Non-bank borrowing escalates

The government's non-bank borrowing soared in the first quarter of the current fiscal year because of the country's utter failure to make the most of the availability of cheap foreign funds due to its poor record in project implementation.

......

As a result, the government's debt servicing cost would rise in fiscal 2014-15, warned the fiscal coordination council and the resource committee, both chaired by Finance Minister AMA Muhith, during respective meetings early this month.

To plug the holes in deficit financing, the government, during the July-September period, depended heavily on non-bank borrowing, as there was a huge sale of savings instruments.

Savings instruments worth Tk 6,820 crore were sold in the first quarter, a figure which has already achieved about 75 percent of the target for the whole year, a finance ministry official said.

If the current trend continues, the sales of the savings certificates would total 301 percent of the original target at the end of the fiscal year. The council thinks this will increase the government's debt servicing cost, according to the official.

Savers have rushed to government' savings certificates as they offer much higher interest rates than banks.

record in project implementation, although more than \$19 billion are available for the country. Most of these funds in the pipeline are the cheapest loans in the world.

In monetary terms, the net foreign financing declined Tk 1,699 crore and the bank financing by Tk 34 crore in the first quarter. On the other hand, non-bank financing rose Tk 3,371 crore.

The slow progress in expenditure could be viewed in positive light as it normally keeps the deficit in check.

But owing to poor revenue earning, the deficit stood at Tk 1,738 crore in the first quarter, a stark contrast from the same period last fiscal year, when the amount was

IGW cartel proposal goes to Hasina

The telecom ministry has recently sent to Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina the proposal of a group of international gateways (IGWs) for installing a "common switch" meant for controlling the entire cache of overseas calls.

IGW Operators Forum, comprising 17 gateways of the total 29 in the market, plans to introduce the system.

The switch will be led by seven gateways and may allow for a murky window for collecting unspecified fees, said operators who did not join the forum. They also said the switch may go against the competition law, contract law and long distance telecom policy. A forum leader, however, denied the allegation.

The IGWs transmit international calls to operators through interconnection exchanges connected with other gateways. The proposal was sent to the prime minister as she is

now the in-charge of the ministry following former minister Abdul Latif Siddique's removal from cabinet over his comments on hajj and Prophet Muhammad (pbuh). The forum is actually an agreement among the gate-

ways and the government should not directly be involved in the pact, the ministry told the premier in a letter. As the telecom regulator has been involved in the

process, it will ensure that nothing goes against the law or rules, the letter said. Md Faizur Rahman Chowdhury, telecom secretary,

Mongla silo nearly done

The construction of the food grain silo at Mongla is nearing completion, creating hopes of job opportunities and higher economic activities among locals of the decaying seaport town and its adjacent rural areas.

Already 65 percent of the construction work for the 50,000-tonne grain silo, the largest in the southwest region, has been completed, with the rest expected to be done by June next year, said Bimal Bhuiyan, the deputy project director.

The silo, which will be mainly used for handling imported wheat, is being built on the banks of Pashur River in Joymony village from across the Sundarbans.

Estimated to cost Tk 614 crore, the silo will facilitate the government to address food shortage in the southwest and the north in the event of natural disasters like

cyclone, said officials at the Directorate General of Food.

The silo will be helpful in distributing

cereals in the region, said Bhuiyan, adding that river routes will be used for the most part to transport cereals from the silo to districts in the region. The Mongla silo will be the country's fifth and it would take the total storage capacity

to 2.75 lakh tonnes from the present 2.25 lakh tonnes. Another silo, with 1.5 lakh tonnes capacity, might be built just beside it with financing from the World Bank, Bhuiyan said.

The food storage will have modern handling equipment and will reduce operational losses and arrest pilferages.

"We will be able to unload grains faster. Besides, the activities at the silo will create job prospects for couple of hundreds of people."

Sweden pledges Tk 1,659cr in aid for Bangladesh

Sweden will give Bangladesh 1.6 billion Swedish krona, or Tk 1,659 crore, in development assistance in the next seven years.

The move is part of the Nordic country's development strategy for Bangladesh for 2014-2020, announced yesterday at an event at the capital's Amari Hotel.

The aim of the strategy is to: alleviate poverty; strengthen democracy, respect for human rights and gender equality; and contribute to sustainable development, it said in the strategy paper.

Last year, Sweden committed the same amount as development assistance for Bangladesh.

the new strategy, Isabella Lövin, Swedish minister for international development cooperation, said it has a long-term perspective -- realising the results achieved and focusing on

"It also takes into account the aim of the government of Bangladesh to become a middle-income country by 2021. And I am certain this aim can be reached in a sustainable and inclusive way."

Lövin said Sweden has supported Bangladesh's own development agenda for many areas, particularly in health and education, where the Scandinavian country has supported sector programmes for almost 30 years now.

the world, she said.

In both the sectors Bangladesh has achieved "impressive results" and is expected to reach the Millennium Development Goals set up almost 15 years ago.

Lövin said despite Bangladesh's astonishing recent economic growth of around 6 percent per year, challenges still remain.

"In order to address these, we would like to continue our dialogue with the Bangladeshi government, development partners, and other actors in the Bangladeshis society such as the civil society and the private sector."

The new strategy focuses on gender equality as a perspective which should be taken into consideration in all of the country's interventions, she said.

Banks, tax offices to remain open on Saturday

Banks and tax offices will remain open on Saturday to help people pay taxes and submit income tax returns within the November 30 deadline, Bangladesh Bank and National Board of Revenue said yesterday.

All main branches of private and state-run banks at the district and division levels will remain open on the day, the central bank said in a notice.

Tax offices at the field level will also receive tax returns from 9am to 5pm, the NBR said in another notice.

The tax administrator had earlier extended the deadline for submitting income tax returns till November 30 amid pleas from different trade and professional bodies.

The authorities are unlikely to extend the deadline further, said Syed A Momen, NBR's senior information officer.
