



Reaching across gulfs of age, gender, faith, nationality and even international celebrity, the Norwegian Nobel Committee awarded the 2014 peace prize yesterday to Malala Yousafzai of Pakistan and Kailash Satyarthi of

The award joined a teenage Pakistani known around the world with an Indian veteran of campaigns to end child labour and free children from trafficking.

Malala, 17, is the youngest recipient of the prize since it was created in 1901. Kailash is 60. The \$1.1 million prize is to be divided equally between them.

UN CONVOY ATTACKED BNP not ready for 3 Bangladeshi anti-govt agitation

Khaleda's move to revamp party proves futile due to leadership row in front organisations, intra-party feuds

BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia has tried and failed to overhaul her party in the last nine months, mainly because of intra-party feuds at central and local levels and lack of commitment of leaders.

As a result, she had to repeatedly postpone her plans for anti-government protests, and she is frustrated about this, party sources say.

The process to reorganise the party has virtually stopped in all its 75 district units, as leaders continue to fight among themselves over formation of new committees.

The overhaul efforts were aimed to strengthen the grassroots demoralised after the January 5 one-sided elections, and to boost their morale for anti-government protests, insiders said.

After the polls boycotted by the BNP-led alliance and most other political parties, Khaleda at a crowded press conference on January 15 said she would announce a fresh movement to force the Sheikh Hasina administration to hold an election under a nonparty caretaker government, after reorganising the party.

BNP sources said most of their district units were being run by expired committees. Besides, nearly half of those are being run by convening committees.

Too young to wed

Study says 66pc girls get married before 18 in Bangladesh; 86pc child marriage victims uneducated; Int'l Day of the Girl Child today

At first sight, Sharmin, 15, looks like one of those emaciated children needing constant care. The fact of the matter, however, is: she herself became a mother just eight months ago.

Now she works as a domestic help in Dhaka. On top of doing the entire household chores at her employer's house, she takes care of her child all by herself when she is supposed to grow up with the love and affection of her parents. Born and raised in a village in Narsingdi, Sharmin's parents married her

off at the age of 11, putting an abrupt end to her education. "At that age, I did not even understand what marriage is. All I was told was that everyone in my in-laws' house will love me a lot and buy me plenty

of dolls," Sharmin told The Daily Star. She migrated to Dhaka last month to escape poverty and an abusive

husband. "I didn't have an opinion in anything that happened to me. Nor could I

do anything to change my fate," she said. Sharmin, who has been suffering from malnutrition all her life, fought

an uphill battle with death while giving birth to her child.

Quoting doctors at the local clinic where she had undergone a caesarean section, she said it was a miracle that she survived the heavy bleeding during the procedure.

Bombs 'meant for Bangladesh'

Say Indian media reports; 8 more held; NIA suspects dead were JMB militants

A probe has found that explosives manufactured in West Bengal's Burdwan town were being sent to Bangladesh, Indian media reported, attributing investigators.

This could be the first evidence that the state was being used for terror activities across the border in Bangladesh -an embarrassment for the Mamata Banerjee government, already under fire for not cracking down on Bangladeshbased terror groups in the state.

"All these explosives were being sent to Bangladesh," a

CID official, requesting anonymity, told Hindustan Times. "After taking over the reins of Bangladesh, Sheikh Hasina launched a crackdown on terror outfits and Jamaat-ul-Mujahideen operatives were forced to shift some of their operations out of the country. The easiest alternative was Bengal. We have come to know they started producing

explosives since November last year."

The CID will hand over its report to the National Intelligence Agency (NIA).
