Oscar hopefuls for foreign film unveiled



A record 83 countries have submitted titles for next year's foreign language film Oscar - seven more than 2014's previous record number. The entries include four countries -Kosovo, Malta, Mauritania and Panama - that have not submitted a film before.

Notable titles include Turkish entrant "Winter's Sleep", Palme d'Or winner at this year's Cannes Film Festival.


Belgian siblings Jean-Pierre and Luc Dardenne are among the high-profile directors to have had their films submitted by their country's national film body. The Philippines' submis-

sion - "Norte, the End of History" is an epic drama partly inspired by Dostoevsky's Crime and Punishment. The 83 titles will be

narrowed down in January to a shortlist of nine, from which five nominees will be selected for the 2015 award.

For the first time the award will have the winning director as well as the submitting country engraved upon it, following an amendment to the Academy's rules.

## Dance away your blues

"Essence of Nature" held at AFD

NS Chowdhury Dancy has an affinity for working on metal and portraying women. She did this in her home so she did not have to travel to a kiln. Her solo exhibition "Essence of Nature" ended recently at the Alliance Francaise de Dhaka (AFD) Gallery.

There is a woman's visage in the first entrée. Her body is diminutive, and she is surrounded by stars. She has an elongated mouth, which is only partly visible -- as is the case on many modern representations. The entire piece is fashioned of brass, shaded by the artist in places to give it the appearance of bronze.

In the second work is a subtle display of jewellery. The anchal of the sari is suggested, and her face and her curly hair are like that of dancing women. The work is carved from brass and shaded in parts like bronze.

There is another brass sculpture which idealises the dancing girl. Here she dons earrings and hair embellishments.

We are confronted with the figure of a belly dancer with jewellery. We also find a collection of flowers on three panels. The display of flowers done in panels on the walls fresco -- with different colours ranging from aquamarine blue -- to lend the flowers an aquatic effect -- to bright carmine and beige ones are exotic and unique.

The large scale display is a commentary on the harmony of nature and its manifold beauties. There are three leaves and spindly growth, an effect achieved by twisting of materials, in white, blue and black.

Images appear like frozen, preserved flowers. It has suggestions of sculpture on the walls of AFD.

Dancy said she learned her work technique from a student of the Faculty Fine Arts, DU. "I used the base of brass. The copper effect was obtained by burning the metals with acid. The effort was to present various ornate ornaments like the 'nath', tiara, necklace etc. The 'bichha' is used by the belly dancer too. My other media is flowers. I like flowers immensely as they allows for many variations and colours. The metal pieces took seven days. The tools are in my collection at home," she said. "Seated in one place, I can complete my work with the help of these tools. My entire home is used for this purpose. In the wall frescoes, there is smashed acrylic paper and gum. The thickness is obtained by applying layers of the medium. These are murals or frescos. The flowers have been done in an abstract way. The faces too follow an abstract form. Each work of flowers takes at least 20 days to complete and the metal pieces take a week each."


