Shakib Al Hasan's 17th half-century and an aggressive knock from Rubel Hossain, which saw the number 10 batsman employ a number

of baseball-like hits over mid-wicket, helped Bangladesh post 503 by tea on the second day of the third Test against Zimbabwe in Chittagong yesterday.

In reply, the visitors reached 113 for 1 in just 26 overs by stumps. Brian Chari was the only batsman to be dismissed. Sikandar Raza, who bowled 36 overs and took three wickets with the ball, also struck his third half-century in 53 balls. Raza and his partner Hamilton Masakadza went all out on a wicket that seemed as fresh as it was on Day One as the pair scored 104 runs in 24 overs.

Earlier, with an overnight score of 303 for 2, the hosts were expected to make the most of a track that barely had anything for the bowlers. But the morning session belonged to the visitors.

It began with Mominul Haque when he

racks up highest score PTI, Kolkata

Rohit Sharma scripted history on Thursday by notching up the highest-ever individual score in one-day internationals, scoring a breathtaking 264, as India thumped Sri Lanka by 153 runs in the fourth game of the five-match series at Eden Gardens in Kolkata yesterday.

During his rollicking knock which came off just 173 balls, Rohit surpassed the previous record set by countryman Virender Sehwag, who smashed 219 against West Indies at Indore, back in 2011.

Rohit also became the only player in world cricket to score two double hundreds in the 50-over format with his previous best of 209 coming against Australia at Bangalore in November last year.

After electing to bat, India raced to 404 for 5 in their allotted 50 overs, thanks to Rohit and captain Virat

Kohli, who remained not out on 66. In reply, the visitors could manage only 251 before being bowled out in 43.1 overs. Asked if he was tired after his epic

knock, a smiling Rohit said, "Not really. I have had a break due to injury and I am not tired at all. I could have continued for another 50 overs." Rohit also broke Shikhar Dhawan's List

A record score of 248 scored against South Africa A in Pretoria last year. He hit 33 boundaries and nine sixes with his last 214

runs coming in only 101 balls. His 33 boundaries were highest number struck by an individual in an ODI innings.

Tough to get a wicket: Rubel

As far as Bangladesh's performers were concerned the second day of the third Test against Zimbabwe belonged to Rubel Hossain. Not only did the pacer come in at number ten and smack

a vital 45, but he also took the lone wicket for the Tigers on the day. For a bowler who has one of the worst averages in Test cricket, 78.79, this kind of days doesn't come very often. While Rubel had 'fun' with the bat, he reckons that bowling on the flat wicket at Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium would be no fun at

"The wicket is really good for batsmen. There isn't any swing or turn for the spinners. The main thing for us is to be patient. Getting wickets here will be tough," the pacer admitted at the post-day press conference yesterday.

"But still we are in a good position after putting up a good score. There will be runs on this wicket, but what we have to do is try to get wickets in the morning session. I can't say for sure if there will be any cracks here," he added.

At 450 for 9, Bangladesh were headed for a below-expectation total and that was when Rubel surprised everyone. He smacked four sixes -- something he claims not to have done in alley cricket either -- and a couple of boundaries to help Bangladesh get past the 500-run mark.

"It's always fun when a batsman times the ball well. I swung my bat and the wicket was good, so everything just fell into place. I timed it well so I felt really good. I honestly didn't expect to bat SEE PAGE 19 COL 5

two days for the loss of only 11 wickets. And if this trend continues, which is a possibility, the third and final Test between Bangladesh and Zimbabwe is destined for a draw.

But Zimbabwe opener Sikandar Raza claims that the visitors can still win this match.

"We are definitely playing as though we want to win this game. For that to happen we have to bat out of our socks. Coming into today they were 303 for 2 and no one would have thought they would be 500 or something all out.

"And having said that the last partnership put 50 odd runs on the board, so if you take that away, it could have been 460. So we will keep on believing and we will definitely want a win so that we can take the momentum into the ODI series," said Raza at the post-day press conference yesterday.

