Three-day festival kicks off at Bangla Academy tomorrow

With more than 80 sessions on subjects ranging from literature to mathematics, the three-day Hay Festival Dhaka kicks off tomorrow on the capital's Bangla Academy premises, opening up a world of thoughts and joy, organisers said yesterday.

"Sixty thinkers and writers from 13 foreign countries will participate in the festival this year along with more than 200 Bangladeshi litterateurs," said Festival Director Sadaf Saaz Siddiqui at a press conference at Dhaka Reporters Unity. Starting in 1988, the original Hay Festival of Literature &

Arts is held every year for 10 days in May-June at Hay-on-Wye in Wales, from which it derives its name. Now, the literature festival is hosted in over 10 countries in Asia, Africa, Americas and Europe.

In 2010, Hay Festival was first organised on the British Council premises in Dhaka, with The Daily Star as the title sponsor. The response received from litterateurs and

Hay to feature 60 Increase reserved seats for women in JS

Rights activists urge govt

Women's rights campaigners yesterday once again called for increasing the reserved seats in parliament for women to 150 from existing 50 and introducing direct election to these seats for their political empowerment.

Suggesting one woman lawmaker for every two parliamentary seats, they also demanded re-demarcation of constituencies so that the female MPs elected to the reserved seats could serve their own areas.

The activists were addressing a views exchange meeting on "Introducing Direct Election System in Reserved Seats, Increase the Number by One-Third and Nominate 33% Women of a Political Party to Contest in Election", organised by Bangladesh Mahila Parishad (BMP) in Cirdap auditorium of the capital.

The current parliament consists of 350 seats, including 50 reserved for women, which are apportioned to elected parties based on their representation in parliament.

BMP, a longtime advocate of increased representation of women in parliament, held a rally on February 10 last year making the same call. "The way the whole parliamentary

system is working, it seems women are marginalised," BMP President Ayesha Khanam said yesterday.

"We cannot expect positive changes in the women's rights movement if a female MP of one constituency is assigned to a completely different constituency, of which she has no knowledge," she said. As a result they cannot contribute much to society, she

Ayesha Khanam blamed a lack of political as a hindrance to women's empower-

Rakhi Dash Purkayastha, acting general secretary of BMP, said the number of female voters had increased significantly over the years but women's participation in policymaking and political empowerment remained insignificant.

BNP acting secretary general Mirza Fakhrul Islam Alamgir yesterday said the people had rejected the explanation of Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina's adviser HT Imam that media had reported a "partial and distorted" version of what he said regarding the January 5 national election. "HT Imam has proved how the Election Commission

changed the result of the January 5 polls... How their [government's] appointed officers set up mobile courts to hold the one-sided poll," he told a discussion marking the 50th birth anniversary of Tarique Rahman, senior vice chairman of the party, at Jatiya Press Club in the capital. Referring to former minister Abdul Latif Siddique and

Imam's comments, he said this was a sign of the fall of the government. Quoting Latif, Fakhrul said Sajib Wazed Joy, the PM's son

and adviser, was taking Tk1.6 crore as salary. BNP has urged the government to reveal the actual amount of his salary, but to no avail, he said.

The BNP spokesperson also accused the government of trying to stop anti-government agitation by filing false cases against party chief Khaleda Zia and Tarique.

RTI act hinges on use by journos

Implementation of the Right to Information (RTI) Act largely depends on how journalists use the act, said their leaders yesterday.

The general public will benefit when more journalists begin to use the act for investigative reporting, they added. They were addressing the concluding session of a workshop

for journalists organised by Dhaka Reporter's Unity (DRU). Supported by the Ministry of Information and the Information Commission, DRU trained nearly a thousand of its member journalists over the last two years on how the act can be used in the field of journalism, said DRU President Shahed Chowdhury.

Chief Information Commissioner Mohammed Farooq said, "It has been five years since the act was enacted. But, we have not reached even five percent of the population." He urged journalists to report on various clauses of the act to inform people of existence. Information Minister Hasanul Haq Inu said, "Application of the RTI act by journalists can bring the secrets of politicians and different institutions to an end, but journalists are not using the act that much."


'Assault on Cops' Court takes cognisance of charges against Fakhrul

POLITICAL VIOLENCE LAST YEAR German embassy

recalls Monir's death STAFF CORRESPONDENT

Do you remember Monir Hossain, the 14-year-old boy from Gazipur? Or the nerve-racking picture of the boy published in this newspaper just a year back?

The innocent boy is perhaps the worst reminder of the political violence that raged through the country in the runup to the January 5 parliamentary election.

In this month last year, he died a horrific death after pickets set the vehicle he was in on fire during a BNP-led 18party hartal. His whole body was burnt. The shocking death drew serious criticism over the way the then opposition waged its movement.

To remember the premature death, the German Embassy in Dhaka has launched a project for improving the facilities of the school the boy used to attend. A new classroom has been built in memory of Monir and is to be named after him, says a press release of the embassy.

The teenager was burnt on November 4, 2013 at Gazipur Chowrasta during hartal enforced by the then BNP-led 18party alliance. He died three days later. Charge d' Affaires of German Embassy Ferdinand von

Weyhe yesterday visited Ganakchala Primary School in Kaliakair upazila of Gazipur, where Monir was a fifth grader. Currently the school has almost 200 students who are being taught in four classrooms. The fifth classroom has

been constructed with necessary equipment with the embassy fund.
