Dhaka, Washington agree to fight terrorism, extremism

Dhaka and Washington have expressed deep commitment in continuing to cooperate to counter terrorist financing and violent extremism. The US embassy in Dhaka and the

State Department, in collaboration with the Bangladesh government, will host a South Asia regional workshop in December to focus on best practices to counter terrorist financing and extremism.

It will be held as a part of the glob-

ally recognised Financial Action Task Force (FATF) framework, according to a joint statement issued on conclusion of the two-day Third US-Bangladesh Partnership Dialogue at the State Department in Washington DC on October 29.

Shahidul Haque led a nine-member delegation at the dialogue, and the US Delegation was led by US Under-Secretary of State for Political Affairs Wendy Sherman.

The US acknowledged the presence of a vibrant civil society in Bangladesh, and both nations discussed ways to protect the important work of civil society along with broader citizens' rights and fundamental freedom.

Women's reserved seats elections in December

The Election Commission will hold elections to the reserved seats for women in more than 350 upazila parishads across the country in December.

"The commissioners have decided to hold the elections. But the schedule is yet to be finalised," an assistant secretary of the EC told The Daily Star yesterday.

According to the Upazila Parishad Act 1998, the number of seats equal to onethird the number of union parishads or municipalities located in an upazila will be reserved for women who will be appointed as member of that particular upazila parishad.

Out of 487 upazilas, elections to 472 of them across the country were held in different phases from February 19 to May 19. Until elections to the seats reserved for women are held, formation of upazila parishads will remain unfinished as the elected women are entitled to act as members of the parishads.

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Rab official admits link to N'ganj seven murders



Fruits itself produces natural toxins such as- allergens, mycotoxins (aflatoxins) and accidentally detergents and sanitizer may get introduced due to improper dosing. Poisonous calcium carbide and hormones are used to ripen fruits (Mango, Jackfruit and litchi) and formalin is being used as preservative. Toxic metal arsenic, lead may be found in fruits because of it's presence in soil and deep water. Vulnerable people are (Young children below five and elderly people over 65, pregnant women, organ transplant patients) commonly affected. Vomiting, nausea, stomachache, cramp and swollen throat and mouth, Body rashes are immediate effects and long run effect are cancer, skin disease, and organs failure (liver, kidney).

Prevention:

 Good agricultural practices (GAP) – Good post harvest management, safe level of permitted chemi cals, Integrated Pest Management, Good manufac turing practices, Good handling practices.



- Food retailer purchases fresh fruits/pre-packed salads from approved suppliers.
- Be aware and do not purchase out of season and unusually colored fruits.
- Soak fruits into drinking water and vinegar solution for 30-40mint.
- Wise to remove thin skin before consuming. ■ Foreign fruits must be quarantined and chemically
- tested before getting port entry.

Strong monitoring by the enforcement authority.

Microorganisms may be present in fruits or get into fruits and manure, untreated irrigation water, equipment, vehicle; people are the common source of contamination. Cyclospora, Hepatitis A, Norovirus, Salmonella spp, Shigella spp and moulds and yeasts are common microorganisms associated with fruits. Sometimes fruit's (internal injury or bruise) appearance looks good due to presence of insufficient microbes which prevent fruits decay but enough to cause toxic infections in human body. Food borne illness is caused by the toxins either produced by the

- microbes or microbes itself present in the food. Good agricultural practices (GAP).
- Ignore and do not purchase bruised or injurious
- fruits to prevent multiplication of microbes ■ Soak and wash with clean water first and treat with chlorinated water with appropriate dose and contact time and rinse before consuming.
- Maintain good personal hygiene including hand washing to prevent microbial contamination.
- Once fruits are stored in the chiller never display or keep outside the chiller in order to prevent shrink age due to moisture loss.
- Store fruits in the refrigerator at or below 8°c to keep fresh for longer period and slow microbial multi plication.
