Tigers complete historic 3-0 whitewash



Bangladesh vs Zimbabwe Test Series 2014

As soon as umpire Aleem Dar raised his finger to signal the end of

Zimbabwe innings, Bangladesh's close-in fielders went haywire. High-fives were exchanged, stumps were uprooted and the process of forming a celebratory huddle was about to begin.

However, just as the celebrations were about to notch up a gear, it had to be put on hold, for Zimbabwe had decided to review the umpire's decision. Eventually Dar's decision was upheld and the celebrations resumed once more.

This little episode, right before the Tigers completed their historic 3-0 whitewash with a 186run win, epitomised exactly the kind of year it has been for Bangladesh. There were numerous occasions when they were a mere step away from victory and

yet, at times disbelievingly, failed to pack the final punch.

When the DRS was asked for one last time in Chittagong yesterday, for a moment it just felt as though the Tigers were being teased; they were made to wait an extra anxious minute to confirm a deserving win.

And yet, there it finally was. After struggling throughout a year which saw embarrassing defeats, resignation of coaches, captains changed the Tigers have finally achieved something that they could be proud of: a perfect

Their task -- getting nine wickets on the final day -- was made easier by the visiting batsmen who attempted risky shots against the spinners and looked out of sorts in the morning session. One would have thought that Zimbabwe would do their best to stick out the 90 overs, but that did not seem to be a part of The 3-0 whitewash is Bangladesh's best result and the most number of Tests that they have won in a year

This is Bangladesh's seventh win in Test cricket and their second whitewash after their 2-0 win in West Indies in 2009

Shakib Al Hasan, with 251 runs and 18 wickets, became only the second player after Mitchell Johnson to take at least 15 wickets and score more than 250 runs in a series involving three or fewer Tests

Bangladesh's spinners have scalped 49 wickets in this series, one less than the all-time high in a three-match series, set by India and Sri Lanka

Hamilton Masakadza got out while attempting an audacious reverse-sweep against part-time off-spinner Shuvagata Hom. His partner Sikandar Raza got out four overs later as he smacked a fulltoss straight to the fielder at deep

midwicket. Zimbabwe captain Brendan Taylor committed the same mistake that he was doing throughout the series and got out while attempting to drive Jubair Hossain's leg-spin through the

covers; he edged it to point. Regis Chakabva, despite giv-

ing a couple of opportunities, stayed there till the end with an unbeaten 89. He was by far Zimbabwe's best batsman. He played on the back-foot and that gave him time to negotiate the spin and bounce. A bottomhanded player, Chakabva ensured to punish the bad balls through the mid-wicket region and at the same time put a straight bat to the respectable deliveries. Most of his seven fours came against Shuvagata, who bowled quite a few loose deliveries in the middle.

After seven wickets had fallen, Mushfigur opted for the new ball with an aim to finish off the tail and that was exactly what happened. Rubel Hossain and Shafiul Islam returned from the shadows to scalp the last three wickets. They both bowled straight and fast and left the Zimbabwean tail-enders with no answers.

'It hurts'

A whitewash against your closest competitors is never a good sign for the losing side and as a result it was not a surprise when Zimbabwe captain Brendan Taylor admitted that the 3-0 series defeat had 'hurt' him and the team.

"Yeah, it certainly hurts as an individual, it hurts the team too. It's tough to comprehend that, but Bangladesh have played better cricket, so we got to give them credit for that. They made it difficult for us, in all three Test matches. We fought pretty hard but the better team held on and got the results," said Taylor at the post-match press conference at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium here yesterday.

According to Taylor, the key difference between the teams was the spin factor. He also felt that the result of the first Test, which saw the hosts edge past Zimbabwe by three wickets in a tight contest, paved the way for the rest of the series.

"I think Bangladesh are a slightly better side in their conditions. The difference is in the spin department; it's chalk and cheese really. The first Test match set the tone; in hindsight had we got 20-30 runs more, it could have been a different result. To

tough," explained Taylor. The Zimbabwean however reckons that the visitors will fight back in the five-match ODI series, which begins on November 21, and start afresh.

If there were an award to be given out this year for the best comeback in cricket, then Shakib Al Hasan

would definitely have been nominated. 251 runs and 18 wickets; there's not much more that you can ask for from a player in a series.

Shakib denied having a special aim for this series, his first after his two-and-ahalf-month disciplinary ban, but it was quite obvious that the left-hander wanted to put in his best. It therefore was not a surprise when he was given the player-ofthe-series award yesterday; his second after Bangladesh's 2-0 series win in West Indies in 2009. Had he taken two more wickets in this series

he would have created another landmark: the first player to score 250 runs and take 20 wickets in three or fewer Tests. However, it was the rest of the bowlers who completed the job for the Tigers on the final day. Was the left-hander unhappy?

Not quite.

"No, there is nothing to feel bad. If you see the first two matches, had I not taken 17 wickets, what then? What if it was just 10? You need luck and it wasn't there for me in this Test so it didn't happen," said the lefthander at the post-match press conference in Chittagong yesterday.

The main thing, the player claimed, was that Bangladesh had won.

"It feels really good that I managed to contribute for the team. I could have batted

better perhaps but on the whole I am satis-

'We won because key players performed'

When a team posts its best ever series result in Test cricket, you would generally expect its captain to be excited. It was rather Mushfigur Rahim's sobriety that greeted journalists following

the epic win at the Zahur Ahmed Chowdhury Stadium here yesterday. Whether that was due to the ease with which the Tigers had wrapped up the series or the cautionary mental wall that he had

built inside following a series of defeats this year, was unknown; the one thing that was obvious was that the traditional dramas that followed a Bangladeshi series win was missing. "It's nothing unbelievable. This is quite normal for Bangladesh. It was always

going to be difficult for them against our spinners. The way they were batting [on Sunday], with so much risk, a wicket was bound to fall and we were waiting for that. Never thought that this match would end as a draw, " said Mushfigur.

"We won because our key players performed. That's why 3-0 was possible. I also want to thank the management for preparing a good pitch, on which we could execute our plans. Hopefully we can carry this momentum into the ODIs and take a winning atmosphere into the

About the final day's plans Mushfigur said, "We had to get their best batsmen out in the morning. And then we were confident about the other wickets. Captain Brendan

Taylor is a good player as well but he couldn't score in this series so we knew that they would be under pressure. At the end we won the series quite easily."

A number of players improved their personal records through this series.

Of all the highlights it was leg-spinner Jubair Hossain's performance that arrived as a breath of fresh air to Bangladesh's bowling attack. While still a bit inconsistent, his attacking instinct impressed many. "He has a bright future but also has

plenty of areas to work on. I am not saying that he performed because Zimbabwe is a weak team, but if he wants to progress he needs to keep improving and he has the ability to do that," opined the captain. Having captained the side to a 3-0 white-

wash, Mushfigur is confident that Mashrafe Bin Mortaza, Bangladesh's ODI skipper, can lead the Tigers to a similarly positive result in the five-match ODI series. He however admitted to still getting used to the fact that he won't be captaining the Tigers in the 50over format.

"Generally I try to make a plan about the right squad a week before a series starts and do my homework. I was about to do something like that this time as well but then I realised that I am not going to be leading the side.

"As a keeper if I am selected I'll give lose in the fashion we did is Mashrafe bhai all the support I can. I think Mashrafe bhai is the best person who can gel all of us together on the team. I have led the side to a 3-0 Test win, hopefully Mashrafe bhai can take the momentum further," he concluded.
