# 'Always had faith in spinners'

As soon as Billy Bowden raised his finger and indicated the end of

Zimbabwe's innings, Bangladesh captain Mushfigur Rahim erupted. Seconds later, he plucked the stumps and blindly swung one in the air which mildly scraped closein fielder Shuvagata Hom, who luckily was wearing a helmet. Shuvagata for his part brushed aside Mushfigur, who briefly stopped his celebrations to enquire on the player, and rejoined the fun.

It was Bangladesh's first series win in a traumatic year and anybody watching the hosts' celebrations on screen could have easily understood what it meant to them.

In contrast to their plans, the Tigers made a slow start yesterday morning. For a moment it seemed as though the Tigers would end up losing a good number of overs in their pursuit of reaching a 'safe score'. Eventually the visitors were set a target of 314 and Bangladesh's bowlers had 68 overs to play with.

"We wanted to reach a safe position since there was not much support from the pitch [for the bowlers]. It could have been good

It could have been good had we given them 75 overs. But I had the faith in Shakib [Al Hasan], Taijul [Islam] and Likhon [Jubair Hossain] because I knew that anything was possible if they bowled in the right area.

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bowled in the right area.

"I think the wickets we got before the lunch break helped us a lot to win this match," said Mushfigur in the post-match press briefing yesterday, adding that the Tigers never thought that the match could end as a draw.

Despite the excitement Mushfigur, as he usually does, calmed down midway through the press conference and resorted to speaking on his favourite subject: the 'processes' of the game.

"There are still some areas where we should improve ourselves. Next we have matches against big teams, so it would be

fantastic if we can finish 2014 on a winning note. We are happy with the 2-0 lead. If we can keep this process on then we can achieve our expected rankings.

"It's more difficult to maintain our rankings than just reaching the position. So rather than thinking too much on rankings, it's better to focus on our own improvement," reckoned Mushfigur.

He further stated that he was especially happy with his spinners since the wicket did not support them as much. "They had to work hard in all the five days to earn their wickets," the captain con-

Ace golfer Siddikur Rahman stayed in contention for a third Asian Tour title after racing into the joint third position of the Panasonic Open India with a five-under (67) in the second round yesterday. The 29-year-old-golfer, back in action after being sidelined for five months with a back-strain, fired two eagles and two birdies against a single bogey at the Delhi Golf Club yesterday to take his overall tally to seven-under (137). That put him in jointly in third position, three shots behind leader Rahil Gangjee of India and two shots adrift of Australia's Wade Ormsby.

Meanwhile, Siddikur's compatriot Jamal Hossain Mollah, who had started the day in joint second position with a four-under (68) in the first round, slipped to joint 24th position after a horrid threeover (75) in the second round yesterday.
