Says home boss UNB, Dhaka

State Minister for Home Asaduzzaman Khan yesterday said stern actions would be taken if anyone tried to destabilise the country and engage in the acts of destruction anywhere over the pronouncement of International Crimes Tribunal's judgment today on war crimes accused Mir Quasem Ali, a top Jamaate-Islami leader.

Talking to the news agency, the minister said additional police personnel along with members of Border Guard Bangladesh and Rapid Action Battalion would be deployed at different points in the capital because of Jamaat's two-day hartal beginning today.

Although there was no violence during Thursday's hartal by Jamaat in protest against awarding the capital punishment to Jamaat chief Motiur Rahman Nizami for war crimes, the law enforcers will remain vigilant to protect people's lives and properties, he added.

# PM for cooperatives' role to reduce rich-poor gap

Voicing concern at the growing urban-rural income inequalities, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday called for further strengthening the cooperative movement to reduce the gap between the rich and the poor in the country

"Only the cooperative movement can improve money circulation in rural areas and thus help reduce the gap," she said, addressing the inaugural function of the 43rd National Cooperatives Day at Bangabandhu International Conference Centre in the capital.

Hasina laid emphasis on bringing further momentum in the cooperative movement, saying that now the time had come to involve cooperatives in the mainstream of development with a well thought-out plan.

Referring to the high-rises in urban areas decorated with imported furniture and lightings, she said many people of the country had nowhere to take shelter. "They've to live inhuman lives by the roads and railways. Why should there be such differences in society... we have to remove those."

The prime minister said money circulation in rural areas had to be increased to strengthen the backbone of the rural economy. "We've to create opportunities in rural areas so that the villagers could market their products and produce at fair prices, and that could be done through the cooperative movement." Recalling the contributions of

Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman in the development of the cooperative movement, Hasina said the father of the nation had given constitutional recognition to cooperatives that organised people enabling them to solve problems in a coordinated manner.

She said that after coming to power in 1996, her government had started undertaking various cooperatives-based measures for the welfare of people, including Asrayan Project, and

## People must rise to change democratic culture

"In 1971, we saw the culture of forced disappearances. Recently, it has come back in our country. This means we have achieved freedom but repression and torture are still there... We must change the situation," he added.

Noted jurist Dr Kamal Hossain said the goal of democracy was to establish people's rights, and tolerance was a key component of it, but both were absent in the country. Historically, Bangalees did not brook

## 22,300 Yaba tablets seized in Ctg, 2 held

Rapid Action Battalion detained two persons with 22,300 Yaba tablets worth around Tk 90 lakh at Kalamiah Bazar in Chittagong city early yesterday.

The detainees are Abul Kalam, 45, and Abdur Rahman, 27, both hailing from Teknaf in Cox's Bazar.

A Rab team held them at a house in the area around 3:30am, said ASP Shaheda Sultana, assistant director (media) of Rab-7. Cash worth Tk 7.66 lakh

was also seized from their possession, she said. During primary interro-

gation, the duo admitted that they had been involved in Yaba trade in the city for around two years, she said, adding that the tablets were taken from Teknaf.
