Innovate conducive agricultural methods

Experts tell workshop

New agricultural methods should be innovated for higher yield with less water in order to meet the increasing demand for food, experts stressed at a workshop yesterday.

At present, around 75 percent of the groundwater is being used for irrigation which is considered too high for water sustainability, the speakers mentioned at the workshop titled "Innovations for More Food with Less Water" held in the capital.

Expressing concerns on depletion of the groundwater level across the coun-

try due to excess extraction of water for irrigation, the experts further said the available surface water could meet 75 percent of the demand for irrigation, if it is managed systematically.

Experts from Bangladesh, Nepal and India discussed the issue at the regional workshop jointly organised by Bangladesh Water Development Board (BWDB), Japan Fund for Poverty Reduction and Asian Development Bank.

Dr Zafar Ahmed Khan, secretary to the water resources ministry, was the chief guest while Shahidur Rahman, the

director general of the BWDB, chaired it. The country has already undertaken

"The Ganges-Kobadak Irrigation Project" for practising modernised agricultural methods and better management of surface water for irrigation in 95,600 hectares of area.

After reviewing the initial phase, the experts proposed increasing the amount of surface water by upgrading and repairing canals and infrastructures in the project area, improving flow management at territory level, and water allocation on consultations with farmers.

INCONSISTENCIES IN ELECTORAL LAWS EC plans amendments

The Election Commission plans to amend some electoral laws concerning different local government bodies to ensure consistency in the rules. "There are some inconsistencies in the rules regarding

elections to local government bodies-- city corporation upazila, municipality and union parishad. We want to review these rules to remove the inconsistencies," Election Commissioner Shah Nawaz told The Daily Star yesterday. "For example, there are different penalties ranging from

two years to seven years in jail for violating the same electoral law in elections to different local bodies. We want to make the penalty same for the same offence regardless of which local government election it is," he said. Currently, restrictions on vehicular movement and elec-

toral campaign are imposed 48 hours prior to voting in some elections, while 32 hours before in other elections, the commissioner added. The issue was discussed in yesterday's meeting, he said,

adding, "We have asked our officials concerned to prepare a draft and place it before the commission in the next meeting."

'CONTEMPT OF COURT'

David Bergman rescheduled for Dec 1

The International Crimes Tribunal-2 yesterday rescheduled for December 1 to pass verdict on the contempt of court proceedings against David Bergman, a Dhakabased British journalist, for allegedly demeaning the court through his blogposts.

The three-member tribunal led by Justice Obaidul Hassan with members Justice Md Mozibur Rahman Miah and Justice Md Shahinur Islam reasoned that they could not complete preparations.

The tribunal on September 4 had fixed yesterday's date after completing hearing arguments of lawyers of both the petitioner and the defendant.

The tribunal started the proceedings on April 17 after finding "prima facie elements of contempt" in his three write-ups posted in his personal blog in November 2011 and January 2013. Supreme Court lawyer

Abul Kalam Azad filed the contempt petition on February 18, saying Bergman made relentless efforts to justify that the tribunal was absolutely wrong in mentioning that three million people were killed and 200,000 women raped during the Liberation War in 1971. In his submission on

August 25 and September 4, Bergman's counsel Mustafizur Rahman Khan, however, said the write-ups were "definitely critical" but fell under the parameters of permissible fair criticism and had been made "bona fide and in good faith".

If found guilty, Bergman, the editor (special reports) of the English daily New Age, may face highest one year's imprisonment or fined up to Tk 5,000 or both.

Says Prof Sue Gronewold of Kean University

Truth-telling and justice are not enough to obtain closure for the trauma of genocide, rather reconciliation or coming to terms with what had happened through forgiveness should be the ultimate goal, said a US history professor yesterday.

Prof Sue Gronewold, who also teaches master's programmes on holocaust and genocide studies at Kean University, stressed the importance of reconciliation at a lecture, "Justice for Genocidal Crime", at Liberation War Museum in the capital's Segunbagicha.

She gave examples of the Cambodian trial where people spoke of their victimisation and suffering before the perpetrators and reached some kind of closure.

However, in reply to questions from Barrister Tureen Afroze,
