Suicide blast kills two guards at foreign compound in Kabul

A Taliban suicide truck bomb struck at the entrance of a foreign-run compound in Kabul yesterday, killing two Afghan guards and highlighting the security challenges facing the country as NATO forces depart.

Taliban insurgents claimed responsibility for the early-morning blast, which shook windows across the Afghan capital and sent a plume of smoke into the sky over the east of the

After the initial explosion, two other militants were shot dead as they tried to storm the compound, which is run by the Dubai-based Hart security

company. "It was a bomb in a small truck at the gate of a foreign base. Initial reports show two guards killed, several wounded," Najib Danish, deputy spokesman for the interior ministry,

told AFP. "The guards were Afghan. Two other

attackers tried to enter the base and were killed by guards." Kabul police chief Zahir Zahir said

the attackers drove a truck carrying sand and stone up to the compound gate, claiming they were delivering construction material. He said one foreign national was

wounded but gave no further details.

A spokeswoman for Hart International confirmed its compound had been hit and that two of its Afghan guards were killed. "No internationals were killed, and

none were seriously injured but we are checking for further details," she said. Hart, which is headed by British

former soldier Richard Westbury, is one of scores of security contractors working in Afghanistan, providing services such as protecting embassy staff and overseeing infrastructure next month and pulling out, though

Afghan vice-president Abdul Rashid Dostum arrived at the scene shortly after the blast.

"This is not a face-to-face war, it is an intelligence war," he told reporters.

"We all know they (the Taliban) have influence over some traitors... but we will find them and they will be brought to justice."

A spokesman for the Taliban said via a recognised Twitter account that the attack targeted a foreign forces' intelligence base.

On Sunday lawmaker Shukria Barakzai escaped a suicide blast in Kabul as she drove in a convoy near parliament.

Three civilians died in that attack.

Kabul has been hit by regular suicide attacks over recent years, often against the US-led military force which has been fighting Taliban insurgents since 2001.

The NATO force is ending its war about 12,500 troops will remain to support the Afghan army and police now responsible for security nationwide.

Japan cuts Antarctic whale quota after UN court ruling

Japan yesterday said it has cut its Antarctic whale-catch quota by twothirds in a move it hopes will convince international opponents it is conducting real science, not hiding a commercial hunt behind a veneer of

research. The International Court of Justice -the highest court of the United Nations -- ruled in March that exemption set out in the 1986 moratorium on whaling.

their stay in Bangladesh. Khamis entered the country in 2009 and Martin in January 2013 with onarrival visas that were valid for a month. Kon came here in January last year as a tourist with a three-month stay permit.

They did not renew their documents but continued to stay in Bangladesh, Mohiuddin said. "We are investigating whether they have been involved in any criminal activities."

The detainees told Rab officials that they had been trading in garments -buying them here and then sending those to their home countries for sale at higher prices, the Rab official said. He at the briefing urged house

owners to verify documents of foreigners before renting out apartments or rooms to them to avoid any hassle. On November 14, the Detective Branch of police detained 31 foreign-

ers, from 10 African nations, for their

illegal stay in the country. Six of them were released later after they showed legal documents. Many foreigners involved in killing, drug peddling, smuggling and other fraudulent activities have recently

come to the notice of law enforcers, said law-enforcement agencies. As many as one lakh foreigners, mostly from Africa and Southeast Asian nations, have been living in the country illegally for years, said officials at the Special Branch of

police. Around 8,000 African nationals are living in the country and many of them are involved in killing, mugging, smuggling, fake note manufacturing and operating illegal VoIP (voice over internet protocol) business in the capital. The African nationals entered

Bangladesh as football players or students while others came with tourist visas but did not leave the country before the expiry of their visas or stay permits.

In many cases, they destroyed their passports and other documents so that law enforcers could not verify their nationalities and repatriate them upon arrest for criminal offences, intelligence officials say.

Forces Medical Institute's auditorium to brief the media on measures taken to keep Bangladeshi UN peacekeepers safe from Ebola.

"There is nothing to be worried since the two Bangladeshi peacekeepers were at a different block at the hospital," said the director. They have been quarantined along with other patients as a precaution against Ebola outbreak.

According to Reuters, about 20 UN peacekeepers, who were admitted to the clinic after sustaining injuries while serving in the turbulent north of Mali, have been put in quarantine for 21 days, the incubation period for the virus.

Now 1,400 Bangladeshi troops are deployed across the West African country, Mali, where according to World Health Organisation there have been three confirmed deaths from Ebola and another suspected death from the infection.

Mali shares its border with Guinea that has been the worst affected along with Liberia and Sierra Leone by the Ebola outbreak that claimed 5,177 lives as of November 14.

Maj Gen Md Rabiul Hossain, consultant physician general of the directorate general of medical services of the army, who led a five-member highpowered medical team to Liberia to assess and observe Ebola situation spoke at the press conference.

"Despite severe Ebola outbreak in Liberia, our troops are not infected. This happened due to extreme precautions by our commanders there," he said.

The visit of the medical team boosted the troops' moral strength, Maj Gen Rabiul said, adding that they have been monitoring the situation every day and getting updated information about the troops.

"After assessing the precautionary and protective measures we've told our troops that they will not be infected. What they need to do is to continue following the measures." Rabiul said the medical team had

visited Liberia only as the country was severely affected by Ebola and that 525 Bangladeshi troops were serving there. Troops from 12 countries have been deployed in Liberia, but only Bangladesh Army sent a medical team there. Replying to another query, Brig

Gen Saleem said Ebola did not affect the deployment of UN peacekeepers from Bangladesh.

