### Tanners cut rawhide price

Tanners have cut the minimum purchase prices of rawhides for what they said were a lack of demand from international buyers, a weakening dollar and a huge stock from the previous year. They will buy cowhides at Tk 70-75 per square foot in the capital and Tk 60-65 elsewhere the country.

M Abu Taher, president of Bangladesh Finished Leather and Footwear Exporters Association, announced the rates at a press conference in the capital. Leaders of Bangladesh Tanners Association (BTA) and Bangladesh Hide and Skin Merchants Association (BHSMA) were present.

Tannery owners last year had bought salted cowhides at Tk 85-95 per sft in Dhaka city and Tk 75-80 elsewhere.

This year, the price of goat hide has been set at Tk 30-35

# Bangla too difficult!

69pc fail to get pass marks in Bangla in DU admission test

Students aspiring to enrol at Dhaka University have been persistently performing poorly in Bangla, let alone in English, as results of this year's admission tests give a glaring example of such performance.

Around 69 percent of 40,565 students in 'Kha' unit have failed to get pass mark in Bangla. The failure rate in English in this unit under the Arts Faculty is 54 percent.

The DU authorities hold a 120-mark admission test for 'Kha' and four other units. The question for 'Kha' unit has three sections -- Bangla (30 marks), English (30 marks) and general knowledge (60 marks).

In order to pass the test, each student needs to

obtain minimum 48 marks with at least eight in English and Bangla, and 17 in general knowledge.

However, the students who took the tests under 'Ga' and 'Gha' units under the Business Studies and the Social Science faculties respectively have comparatively performed better in Bangla. Around 27 and 28 percent admission seekers have failed to secure pass marks in these units this year.

But, performance in English in three units -- Kha, Ga and Gha -- is abysmal. Around 58 percent of 175,824 applicants have failed to secure pass marks in English.

Most shocking was the news that only two out of 1,364 students in 'Kha' unit have been qualified to enrol at English department, which offers 150 seats. SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

### Protesters call off talks with govt

Hong Kong student leaders yesterday called off talks with the government aimed at bringing an end to mass pro-democracy demonstrations that have paralysed the city, after violent clashes broke out with pro-Beijing crowds at their protest camps.

The Hong Kong Federation of Students made the announcement after pro-government crowds descended on two of their camps yesterday, tearing down their tents and barricades in what activists said was orchestrated violence by paid thugs from "triad" criminal gangs.

"Everybody saw what happened today," they added. "The government and police turned a blind eye to violent acts by the triads targeting peaceful SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

"There is no other option but to call off talks," the students said in a statement.

### Shias join Sunnis to defend Iraqi towns

When ISIS fighters tried to storm the Tigris River town of Dhuluiya north of Baghdad this week, they were repelled by a rare coalition of Sunni tribal fighters inside the town and Shias in its sister city Balad on the opposite bank.

The assault, which began late on Tuesday ran into Thursday, was one of several major battles in recent days in which Sunni tribes joined pro-government forces against the militants, in what Baghdad and Washington hope is a sign of increasing cooperation across sectarian lines to save the country.

Further north, another powerful Sunni tribe fought alongside Kurdish forces to drive Islamic State fighters from Rabia, a town controlling one of the main border

checkpoints used by fighters pouring in from Syria.

In western Iraq, Sunni tribes have fought alongside government troops in Hit, which was captured by Islamic State fighters on Thursday, and in Haditha, site of a strategic dam on the Euphrates.

Such local alliances are still rare: in most Sunni areas of Iraq, tribes have shown little sign of turning against militants as they did when they were recruited by US troops in 2006-07. Many of the leaders of that Sunni "Awakening" movement were later arrested by Baghdad, in what Sunnis see as a betrayal.

Sectarian and ethnic animosity runs deep after a decade of civil war that has touched nearly every family, making it difficult for Sunnis, Shias and Kurds to trust each other. SEE PAGE 11 COL 1


