The Bangladesh national U-16 women's team are confident about fighting till the end in the AFC U-16

Women's Championship Qualifiers, which get underway from Wednesday at the Bangabandhu National Stadium.

Bangladesh have been drawn in Group B along with Jordan, Iran, India and United Arab Emirates from where top two teams will progress to the final round to be held in China in 2015.

The U-16 girls, nine of whom have experience of playing international matches at the U-14 level, have been training for the last 50 days under coach Golam Rabbani Choton. The girls have played six practice matches against Narayanganj district women's team and the national women's team, winning four of those -- two each against Narayanganj and the national team.

#### Ind-WI third ODI called off

The third ODI between India and West Indies on October 14 in Visakhapatnam has already been abandoned because of a cyclone on the country's east coast. The game will not be rescheduled and the series is now a four-

## Australia take series 3-0

#### Win third and final ODI in dramatic fashion

Glenn Maxwell bowled a maiden final over and got two wickets to seal a thrilling onerun win for Australia in the third and final one-day international against Pakistan in

Abu Dhabi on Sunday.

Chasing a modest 232-run target, Pakistan needed just two runs in the final over but Maxwell (2-41) kept his cool dismissing Sohail Tanvir (10) with the second ball of the 50th over and Mohammad Irfan (nought) with the final ball to complete Australia's 3-0 series whitewash.

It was Australia's third clean sweep against Pakistan after a 3-0 win in Pakistan in 1998 and a 5-0 triumph on home ground four years ago.

Pakistan once again lived up to their reputation of throwing away a winning position as they needed just 28 runs to win with four wickets in hand at one stage.

Tanvir and Zulfiqar Babar (14 not out) took them to within two runs of the win but Australia staged a strong comeback.

For Pakistan, Asad Shafiq hit a solid 50

while Sohaib Maqsood made 34.

Pakistan were without captain Misbah-ul-Haq who surprisingly dropped himself after a poor run of scores, handing the captaincy to Shahid Afridi.

With the series already in the bag,

Australia rested paceman Mitchell Johnson and off-spinner Nathan Lyon who shared nine wickets in the first two matches. That significantly weakened the bowling

attack as Pakistan raced to a solid 56-run start with Ahmed Shahzad (26) and Sarfraz Ahmed (32) batting with confidence. But left-arm spinner Xavier Doherty pro-

vided Australia with a breakthrough when he bowled Shahzad with his first delivery.

Both teams now play a two-match Test series with the first starting in Dubai from October 22.

#### ICC rejects **BCB** claims

The International Cricket Council yesterday rejected claims that the ICC's report on off-spinner Shohag Gazi's bowling action, sent to the Bangladesh Cricket Board (BCB), contained incorrect images.

In a press release the ICC stated, "The International Cricket Council (ICC) today rejected claims in a section of the media that the report on the bowling action of Bangladesh's Shohag Gazi contained an image of another Bangladesh player.

"The ICC clarified that the report of Shohag's bowling action, which was sent to the Bangladesh Cricket Board earlier this week, contains only photographs of Shohag," it added.

On Saturday, a number of BCB officials told The Daily Star that the ICC report contained a photograph of Mahmudullah Riyad's bowling action. The officials however were satisfied with the ICC's findings and described the inclusion of Riyad's photo as minor mistake.

The officials, upon being contacted again yesterday, stood by their claims. They however are awaiting the return of BCB CEO -- who is in Dubai -- before making any official statement.

## Tk 14-crore budget estimated

The Bangladesh Olympic Association (BOA) has estimated a budget of Tk 14 crore for training purpose ahead of next's year South Asian (SA) Games. The budget will be submitted to the National Sports Council (NSC) for the fiscal of 2014-15.

The 12nd SA Games is supposed to take place in India in the latter part of 2015, after a gap of four years as the last edition was held in Dhaka.

"We have made a draft estimation of Tk 14 crore, which might increase or decrease finally, depending on the number of athletes from 28 disciplines selected for training," said training and development availability of NSC's training fund. committee's member secretary wing commander Rafiqul Islam after a meeting yesterday.

Bangladesh participated in 23

disciplines in the 11th edition of SA Games but in recent past, the BOA has excluded a number of disciplines including athletics and swimming from the Asian Games contingent following poor performance of athletes in the Commonwealth Games. However, the BOA has assured that they would accommodate as many disciplines as possible in the regional extravaganza.