FROM PAGE 16 She went to the house in Choddopai area on Friday. The next morning, the professor went out, locking her inside. "Learning about the professor's killing from TV scrolls in the afternoon, she phoned her parents."

The parents along with one of her maternal uncles and two sisters rushed to Rajshahi as they already came to know about the murder from TV news. They contacted police. Shafiul died at the Rajshahi

Medical College Hospital around 4:45pm after being hacked by a gang around 3:00pm while returning home by his motorbike, according to police. "We took her [the student] to a safe house for her security and kept there along with her family members ... We

interrogated her so that we can get some clue to the murder. We got some information from her about the lifestyle of the professor. We will release her within a day or two," the deputy commissioner said.

"She is not a suspect. Rather, she is helping us". Shafiul, who had left his campus

residence about a year ago, started living alone at a rented house in Choddopai which is near the RU campus. He married thrice. His first wife had died long ago and his second

wife divorced him while the third left him allegedly for his devotion to baul philosophy and alternative way of down a bit yesterday as all senior The female student used to visit Shafiul's house often, especially

during gatherings of Bauls. Some of her family members several times stayed at the house, investigators said. It could not know why she was locked inside the house. Officials said more investigation would make

everything clear. The Daily Star could not talk to her. Contacted over the mobile phone, her mother said, "I can't talk with you now. I am sick and I am at a hospital. She declined to give name of the hospital."

Meanwhile, police said they are

looking for a "blacksmith named Shadhon".

The bloodstained machete found at the scene of the murder was inscribed with the word, Shadhon, in Bangla, said a detective. "It may be the name of the blacksmith who manufactured it."

A pro-Jamaat teacher, who was given a lift by Shafiul moments before the killing, also came under police scanner, according to a senior

official of RMP. Prof Zulfikar Ali Islam got on Shafiul's motorbike near Momtazuddin Arts Building of the university that afternoon.

Contacted, Zulfikar said Shafiul first tried to avoid it on a plea of some work at the administration building. "Moments later, he called me, took me on his motorcycle and dropped me in front of Mirzapur

Primary School". Replying to a question, he said this was the first time he rode with Shafiul.

Rajshahi police also identified some more leaders and activists of Jamaat-e-Islami and Islami Chhatra Shibir of Rajshahi and other districts as suspects.

Talking to The Daily Star, Deputy

Commissioner Nahidul Islam said those suspects used mobile phones on the spot at the time of the murder. The investigation, however, slowed

instrument designed to "sniff" the comet's thin atmosphere. Other analyses suggest the comet's

surface is largely water-ice covered with a thin dust layer. The European Space Agency (Esa) craft touched down on the Comet 67P

on 12 November after a 10-year jour-Dr Fred Goessmann, principal investigator on the Cosac instrument, which made the organics detection, confirmed the find to BBC News. But

he added that the team was still trying

to interpret the results. It has not been disclosed which molecules have been found, or how complex they are.

But the results are likely to provide insights into the possible role of comets in contributing some of the chemical building blocks to the primordial mix from which life evolved on the early Earth.

Preliminary results from the Mupus instrument, which deployed a hammer to the comet after Philae's landing, suggest there is a layer of dust 10-20cm thick on the surface with very hard water-ice underneath.

The ice would be frozen solid at temperatures encountered in the outer Solar System - Mupus data suggest this layer has a tensile strength similar to sandstone.

"It's within a very broad spectrum of ice models. It was harder than expected at that location, but it's still within bounds," said Prof Mark McCaughrean, senior science adviser to Esa, told BBC News.

"People will be playing with [mathematical] models of pure water-ice mixed with certain amount of dust."

He explained: "You can't rule out rock, but if you look at the global story, we know the overall density of the comet is 0.4g/cubic cm. There's no way the thing's made of rock.

"It's more likely there's sintered ice at the surface with more porous mate-

rial lower down that hasn't been exposed to the Sun in the same way." After bouncing off the surface at

least twice, Philae came to a stop in some sort of high-walled trap. "The fact that we landed up against something may actually be in our favour. If we'd landed on the main

even thicker and it's possible we might not have gone down [to the ice]." Scientists had to race to perform as many key tests as they could before Philae's battery life ran out at the week-

surface, the dust layer may have been

A key objective was to drill a sample of "soil" and analyse it in Cosac's oven. But, disappointingly, the latest information suggest no soil was delivered to

the instrument. Scientists are hopeful however that as Comet 67P/Churyumov-Gerasimenko approaches the Sun in coming months, Philae's solar panels will see sunlight again, allowing the batteries to re-charge - allowing it to

perform more science. "There's a trade off - once it gets too hot, Philae will die as well. There is a

sweet spot," said Prof McCaughrean. He added: "Given the fact that there is a factor of six, seven, eight in solar illumination and the last action we took was to rotate the body of Philae around to get the bigger solar panel in, I think it's perfectly reasonable to think

it may well happen. "By being in the shadow of the cliff, it might even help us, that we might not get so hot, even at full solar illumination. But if you don't get so hot that you don't overheat, have you got enough solar power to charge the

system." The lander's Alpha Particle X-ray Spectrometer (APXS), designed to provide information on the elemental composition of the surface, seems to have partially seen a signal from its own lens cover - which could have dropped off at a strange angle because Philae was not lying flat.
