Fergie offered Keane iconic shirt

Former Manchester United captain Roy Keane claims he was offered the club's iconic No7 shirt by then manager Alex Feguson so as to prevent David Beckham getting it.

Keane, who left United in acrimonious circumstances in 2005 after year's of dedicated and inspirational service, reveals the incident in his updated autobiography The Second Half, which is published on Thursday, but which embarrassingly has mistakenly already gone on sale in a supermarket in Manchester.

Maverick French star Eric Cantona had left the club in 1997 and Ferguson according to Keane was determined England captain Beckham would not get to don the No7 shirt. "At United, '7' was the iconic number," Keane

wrote. "When Eric Cantona left there was debate about who was going to be the next captain. I was quite

relaxed about it. But there

was his number, too - '7'. "Bryan Robson had had it before Cantona and, of course, it went back to Georgie Best.

"The manager pulled me into his office and said that he wanted me to wear the '7'.

"I said, 'No, I'm not bothered.' And he said, 'I know Becks will f**** want it and I don't want him to have it'."

However, Keane did not give in and Beckham -with whom Ferguson enjoyed a stormy relationship -- went on to lay his hands on the shirt.

Brazil set friendlies date

Brazil have scheduled friendly matches against Turkey and Austria in November, the Brazilian Football Federation (CBF) confirmed on Tuesday.

The team, who crashed out of the World Cup they hosted last July in the semifinals against eventual champions Germany, take on Turkey on November 12 before playing Austria six days later in Vienna.

Barca face expulsion

Barcelona would not be allowed to play in La Liga if Catalonia broke away from Spain, the country's football league chief Javier Tebas said as tensions mounted in the region over the possibility of an independence referendum next month. Politics have been interwoven with the football club almost since it was formed and

is summed up by the team's motto: 'more than a club'. Barca's role in pushing the Catalan nationalist cause varies depending on the board in power, but it always plays

a central role in cultural life. The present board, first under president Sandro Rosell and now Josep Maria Bartomeu, have taken a back-seat role in the heated debate currently taking place in the region about

whether to hold an independence referendum on Nov. 9. Catalan independence would clearly impact on the future of Barca, who, along with Real Madrid, are the major powerhouses of the Spanish game with support throughout

the country. In the event that Barca did leave La Liga then it would severely weaken the image of the competition at home and abroad

Similarly it would be hard to imagine Barca and local rivals Espanyol competing in a Catalan league, which would have many semi-professional teams.

"If Catalonia became independent, taking into consideration the Sports Law that would be enforced by the rest of Spain, Barcelona wouldn't be allowed to play," Tebas, the president of the LFP, told a sports conference in Barcelona.

Europe gets into full swing Australia amble

Europe is preparing for UEFA's first full-blown "week of football" as the marathon Euro 2016 qualifying com-

petition gets into full swing - although it promises to be a distinctly underwhelming experience.

UEFA has heralded the new setup as "great news for football fans" but there is risk that the six solid days of international football could end up making it like background music in a shopping centre, always being played somewhere but with nobody really paying much attention.

Albania, who kicked off with a 1-0 win in Portugal, will try to pull off two more surprises when they host Denmark and visit Serbia.

Portugal themselves will start life under new coach Fernando Santos, although he will not be on the touchline for Tuesday's visit to Denmark as he starts an eight-game ban.

Santos, who led Greece to the round-of-16 at the World Cup, has replaced Paulo Bento, who left by mutual consent following the Albania debacle.

World champions Germany visit neighbours Poland on Saturday in arguably the top clash of the six days, while neighbours Romania and Hungary, who met in the World Cup qualifiers, do battle again in Bucharest

on the same day.

Apart from that, there is precious little to get excited about in the 52 games which feature the usual mismatches, such as England-San Marino on Thursday, Belgium-Andorra on Friday, Luxemburg-Spain on Sunday and Malta-Italy on Monday. Only one match, Bosnia-Belgium on Monday, features two teams who were both at the World Cup in Brazil.

International matches have traditionally been concentrated into one or two days per month, creating a certain sense of occasion and anticipation, although that has gradually diminished over the years due to the sheer quantity of games played.

