Shibir banned at DU

Says Vice Chancellor AAMS Arefin Siddique following detainment of eight suspected activists

Police detained eight Dhaka University students yesterday for their alleged involvement in Islami Chhatra Shibir, whose activities, Vice Chancellor Prof AAMS Arefin Siddique says, has been banned on the campus since the post-Liberation War period.

The ban came into force as the pro-Jamaat-e-Islami student organisation played a pioneering role in killing DU students and teachers during the Liberation War in 1971, he told The Daily Star.

Sources said Ruhul of first year, Shimul Hossain, Humayun and Alauddin of second year; Morshedul and Wadul of third year; and Masud Rana and Md Sohel of fourth year were detained from Sir AF Rahman Hall where they all used to reside.

DU acting proctor Prof Amzad Ali also stated that Shibir was banned on the campus and the eight were "involved in antidisciplinary activities on the campus". The proctor handed over the students and till 8:30pm, no

decision was taken on whether to release or place them before a court, said Shahbagh police. Some Bangladesh Chhatra League activists loyal to the hall unit Secretary Ruhul Amin took them to the latter's

room and later handed them over to police. Ruhul said the students were recruiting activists at the hall for long to create unrest on the campus.

"We checked their phone call lists which showed that they maintained contacts with top Shibir leaders...they admitted their involvement. Later police took them from the hall," he added.

RECRUITING NEW PRY SCHOOL ASST TEACHERS

HC stays govt circular

The High Court on Sunday stayed the effectiveness of a government circular for fresh recruitment of assistant teachers to primary schools.

In response to a writ petition, the court also issued a rule upon the government to explain why the circular for recruiting new teachers without completing recruitments of previous candidates from the waiting list should not be declared illegal.

A total of 52 candidates, who were in the waiting list published after a recruitment test held in 2011, yesterday filed the writ petition.

The court also asked the government to explain why it should not be directed to appoint the writ petitioners, advocate Sk Md Morshed told The Daily Star.

Based on the result published in 2012, the government recruited 12,701 candidates and kept 15, 019 others in the waiting list and issued a circular in March 2013 saying that the candidates of that list will be recruited in phases, Morshed said citing from the petition.

But the primary education department issued the recent circular on September 14 asking for applications from fresh candidates, he added.
