G4S VAULT LOOTING
Looter held

Rapid Action Battalion members yesterday arrested the man who they claimed has confessed to looting Tk 3 crore from the vault of G4S, a security service company, in Chittagong city.

The arrestee is Shahidul Haque alias Shanta, 24, of Narsingdi.

Tk 3 crore was looted from the G4S vault early Sunday. CCTV footage showed a masked man taking the money out of the vault with a duplicate key, said police.

Shahidul was working as a security guard at the office of G4S in the port city, said Md Sohel Mahmud, an assistant director of Rab-7.

A Rab-7 team arrested Shahidul in Khulshi area of the port city around 7:00am, he said.

Sohel Mahmud said in primary interrogation, Shahidul admitted that he was the masked man that looted the vault and then kept the money with his associate Bashirul Alam, a muezzin.

Woman dies 24 days after being set ablaze by husband

A woman allegedly set on fire by her husband died at Dhaka Medical College Hospital on Tuesday night after fighting for her life for 24 days.

The deceased was Ratna Akter, 22, of Gazipur city.

Quoting the deceased's family members, Sub-inspector Iqrarul Haque of Pubile Police Outpost under Joydebpur Police Station said on September 21, Rubel, Ratna's husband, doused Ratna in kerosene and set her on fire after an altercation regarding dowry at their home in Bindan Badurtala of Gazipur city.

Opportunities evade blind children

Visually impaired children get little opportunity to realise their potentials as there is still little awareness about the rights of people with blindness, according to visually impaired students yesterday.

They said this was the reason why families were reluctant to invest in education of blind children.

They were addressing an event organised by the Department of Social Welfare at its office in the capital to accord reception to 48 visually impaired students who scored GPA 5 in primary, junior and secondary school examinations.

The programme, organised in observance of World White Cane Safety Day, also featured discussion by activists who work for the rights of people with disabilities.

"I was lucky to have the opportunity to study. But there are many others out there who never get a chance to improve their lives," said Raju Hossain, a student of class nine who came from Rangpur to attend the event.

Commenting on lack of awareness in rural areas, Rakib, a student from Barisal, said, "I know parents in villages who would not even admit that they have children with disabilities, let alone send them to schools."

The students added that more Braille books are needed to teach visually impaired students.

Another witness backs allegations against Jabbar

Subhan's war crimes case set to hear closing arguments

One more prosecution witness yesterday corroborated testimonies of some previous witnesses that war crimes accused and former Jatiya Party lawmaker Abdul Jabbar's accomplices forcibly converted around 200 Hindus, including himself, to Islam in Pirojpur in May 1971.

Another war crimes case against Jamaat-e-Islami leader Abdus Subhan is set to enter the final stage as International Crimes Tribunal-2 yesterday fixed November 2 for hearing the closing arguments. Subsequently, the tribunal will either keep the case waiting for a verdict or set a date to that end.

The 12th prosecution witness, Dilip Kumar Paik, 60, said Jabbar along with his accomplices and the Pakistani occupation army led a massacre at Pirojpur's Phuljhuri village and set houses on fire on May 17, 1971.

"On Jabbar's direction the Pakistani army shot dead my cousin Sarda Kanta Paik

while he was fleeing for his life," said Dilip, stating that he had seen it from the distance.

About eight to 10 days later, Dilip said he and his father Kumud Bandhu Paik, who had contested in the 1970 provincial election from Mathbaria constituency, boarded a boat aiming to reach Telikhali and save their lives.

En route they were caught at Chhapa Bazar around 10:30am by Hossain Kerani, leader of a local peace committee, an auxiliary force of the Pakistani occupation army, who then informed Jabbar, he added.

Overhearing discussions of local Razakars, he said to have understood that Jabbar had instructed Razakars to first give them proposal to convert to Islam "if they wanted to live" otherwise threaten to hand them over to the Pakistani occupation army.

"We gave silent consent to save our lives," he said, adding that they were later taken near their Phuljhuri village home where the

"FORGING FREEDOM FIGHTERS' CERTIFICATES"
ACC summons 3 Muktijoddha Sangsad officials

The Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) yesterday summoned three elected officials of Bangladesh Muktijoddha Sangsad, including Wahidur Rahman, chief engineer of Local Government Engineering Department, over allegations that they resorted to forgery in obtaining freedom fighter certificates.

Wahidur, a vice-chairman of the sangsad's central command council, was summoned on October 21 while SM Mortuja Hossain, another vice-chairman, and Mahabubul Haque Chisty alias Babul Chisty, secretariat member, on October 23.

The inquiry officer, Farid Ahmed Patwari, also an ACC deputy director, told journalists that they launched the investigation against the trio early last month.

The ACC move came following a report titled "Bought out! Fake freedom fighters, war crimes suspect to 'ensure welfare of war heroes'" published in The Daily Star on June 16.

The report stated that Wahidur and Mortuja, who have