Having ended the day on 113 for 1, Raza believed that the momentum was

with the visitors.

"Look I think Bangladesh were hoping for a few more wickets. We will definitely take the confidence. We have toiled hard in the sun and I think the correct way has been shown to us by Bangladesh as well; they have done it so consistently. Hopefully we can take the momentum ahead in the next day and the day after," said the Zimbabwe opener.

While the wicket did not show any demons, Raza expects it to crumble in the coming days.

"Definitely as the sun beats on the surface and as the players run on the tracks... there already are a few cracks and some are actually creeping low and some are bouncing low, so yes I expect it to play slightly differently tomorrow [Friday], "Raza observed.

For a bowler who had bowled just 21 overs in his career before this match, the Pakistani-born occasional off-spinner had to put in 36 overs in the first innings of the match alone.

Asked as to how the experience was, Raza jokingly said that he would have to go into 'retirement' if he continued bowling that way.

Pakistan take 1-0 lead

Pakistan's Misbahul Haq became his country's most successful captain as his team strolled to victory by 248 runs in its first Test against New Zealand on Thursday,

taking a 1-0 lead in the three-match series. The victory gave Misbah 15 wins in 33 Tests, bettering the 14-win record of the

illustrious Imran Khan (48 Tests) and Javed Miandad (34 Tests). "It's a great feeling to be part of the winning team. It's a young team, nobody expected us to perform like this," said

as New Zealand folded at 231 in 70.3 overs. Misbah said it was nice to have a turn around after losing the Test series 2-0 in Sri Lanka in August.

"Sometimes you have to be patient. It was an absolute disaster for me, I didn't get any runs in Sri Lanka and one-day series against Australia, but I kept calm through that."

New Zealand captain Brendon McCullum said he was disappointed.

"Obviously we were clearly second in this

Test match," said McCullum.

"Congratulations to Misbah and his team. They were dominant in this Test match and we have a fight on our hands in the next two games. We've got to make sure we keep improving. Spin is obviously a threat but so is reverse swing."

Salahuddin's BFF Academy begins its journey ANISUR RAHMAN from Sylhet

Ever since Kazi Salahuddin became the president of Bangladesh Football Federation in April 2008, he nurtured a dream of building a football academy in

the country. His dream came true yesterday with the inauguration of the BFF Academy in north-eastern city of Sylhet.

Finance Minister Abul Maal Abdul Muhith launched the much-awaited academy amid a festive mood and promised to extend financial support to it from the government as much as they can in the future.

"The atmosphere here today proves how much we love football. These sports infrastructures of BKSP in this division were build long ago and I gave it to the BFF when Salahuddin approached me. Now I am happy to see it functional as a football academy. Why can't we take football forward? We can and must do it,"

said Muhith in his speech as the chiefguest. "I cannot give as much money as the BFF wants, but I will provide some of it for the development of the sport not only in Sylhet but across the country," promised the

finance minister after Commerce Minister Tofail Ahmed, who attended the programme as a special guest, requested the finance minister to provide the BFF Tk 20

crore per year.

"I know why Salahuddin invited me here though my ministry has nothing to do with football. Bangladesh is making progress in

every sector and a popular sport like football must move forward. If we can beat Australia, England and India in cricket, then why can't we do that in football? The young generation is being derailed due to lack sports facilities," said Tofail.

Earlier, in his welcome speech, Salahuddin thanked Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, the finance minister and FIFA president Sepp Blatter for their continues support towards the game.

"Only 70 per cent of the work of this | first blood through a 23rd academy has been completed and we now need financial backing from the government to finish it. Besides, we need Tk 4 crore a year to run the institution smoothly," Salahuddin said.

"I think just one per cent of the education or health budget can look after the young generation and keep them away from drugs or self-destructing activities. I strongly believe that sports are a very vital part of human life," said the BFF boss.

FIFA development officer Shaji Prabhakaran ensured that the game's world governing body would lay an astro-turf at the academy by May-June, subject to fulfilling the FIFA requirements.