Rafiqul hinted that the number of athletes might be around 550 and they intended to increase facilities for athletes as well as team officials during the long-term training. He also added that they would start training in the early part of December, subject to the

## Fed Shanghai Master

Roger Federer edged a resilient Gilles Simon of France 7-6 (8/6), 7-6 (7/2) to win the Shanghai Masters and claim the 81st title of his career on Sunday.

The 17-time Grand Slam winner had blown away world number one Novak Djokovic in the semifinals but he found a stubborn opponent in Simon at Shanghai's Qizhong Tennis Center.

And the 33-year-old needed two tiebreaks before dousing Simon to making it back-to-back Masters victories following his win in Cincinnati in August.

The Swiss veteran started poorly against 29th-ranked Simon's confrontational baseline play and he lost his serve in the very first game.

Federer changed tactics midway through the first set, tentatively approaching the net in a bid to regain the initiative.

with power when Federer was in a forward position and forcing him to reconsider the tactic. Shouts of "Come on Roger" were being

drowned out by "Allez Gilles!" as the crowd sensed an upset could be on the cards. But as Simon served for the set at 5-4, Federer broke back and he was in the ascen-

dancy as he earned two break points in Simon's next service game. However, he lost the first by dragging his shot too far to his opponent's right, and the second when Simon bravely met

him at the net. The pair were evenly matched during a tight tie-break, but Simon finally lost the set as he attempted a serve-volley, allowing Federer pick out a gap to his right.

The players fought to a stalemate in the second set, but Federer's experience showed as he took a firm grip on the decisive tiebreak to win it 7-2 as Simon netted a return.

Federer will now celebrate his 23rd Masters victory as he moves up one place to world number two, displacing Rafael Nadal, But Simon was unfazed, slamming his shots in the new rankings released next week.

### First time in Stosur's career

Big-serving Australian Samantha Stosur retained a title for the first time in her career Sunday with a resounding 7-6, 6-3 victory over Zarina Diyas in the Japan Women's Open final

Top seed Stosur, who has struggled to hit the heights since winning the US Open and reaching a career-high fourth in the world in 2011, was pushed hard in the first set by the fifth-seeded Kazakh, taking it on a tiebreak 9-7.

But Stosur, currently ranked 18th in the world, found her range in the second set to capture her third Japan crown and a sixth singles title on the WTA Tour without dropping a set all week.

## Oscar knows fate today

Disgraced South African track star Oscar Pistorius returns to court on Monday to find out whether he will serve a long stretch behind bars for the negligent killing of his model girlfriend, or walk out a free man.

After a six-month, on-off trial that captivated South Africa, and millions more around the world who admired Pistorius as a symbol of triumph over physical adversity, opinion is starkly divided on the eventual outcome.

A non-custodial sentence would likely spark public anger, fuelling a perception among black South Africans that, 20 years after the end of apartheid, wealthy whites can still secure preferential justice.

The Paralympic and Olympic athlete, whose lower legs were amputated as a baby, was convicted of culpable homicide last month for the Valentine's Day shooting of 29-year-old law graduate Reeva Steenkamp.

Judge Thokozile Masipa cleared the 27-year-old of the more serious charge of murder, saying prosecutors had failed to prove Pistorius' intent to kill when he fired four 9mm rounds through the door of a toilet cubicle, in what he said was the mistaken belief an intruder was lurking behind it.

A murder conviction would have almost certainly carried a jail sentence. Culpable homicide, South Africa's equivalent of manslaughter, can be punished by anything from 15 years in jail to a suspended sentence or community service.

In a front page headline on Friday, South Africa's Times newspaper cited experts saying: 'Oscar won't go to jail'. Conversely, Johannesburg's Star said he was likely to get as many as 10 years behind bars, with a portion suspended.

At the sentencing hearing, Masipa is likely to hear arguments from prosecution and defence, possibly for as long as a day each, and psychological and probation experts before making her ruling.

The decision by 66-year-old Masipa, only the second black woman to rise to South Africa's bench, to absolve Pistorius of murder drew criticism from legal experts and the public in a country infamous for violence, particularly against women.

Briton Lewis Hamilton won the inaugural Russian Grand Prix on Sunday, with his Mercedes team claiming the constructors' championship with three races of the season to go. Hamilton, 29, started from pole

and dominated the field to speed to a 31st GP victory, consolidating his lead atop the drivers' standings from Mercedes teammate Nico Rosberg, who finished second ahead of Finland's Valtteri Bottas, in a Williams.
