Eye on \$50b

Exporters vow to fix safety flaws as they plan to take the garment industry to next level

Garment exporters are aiming to bring in \$50 billion a year by 2021, provided that safety concerns would be eliminated, weak infrastructure improved and labour unrest gone.

The sector, considered the lifeline of the economy, has grown in the last few decades, as far as "backward linkage" is concerned, but falls short on "forward linkage", said Atiqul Islam, president of Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association (BGMEA).

"Bangladesh will have to go for product diversification and innovation," he

Quoting a McKinsey report, the

BGMEA chief said the country would have to develop skilled human resources, ensure adequate power supply, develop ports, improve work conditions and ensure healthy politics to take the garment sector to new heights.

"If we can overcome these problems, we will be able to do anything," he said.

The garment makers were speaking at "Roundtable on Export Challenges and the Way Forward" organised by The Daily Star yesterday.

Bangladesh would have to upgrade the existing ports and set up a deep sea port so that two-way flow of containers could be handled and it is needed to earn \$50 billion a year from garment exports,

Burdwan Blast Prime accused captured

Reuters reports arrest of woman 'out to kill Hasina' STAR REPORT

In a major development in the Burdwan blast probe, West Bengal police yesterday arrested main accused Sajid, stated to be a Bangladeshi national and the chief of the Burdwan module of banned Islamist outfit Jama'atul Mujahideen Bangladesh (JMB). The 40-year-old was captured near

Kolkata airport around 2:40pm Indian time. Hailing from Narayanganj, he has been absconding since the October 2 blast that left two suspected JMB members dead and another injured.

Sajid was handed over to the National Investigation Agency (NIA) of India. The authorities had announced a cash award of Rs 10 lakh for information leading to his capture.

Meanwhile, Assam police yesterday arrested a 36-year-old woman for plotting assassination of Bangladesh Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, reports Reuters.

Sajid is the first Bangladeshi arrested in the case. Earlier, at least nine people, three from Burdwan and six from Assam, were picked up by law enforcers.

"Today we arrested a person, Sheikh Rahamatullah. He is a Bangladeshi. After interrogation, it was revealed that he is Sajid. He is involved in the Burdwan blast and is the chief of Burdwan module," Bidhannagar Police Commissioner Rajeev Kumar told reporters in Kolkata.

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China presses on with Hail the girl new Silk Road plan

Pledges \$40b to fund set up for connectivity across Asia

China will contribute \$40 billion to its new Silk Road fund designed to improve trade and transport links in Asia, President Xi Jinping announced yesterday.

The goal of the fund is to "break the connectivity bottleneck" in Asia, state media quoted Xi as saying during a neighbourhood summit in Beijing with leaders from Bangladesh, Cambodia, Laos, Mongolia, Myanmar, Pakistan and Tajikistan.

The announcement comes on top of a \$50

billion Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) that China established last month with 20 other nations.

Xi said this past week that the bank and the new Silk Road fund would help to finance China's plans to develop a "Silk Road Economic Belt" and a "21st Century Maritime Silk Road."

The "Economic Belt" is a network of highways, railways and other critical infrastructure linking China to Central and South Asia, the Mideast and Europe. The maritime route entails building or
