministry less than two weeks after the January 5 polls boycotted by the BNP and its allies.

# Irregularities all the way

The entire process-- from approving vessels' designs to issuance of the registration documents-- is not done in a transparent way in the absence of proper monitoring, said a government probe report recently.

Monitoring during the construction and annual fitness surveys of the vessels are not conducted in an accountable manner as well, according to the report on the Pinak-6 disaster submitted on September 14 by a committee of the shipping ministry.

The Daily Star got a copy of the report recently.

Such a lax government monitoring paves the way for faulty and unfit vessels to ply the river, resulting in frequent accidents in which hundreds die, say experts.

The ministry had formed the committee after unfit passenger vessel

Pinak-6 capsized in the Padma river on August 4, killing over a hundred passengers on board. When Pinak-6 capsized, it was carrying over 200 passengers even though

it had the capacity of only 85. Overloading and incompetence of the master (pilot) were responsible for the tragedy, the report said. According to law, a surveyor has to check 21 issues while conducting any

vessel's annual fitness survey. But a surveyor on average takes not more than 20 minutes to check all the

issues, said the report.





### N'GANJ 7-MURDER Probe body talks with Rab boss today

Rapid Action Battalion Director General Mukhlesur Rahman will be interrogated today by the government-formed committee investigating the sensational Narayanganj seven-murder case.

Mukhlesur Rahman yesterday said he had received a letter from the committee asking him to be present at the secretariat at 2:30pm today.

The committee would quiz the Rab boss about their role in the gruesome murders, one of the members, preferring not to be named, told The Daily Star yesterday.

"Names of some Rab members have already surfaced during the investigation. We are probing whether they got involved in the incident following directives from the Rab headquarters," he added.

# Jayalalithaa picks new CM from jail

Former film star Jayalalithaa Jayaram, one of India's most colourful and controversial politicians, was replaced as head of a southern state yesterday after she was jailed in a corruption case, reports said.

Jayalalithaa, 66, who enjoys a cult following in the southern state of Tamil Nadu that she has long governed, was jailed for four years on Saturday over the case that has lasted nearly two decades.

A judge in the southern city of Bangalore found Jayalalithaa guilty of amassing illegal wealth -- including gold, property, hundreds of shoes and thousands of saris -in the case that she has always dismissed as being politically motivated.

Prosecutors said her assets, which reportedly included two 1,000-acre estates in the lush tropical state she ran, were vastly disproportionate to her earnings during her first term as chief minister from 1991 to 1996.

She was set to spend her second night in Bangalore's main jail yesterday in an extraordinary transformation of fortunes for the woman known as "Amma" (Mother) to her fans, whose ministers have been known to prostrate themselves before her.

Jayalalithaa, who was also fined one billion rupees (\$16 million), was automatically disqualified from holding office, although she is still likely to dominate her AIADMK party, the third biggest force in the national parliament.

She was replaced as Tamil Nadu chief minister by her loyal finance minister, O Panneerselvam, following a party meeting, the Press Trust of India news agency (PTI) said.
