Lured into risky sea trip

Traffickers promised them lucrative jobs in Malaysia

Most of them were enticed by traffickers of landing lucrative jobs in Malaysia, while a few were kidnapped by thugs. They endured an ordeal for over a week before being rescued by Navy men. The 576 fortune seekers from Bangladesh

and Myanmar were rescued on Monday from a cargo vessel near the Saint Martin's island of the Bay of Bengal while being trafficked to the Southeast Asian country.

They along with five traffickers and 11 crew members of the vessel were taken to the Navy's Ready Response Berth at Patenga last evening. Among the rescued are 510 male, 33 female and 33 children.

UNFPA asks Bangladesh, other developing nations to invest heavily on young people to build a better future

It is time for the youth in Bangladesh and beyond.

The young population across the globe has reached a remarkable 1.8 billion out of 7.3 billion, and most of them live in developing countries like Bangladesh.

The developing nations with large youth populations have been urged to invest heavily on them for their quality education and health services for economic and social gains.


"If they are equipped with necessary skills, good health and effective choices, they present an enormous opportunity to transform the future," said UNFPA Bangladesh Representative Argentina Matavel.

Like elsewhere, the United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) launched the State of World Population Report 2014: "The power of 1.8 billion: adolescents, youth and the transformation of the future" in Bangladesh yesterday. Some 47.6 million or 30 percent of the total 158.5 million people in

Bangladesh are young (10-24 years), and it will be between 10 and 19 percent by 2050, according to it. "This means that Bangladesh needs to invest right now in the human

capital of its young people if it wants to reap the benefits of a large demographic dividend," said the report presented at the Jatiya Press Club.

Matavel said Bangladesh has done well in terms of primary school enrolment, reducing birth rate and maternal and child mortality rates, but child SEE PAGE 2 COL 3

The Institute for Economics and Peace (IEP), a Sydneybased non-profit research organisation, published the report yesterday, calculating various political, social and violence factors to determine the risk.
