



Indigenous fishes now dear as most are disappearing

Fishes of indigenous species are selling at high rates because of their high demand in the local markets.

Many of these fishes are about to be extinct because of which many kids today know them in their names only, elderly locals said.

Just a few years back, LaMonirhat people could taste the indigenous fishes like sheatfish, carp, anabas, catfish, striped snakehead, chital, rui, barbel, kakila, soborna, giant snakehead, flatfish, bele, meni, tengra, and many other species.

Fish traders at the district's biggest fish market, Goshala Bazar, in the town said, now one kg of any local species fish is being sold at Tk 600 to 1500. Only two years ago, those were sold at Tk 250 to 300, they said.

Indigenous fishes are gradually going beyond the purchase capacity of the general people they said, adding today rich people can only buy these fishes.

"I have purchased half of kg of meni fish for Tk 400 from the local market on Saturday. I bought the fish at high rate as they are becoming very rare in the market," said Mahidul Islam Sarker of Thana Road in the town.

Jahidur Rahman, a jewellery shop owner at Baniapatti in the town, said he purchased two kgs of barbel fish at Tk

2900 on Sunday morning.

"I had been searching the fish for the last one month, and I got it finally," he said.

Ranjit Kumar Das, a fish trader at Goshala Bazar, said he often gets advance payment from many people for delivering local species fishes.

"Only 4 to 5 percent of fishes in the entire fish market is of indigenous origin while the rest are *chalani* (cultivated) fishes," he said.

Elderly fishermen Sujit Kumar Das, Ramoni Das, Manoranjan Das and many others at Majhipara village of Sarpukur union in Aditmara upazila told this correspondent that there were no 'shelter' for indigenous fishes now as most govt water bodies leased out for fish farming.

The lessees cultivate *chalani* fishes in the water bodies for high profit, they said.

Besides, due to climate change, majority of natural water bodies have dried up causing scarcity of local species fishes, they added.

District Fishery Officer (DFO) in LaMonirhat, Dr Abul Hasanat, remarked that time might come when people would only hear the names of different local species fishes but they cannot see those.

Climate change, use of toxic insecticides are the major reasons behind the extinction of indigenous fishes, he said.

SEQUEL TO CLASHES IN BHOLA Transport strike demanding ban on illegal 3-wheelers

Bus and motor owners and workers in the district have enforced an indefinite strike on 13 routes of the district, demanding punishment of culprits who attacked and injured bus workers and damaged vehicles in Charfassion upazila on Wednesday afternoon.

The strike began on Wednesday evening immediately after a decision at an emergency meeting of the bus owners and workers at 6.00pm in the district town.

Road communications of the district with other parts of the country came to a halt due to the strike on 13 routes, causing untold sufferings to the passengers.

Bhola Bus Owner's Association general secretary Abul Kalam said, they will continue their strike until their demand was met.

District Motor Workers Union and Bus Owners Association also demanded a ban on plying of shallow engine-run vehicles including locally-made Nasimon, Karimon, Bhotvoti and battery run auto rickshaws on the routes.

Md Shafikul Islam, organising secretary of Bhola Bus Owners Association claimed that a

group of easy bike drivers attacked the bus workers over a trivial matter on Wednesday afternoon and injured 15 in Charfassion. They also vandalized buses there.

The agitating workers handed over a memorandum to the Deputy Commissioner of Bhola, Md Selim Reza, also demanding arrest of the accused bike drivers.

Earlier on Wednesday, a clash took place at Charfassion Bus Stand of the district at around 12 noon after a bus of Charfassion-Aicha route hit an easy bike in Sadar Road area.

According to locals, the accident was not so serious but the easy bike drivers gathered after the incident and attacked the bus workers there with sticks.

After an hour, the bus workers assembled and attacked on shallow engine-run vehicles and the sporadic clash continued till afternoon. Police rushed to the spot and tried to control the situation as the clash spread from Sadar Road to Thana Road.

At least 25 from both sides were injured in the clash.
