In less than six months, former BNP leader and exminister Nazmul Huda floated another political party named Bangladesh Manabadhikar Party (BMP).

On May 7, Huda formed "Bangladesh National Alliance" and announced to contest in all 300 constituencies in the next parliamentary elections with an aim to establishing good governance.

Two years ago, in 2012, Huda formed "Bangladesh Nationalist Front (BNF)" after quitting as a BNP vicechairman.

However, he was ousted by BNF leader Abul Kalam Azad after a few months after its creation. Subsequently, Azad announced himself as BNF

chairman.

Twenty-two candidates of BNF took part in the January 5 polls and Azad was elected from Dhaka-17 constituency uncontested.

A founding member of BNP, Huda told a press conference at his business office on Topkhana Road of the capital yesterday that BMP's aim was to form government and enact laws on human rights and build a rights-based society.

He did not specify his post in BMP, saying anyone could head the party. He also did not say if any party would join his to create an alliance.

Huda, who started his political career with Jagodal, founded by late president Ziaur Rahman in 1977, called upon the rights bodies to join BMP.

Asked if the name BMP, which sounds a little like BNP, would confuse people and voters, Huda said he had no intention of creating confusion. People are now educated and will understand the difference, he added.

Education, eradication of poverty, strict enforcement of laws, and raising social awareness collectively can prevent child marriage, said speakers at a seminar yesterday.

The seminar titled "Say 'NO' to Child Marriage" was organised by The Daily Star in association with United Nations Population Fund (UNFPA) at a restaurant in Chittagong city.

Families should make their children aware of the adverse effects of child marriage while news media should create mass awareness and social media can be used for running campaigns, said Wasika Ayesha Khan, lawmaker of Awami League.

Several times, public representatives like Union Parishad chairmen obstruct law enforcers when they reach spots to stop such marriages, mentioned Deputy Commissioner of Chittagong Mejbah Uddin, adding that such representatives must be held accountable.



PAVEL'S MURDER FOR TK 18 LAKH

Mother frustrated over delay in charge filing

Investigators reason permanent address of one accused yet to be unearthed

Getting justice seems to be a far cry for a widow in the capital, at least for the last two years, with submission of the charge sheet in the case over her only son's murder being held back merely because, as the investigators reasoned, the permanent address of an accused is yet to be unearthed. Losing her husband, only son and

the family's savings in quick succession, all Solema Akhter can do now is pass her days with her daughter Anta Islam amidst uncertainty and the anxiety of when the next call would come from an unknown number with a voice at the other end threatening to kill them.

Several police officials The Daily Star contacted recently informed that there was no bar on submitting a charge sheet which did not contain the

Just 37 days after his father passed away, Ariful Islam Pavel, a second year student of United International University, went missing on December 26, 2012 from his residence at Concord Emporium in the capital's Katabon with Tk 18 lakh in his posses-

Six months after Solema filed a case, three persons, Jahangir, Faysal and Farhad, were arrested in June 2013 in Rayer Bazar, Azimpur and Narsingdi respectively by the Detective Branch (DB) of Dhaka Metropolitan Police.

Their confessional statements led to the discovery of Pavel's skeletal remains from Adiabad Kandapara graveyard in Narsingdi's Raipura.

Jahangir was the family's neighbour in Nilkhet residential area on the Dhaka University (DU) campus. Pavel's father Ashraful Islam Bhuiyan was a former DU senior store officer.

Detectives said Jahangir allegedly