For the Euro 2016 qualifiers, however, UEFA had decided to spread the games evenly over six nights between Thursday and Tuesday. There was a small taste of what was to come in September when there were three days of action, but this will be the first full


diminished because the top two in each of the nine groups, plus the best third-placed team, qualify directly for Euro 2016 and the other eight thirdplaced sides go into a playoff round, which may provide the only real excitement of the competition. Of the top teams, defending cham-

pions Spain have a moderately tricky trip to Slovakia on Thursday in Group C, then visit Luxembourg 72 hours Italy, who have made a promising

start under new coach Antonio Conte and with playmaker Andrea Pirlo returning from his short-lived international retirement - are at home to Azerbaijan on Friday and then travel to Malta on Monday

Germany follow Saturday's trip to Poland with a straightforward-looking home game against Ireland on Tuesday.

Guus Hiddink, who began his second stint in charge of World Cup semi-finalists the Netherlands with a friendly defeat to Italy and qualifying loss to the Czech Republic, should get his first win at home to Kazakhstan on Friday in Group A before heading to Iceland on Monday.



Steven Smith scored a maiden one-day hundred while paceman Mitchell Johnson took three wickets to help Australia beat Pakistan by 93 runs in the first day-night international on Tuesday. Smith, who had never scored a half-

century in one-day games before, managed a sedate 118-ball 101 to guide Australia to a challenging 255-8 before bowlers exposed Pakistan's fragile batting to bowl them out for 162 in 36.3 overs at Sharjah Stadium. Johnson (3-24) combined with off-spinners Glenn

Maxwell (2-29) and Nathan Lyon (2-33) bowled with venom and guile to derail Pakistan's chase for Australia's 1-0 lead in the three-match series. Only Umar Akmal 46 and Sarfraz Ahmed (34) offered

some resistance in a poor batting display. Pakistan lost opener Ahmed Shahzad early for four but

make-shift opener Ahmed and Asad Shafiq (13) put on 50 for the second wicket before Pakistan lost three wickets for just four runs. Lyon had Sarfraz caught behind off a miscued sweep and

the next ball had Pakistan skipper Misbahul Haq, playing in his 150th one day international, caught at leg-slip by a diving David Warner. Johnson, who had recovered fully from a rib injury, then had

Shafiq off a rising delivery to leave Pakistan reeling at 63-4. Akmal and Fawad Alam (seven) were all at sea against

some vicious spin from Lyon as runs were hard to come by. As the pressure built up Alam fell to Glenn Maxwell while Shahid Afridi made just five before holing out off

Ozil out for 3 months

Germany midfielder Mesut Ozil has been ruled out for up to three months after he was diagnosed with a partial tear of a knee ligament, the German football association said on Wednesday.

Ozil will miss the World Cup winners' upcoming Euro 2016 qualifiers against Poland and Ireland as well as matches against Gibraltar and Spain later this year.

"The 25-year-old complained about pain in his left knee when he arrived in Frankfurt (to join the Germany team) on Tuesday," the DFB said in a statement.

"The scan today revealed a partial tear of his exterior ligament in his left knee. He will be out an expected 10-

12 weeks." Ozil, who played the full 90 minutes in Arsenal's 2-0 Premier League defeat to Chelsea on Sunday, is the

latest big name absence from

coach Joachim Loew's squad. Chelsea's Andre Schuerrle also missed team training for the second day in a row, undergoing an individual session, but officials were hopeful he could be fit in time for Saturday.

Di Matteo out to steady Schalke



Schalke's new coach Roberto Di Matteo said Wednesday his priority is to improve the Royal Blues' defence as he sets his sights on a Champions League showdown with his exclub Chelsea.

The 44-year-old was officially unveiled in Gelsenkirchen as Schalke's coach with his new team 11th in the Bundesliga and low on confidence after just two wins in 10 games this season.

The Swiss-born Italian will take charge of his first training session on Thursday and his first match as coach is at home to Hertha Berlin on October 18. Di Matteo says his goals are to qualify for the Champions

League knock-out phase and to secure their place in next

season's competition by finishing in the top three in the Bundesliga. "It's a good team, which has a lot of potential going forward, but it has some problems in defence," said Di Matteo,

who has replaced fired predecessor Jens Keller. "We have to work on our defensive organisation and I

have a lot of work ahead of me." Di Matteo is Schalke's eighth coach in six years and he knows the importance of stamping his authority on the team.

reporters. "We have to work on getting more organised and work on the players' confidence. There is no miracle cure, we need patience and time."

Schalke sit second to Chelsea in Group G after drawing their first two Champions League games, including a 1-1 stalemate at Stamford Bridge.

Di Matteo even took some tips from Germany coach Joachim Loew before taking the Schalke job, his first coaching appointment since being sacked by Chelsea in November 2012.
