#### **DPL** starts on Nov 2

The country's lone 50 overs domestic cricket competition, the Dhaka Premier League, is set to be delayed by three more weeks as the Bangladesh Cricket Board has decided to send a team to Kolkata to take part in the Eden Gardens' 150 year celebrations.

The Dhaka Premier League is now expected to begin on November 2.

The competition, which was originally scheduled to begin on October 10, has already been facing delays due to a three-day match that national coach Chandika Hathurusingha

wants to organise.

With the BCB confirming its participation in the Kolkata meet, the league has now been rescheduled for November. The tournament in Kolkata will take place from October 23 to 30.

"The tournament will see teams coming from Karnataka, Mumbai and the MCC and they have requested us to send a strong team. Since our main team will be busy with the Zimbabwe series, we thought it would be best to send our A team. That will mean that we will have to delay the start of our league," said BCB president Nazmul Hassan Papon yesterday.

#### Nadir's case is an error!

Bangladesh Cricket Board has admitted that allowing banned umpire Nadir Shah to officiate in a First Division match was an 'error' on its part. Shah was banned for 10

years in March 2013 after he was found guilty of agreeing to doctor decisions in exchange of money in a sting operation conducted by India TV. However, he was allowed to stand as umpire in a First Division match between Indira Road Krira Chakra and BKSP on Saturday.

The member-secretary of the board's Umpires' Committee has claimed that the BCB in a board meeting after the ICC World Twenty20 had decided to allow Shah to officiate in domestic matches.

However, BCB president Nazmul Hassan Papon yesterday told reporters that the board was yet to take a decision on Shah's ban.

"After he was banned, he appealed. Soon after, there was a discussion on whether the ban could be reduced. However, the board did not take any decision and the ban still stands. It must have been a communication error," said Papon.

Sailab Hossain Tutul, member-secretary of the Umpires' Committee told The Daily Star that the chairman of the committee, Nazmul Karim had informed them to allow Shah to stand as umpire from the current season onwards.

#### Nadal back in style

# Captaincy divided

Mashrafe made ODI skipper for Zim series

Pacer Mashrafe Bin Mortaza has been named Bangladesh's ODI captain for the Zimbabwe series, set to take place in October-November, following a board meeting yesterday.

The 31-year-old will replace Mushfiqur Rahim, who led the Tigers in all formats of the game for almost three years. Mushfiqur was earlier named captain till next year's World Cup in Australia and New Zealand.

The wicketkeeper-batsman however, has been retained as the side's Test captain for the Zimbabwe series, which includes three Tests and five ODIs

Apart from declaring two captains, the board also named allrounder Shakib Al Hasan and opener Tamim Iqbal as vice-captains in the ODI and Test formats respectively.

Bangladesh Cricket Board president, Nazmul Hassan Papon, who had made his intentions of enforcing the split-captaincy system in separate interviews this week, told reporters after the board meeting that the decision had to be taken in order to make Mushfigur 'pressure-free'.

"The biggest reason is that Mushfigur is our best batsman at this point of time and we believe that he can improve a lot more. It's extremely difficult for him to keep, bat and captain the side at the same time. That's why we decided to try something different and test our idea by giving Mashrafe a go, Papon told reporters at Mirpur yesterday.

The president further added that during their

discussion the board members had even suggested that Mushfiqur stops keeping and focus solely on his batting.

The decision to provide four different players with leading roles, according to the president, is an attempt to find a permanent captain for the future.

"This has been done on a test basis. We are basically looking for the perfect substitute for Mushfigur. These are the senior-most players and they should take a major share of the responsibility. We will observe them before we take a permanent decision in the future," said the BCB boss.

Asked about the reason behind giving Shakib a leadership role barely a few weeks after his disciplinary suspension was lifted, Papon said: "I think there was misunderstanding. We never had anything against Shakib. Yes, we were not happy with his behaviour, but in the recent past we have seen changes in him. He is a senior player and he has a big responsibility in the team."

The president further added that the board is on the hunt for another captain for the T20I side.

Apart from the captaincy issue, the board discussed the performance reports, submitted by the coach and the directors, of the disappointing West Indies tour.

Meanwhile, the board congratulated the national women's cricketers for winning silver in the Asian Games.

Shakib Al Hasan returned to the fray as well as he was named Mashrafe's deputy for the series. The ace-allrounder, who recently returned to international cricket after serving a disciplinary suspension, said that he was looking forward to don the national jersey.

"Every human being goes through changes," a smiling Shakib said while tightening his pads before the start of their net sessions.

