Living in danger

37 police and Ansar members at risk in run-down outpost

Constable Sirajul Islam was covering a portion of the ceiling over his bed with a piece of rexine in his shabby room at Lalbagh Police Outpost barracks.

The ramshackle two-storey building has innumerable cracks, and in some places, bricks have come off the walls, creating large holes. So when he was hammering nails into the walls, it seemed the little force would be enough to make them collapse.

When cautioned against the possible danger, Sirajul said plaster was peeling off the walls and his sleep was disrupted when pieces of plaster fell on him.

"What shall we do? We have to live here,

"I pinned this polythene sheet under the ceiling a couple of weeks ago. Returning from duty this morning, I found that it was torn apart as several pieces of plaster pierced it," Sirajul said, pointing at a thin black sheet of blanketsize polythene.

His colleague with whom he shares the room on the first floor of the British era building shifted here after a large crack had appeared in his previous room. "I never stayed in such a risky ambiance in

my 26-year career in the police department," continued the constable who moved to the room three months back.

Cuba to work with US against Ebola

Cuba stands ready to cooperate with the United States in the battle against: humanitar-Ebola, former leader Fidel Castro said in an article published Saturday.

Cuba is sending about 460 doctors and nurses to West Africa to help fight: Ebola, an effort that was praised on Friday by US Secretary of State John Kerry.

The US is sending hundreds of soldiers to set up clinics and train health care workers and it also has sent officials from the Centres for Disease Control to help in training.

"With pleasure we will cooperate with US personnel in that task," the 88year-old ex-leader wrote in the Communist Party daily Granma. He said it would not be to seek peace between two countries long at odds, but "for the . peace of the world."

Castro did not say what form cooperation might take.



DMP to crack down on illegal foreigners

Law enforcers are going to launch a crackdown on foreigners staying illegally in Bangladesh following reports of involvement of some of them in criminal activities.

"We are making a list of foreigners staying illegally in the country and will raid flats and hotels soon," Monirul Islam, joint commissioner of Detective Branch of Police told reporters at the media centre of Dhaka Metropolitan Police in the capital.


Action would be taken against owners of

hotels and houses if they rent out rooms or flats to any foreigner without valid documents, Monirul said.

The move comes about two weeks after O-level student Zubair Ahmed was murdered, allegedly by an Algerian national.

Abuubaida Kadir, prime accused in the murder of the 16-year-old boy, has been living illegally in the country for more than a decade, say detectives.

Addict kills parents

Shot by cops, beaten to death by villagers while fleeing

After being shot by police, an alleged drug addict was lynched by locals, barely an hour after he stabbed his parents to death at Niltek village under Singair upazila of Manikganj yesterday morning.

The dead are Saidur Rahman, 30, his father Mohiuddin Pramanik, 60, a

rickshaw-puller, and his wife Shufia Khatun, 50.

Rickshaw-puller Saidur got involved in an altercation with his father around 10:30am over distribution of property, said AMM Kamrul Islam, assistant superintendent of police of Manikganj Sadar Circle, quoting locals. At one point, Saidur attacked Mohiuddin with a sharp kitchen knife and

killed him on the spot, Kamrul said, adding the 'drug addict' also hacked Shufia to death as she tried to save her husband. Later, the alleged killer locked himself inside a room of the house with his one and a half years old nephew Hossain when locals rushed to the spot hear-

ing the hue and cry. On information, police went to the spot
