An Assam police spokesman yesterday said a preliminary probe showed one of the arrested, Shaikhul Islam alias Abdullah, is a key member of the module and an associate of Shakil Ahmed.

Shaikhul, who received jihadi training in two madrasas of Burdwan and Murshidabad, was allegedly instructed to look for Muslim youths who have the potential for jihad. Shakil Ahmed too had visited

Barpeta on several occasions, posing as a garment trader, to motivate youths for terrorism, the official added. Police said investigations are on to

identify other members of the module, The Daily Star's New Delhi correspondent reports. Also yesterday, West Bengal Education Minister and Trinamool Congress Secretary General Partha

Chatterjee alleged that the central

government of India was "sitting tight" on a report sent by the state government on the Burdwan blast. "We feel there was a political motive behind this. This is our belief ... and it is based on what we experienced over the past few days," he

The minister also accused the central government of "failing to curb illegal immigration from Bangladesh".

Countering BJP's allegation that West Bengal's ruling Trinamool Congress was encouraging illegal immigration, Partha asked, "What is the role of the border guards under the central government?"

# Ebola toll passes 4,000

FROM PAGE 16 borders to screen for potentially exposed travelers.

The US and Britain also boosted screening at major airports.

The US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention predicted the number of cases could reach 1.4 million by January unless strong measures are taken to contain the disease.

From Australia to Zimbabwe, and Brazil to Spain, people who showed signs of fever or had recent contact with Ebola victims were whisked into isolation units or ordered to stay in their homes.

Authorities warned that hoaxes could trigger panic as a man was taken off a US flight by a bio-hazard team after he sneezed and reportedly said: "I have Ebola. You are all screwed."

Serious concerns remained in Spain over how the virus could have spread in a top specialist disease hospital. Healthcare workers told AFP the

quarantine floor of Carlos III hospital in Madrid, where 44-year-old Romero was infected, was shut last year as a result of spending cuts and only re-opened for the two missionaries flown back from Africa with the disease in August.

Prime Minister Mariano Rajoy visited the hospital, where Romero, who caught Ebola while caring for the missionaries, was said to be in a "stable but serious" condition.

Doctors there took in three more patients for observation Friday bringing to 17 the number under surveillance, including Romero, her husband and other medical staff.

MORE MONEY NEEDED

The United Nations and leaders of the Ebola-stricken nations of Guinea, Liberia and Sierra Leone pleaded for greater help for the frontline of the disease in Africa.

West African nations hard-hit by the Ebola crisis, met Friday with IMF Director Christine Lagarde, who promised the organization was "ready to do more if needed" to fight the disease. UN Deputy Secretary General Jan Eliasson said only a quarter of "the one

billion dollars sought" to combat the disease had been pledged. He appealed for doctors, nurses and other healthcare personnel to come forward.

His comments echoed a plea on Thursday from UN Secretary-General Ban Ki-moon, who said resources to support the fight must be increased 20-fold.

"Cases are growing exponentially," Ban said. "Do not wait for consultation. Just take action." "We have to work now so that it is

not the world's next AIDS," CDC The president of Guinea, one of the Director Tom Frieden warned the heads of the United Nations, World Bank and International Monetary Fund gathered in Washington Thursday. In Liberia, where the official death toll

was put at 2,316 by the WHO on Friday, the government said it had banned journalists from Ebola clinics, arguing it was to protect patients' privacy.

The move came as nurses at the largest government Ebola clinic in the capital Monrovia staged a "go slow" to demand hazard pay, defying a request by UN health officials to avoid industrial action during the crisis.

who will help law enforcers with information to track Jahangir. The identities of the informers will be kept secret. Meanwhile, Mozibor Rahman, expa-

triate husband of Hasna, along with some of his relatives yesterday described the incident and its background to the DIG at the police station. They also expressed their disappointment as police were yet to nab the main accused although five days had elapsed. The DIG assured them that Jahangir cannot flee the country as police had

seized his passport from his house after the incident. "The culprits will be arrested as soon as possible and the government is very serious about it." The roles of Mirzapur police includ-

ing its officer-in-charge (OC) as well as the village elders before and after the incident will also be investigated, the DIG said. He also directed Saleh Mohammed

Tanvir, superintendent of police in Tangail, to intensify their drives to catch Jahangir and his accomplices and to take proper steps to give exemplary punishment to the culprits. The senior police officers later vis-

ited the house where the gruesome killing took place and also talked with the locals.

Meanwhile, law enforcers detained Badar Uddin, uncle of Jahangir and an accused in the case, from Kaliakair upazila in Gazipur last night. With Badar, the number of arrestees in the murder case rose to nine till yesterday. The case was filed by Hasna's brother Mofazzal Hossain against 10 people with Mirzapur Police Station.

Hasna Begum, 35, along with her three daughters Monira Akter, 14, Meem Akter, 10, and Molly Akter, 7, were burnt alive when miscreants set fire to their house at Dakkhin Sohagpara village under Mirzapur upazila in Tangail on Tuesday.

The tragic incident happened as Monira, the eldest daughter of Mozibor, refused to marry Jahangir, 25, to whom she was engaged three years ago, relatives and neighbours said.

The project -- sponsored by German data analytics firm Exasol -was suggested by readers of The Register and goes by the grand title "Low Orbit Helium Assisted Navigator", or LOHAN for short.

It took 30 committed teammembers, including doctorate aeronautical engineers, four years to

build the rocket. The biggest challenge, according to Haines, was getting the standard hobbyist rocket motor to fire at high altitudes.

The team said it will launch the rocket from Spaceport America, the home of Virgin Galactic in New Mexico, later this year, after securing the £15,000 (\$24,000, 19,000 euros) needed for lift-off on crowdfunding

site Kickstarter. A huge helium balloon will lift the rocket 20,000 metres (65,600 feet) into the stratosphere, at which point the onboard GPS will ignite the engine, catapulting it to speeds of around 1,000 miles (1,610 kilometres)

per hour. The three-kilogramme rocket, which cost £6,000 to print, will then use an onboard autopilot to guide it back to Earth, all captured by an

onboard video camera. Haines explained how 3D printing's main advantage was in speeding up the process of refining prototypes, requiring only a tweak to the computer-aided design (CAD) plans

Asked why Mamun hasn't been arrested yet, Assistant Commissioner (Pallabi zone) Kamal Hossain of Dhaka Metropolitan Police said the accused could not be traced.

Quoting Laboni, he said Mamun and his gang mugged a cell phone from her husband couple of days ago. However, while talking to police,

Laboni denied the stalking incident, Kamal said. The girl might have done this fear-

ing further harassment as the culprits are dreaded in the area for their ruthlessness, said a DMP official wishing anonymity. Muhammad Golam Nabi Sheikh,

officer-in-charge (investigation) of Bhashantek Police Station, yesterday said they were looking into the