## Oman defeat ends disastrous campaign

Bangladesh hockey team finished eighth among ten teams in the 17th Asian Games after suffering a 2-3 defeat against Oman in the place-deciding match at the Seonhak Hockey Stadium in Incheon yesterday.

The fourth defeat in five matches left Bangladesh in the same position they had attained in the previous edition even though the team management, especially the coach, had set their sights on either

the fifth or sixth position before the games began. Since their 0-8 defeat against Japan in their opening match, Bangladesh failed to put up any resistance against the other teams, except for Singapore, whom they beat 2-1. Yesterday's defeat against Oman, a team Bangladesh had beaten by 6-1 goals in the final of the Asian Games Qualifiers in Dhaka earlier this year, capped off a disastrous campaign.

However, coach Naveed Alam, whose 14-month tenure in charge of the national team comes to an end after the Asian Games, found enough excuse for the defeat.

"We made many mistakes and missed many chances. The margin should have been like the one we had in the Asian Games qualifying round, " said Naveed.

Bangladesh dominated the early proceedings and took a deserved lead in the 11th minute from a penalty corner converted by Pushkor Khisha Mimo before they gradually lost control as the game progressed.

Oman played some fantastic hockey to expose the Bangladesh defence in the second quarter and equalised in the 18th minute through Ahmed Sabeel Habib Al Balushi before grabbing the lead through Qasim Moosa Khalfan Al Shibli in the 37th minute.

Bangladesh fought back through the conversion of a penalty corner by Krishna Kumar in the 39th minute but once again they threw away the initiative. Defender Farhad Ahmed Shitul made an unnecessary challenge on an Oman player in the 45th minute to concede a penalty corner, which gave Oman the winning goal.

The Bangladesh players failed to convert two penalty corners in the dying moments as they surrendered meekly.

The Pakistani coach however put on a brave face as he felt Bangladesh's performance in the tournament was appreciable.

"I am very satisfied with our work. We did our best and players did their best. I am not disappointed with my players," said Naveed adding that Bangladesh team improved much under his guidance but still need to improve on confidence by playing more international matches.

#### Narine action reported too

Kolkata Knight Riders offspinner Sunil Narine has been reported for a suspected bowling action following his side's 36-run win over Dolphins in the Champions League Twenty20 Group A match on Monday evening in Hyderabad.

The charge was laid by on-field umpires Anil Chaudhary and Chettihody Shamshuddin along with third umpire Kumar Dharmasena and specifically relates to Narine's quicker ball. Under CLT20 guidelines, Narine may request for an official assessment from the BCCI's suspect bowling action committee. Narine has been placed on the tournament's 'warning list' but will still be able to play. However, if he is reported again while still on the warning list, he will be suspended from bowling for the remainder of the tournament.

Narine claimed figures of 3 for 33 in his four-over spell during the win over Dolphins. The Knight Riders next match will be in the tournament semifinals on October 2.

Bangladesh A bounced back to level the series as they won the rain-interrupted second one-dayer against Zimbabwe A by six wickets at the Fatullah Cricket Stadium yesterday.

Soumya Sarkar hit 86 after claiming two crucial wickets as the home side reached the revised target of 158, losing four wickets in 31.4 overs in reply to the visitors' 163 for nine in their 50 overs.

The second-string Bangladesh side had lost the first match by 17 runs and after the outcome of yesterday's match, today's third and final game at the same venue turned into a series decider. Rain stopped play after 31.1 overs with the

hosts on 156 for 4 and when play resumed after an hour, the revised target was set at 158 in 47 overs and they collected those two runs in three deliveries without any further casualty. Earlier, opting to bat, the tourists lost wickets at regular intervals and did not have

the top scorer, making 74 runs amid the batting collapse. Openers Soumya and Liton Das started the reply steadily and gave their team a solid platform by adding 80 runs in 17.3 overs. Soumya struck 12 fours and a six during his

#### Waqar unhappy about chucking crackdown

Pakistan coach Waqar Younis has questioned the timing of cricket authorities' crackdown against chucking just months away from the World Cup, and suggested that rules on bowling actions be relaxed for spinners.

In an interview with AFP, the former pace great said key all-rounder Mohammed Hafeez's confidence was left shattered after he was reported for a suspect action in an Indian domestic tournament, a fresh blow to Pakistan following the loss of Saeed Ajmal to a chucking ban.

Ajmal, the world's leading one-day bowler, faces a race against time to complete remedial work by the World Cup, to be held from February to March in Australia and New Zealand.

He was suspended earlier this month after he was found to straighten his elbow up to 43 degrees -well beyond the 15 degree limit prescribed under the rules, the point where a kink becomes noticeable to the naked eye.

Since then, Hafeez and Sunil Narine have been among four players reported during an Indian tournament.
