

"There is something I forgot to say."

These were the last words of Qayyum Chowdhury. Nobody would ever know what the celebrated artist wanted to say. He collapsed right after, taking with him his unspoken words to the great beyond.

The 82-year-old painter spoke as the special guest before a 25,000 strong crowd of music connoisseurs at the Bengal Classical Music Festival at the capital's Army Stadium last night.

In his speech, Qayyum talked about the chronology of art practices in Bangladesh. "It was the musicians -- the likes of Jasimuddin and Abdul Alim -- whose music inspired me to portray the opulence of my country on canvas," he said.

Delivering his speech, Qayyum got back to his seat. He again walked to the podium to say something. But he collapsed around 8:30pm. SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

Chaos all around

Commuters' lives at risk in city

Recklessness is now the name of the game and Dhaka city has become a dangerous place for everybody on the road, thanks to the sheer indifference of policemen in enforcing the law.

Buses stop anywhere at will. The whole city is today a big bus stop. At other times though they do not even stop to let their passengers get down. The helpers just ask passengers to jump off the running buses, just like they did in case of journalist Zaglul Ahmed Chowdhury who died the day before yesterday at Sonargaon cross-

And passengers have become equally callous. They have forgotten their own safety.

The result: At least 134 dead and many more injured in 155 accidents in the metropolis this year alone.

But at the root of all this is the utter negligence of cops in enforcing the law. At Sonargaon crossing yesterday after

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Truck crashes Student's death sparks violence

Islamic University closed after road accident kills him

A student of the Islamic University (IU) was crushed under a · bus yesterday, triggering widespread violence on the cam-· pus and prompting the authorities to shut the university indefinitely.

Enraged by the death of Wahiduzzaman Titu, 23, fellow · students torched 13 buses, vandalised at least another 17, · ransacked several university buildings including the administrative office, and clashed with law enforcers for hours. At least 10 students were injured in the clashes.

Witnesses said Titu, a third year student of Biotechnology and Genetic Engineering department, tried to board a moving bus near the main entrance of the university around · 12:10pm but tripped and fell on the road.

Sylhet division kids suffer the most

Sylhet division has the highest rate of children suffering from malnutrition and stunted growth, followed by Chittagong, though their poverty rates are among the lowest in the country.

At least 44.6 percent children below the age of five in Sylhet have stunted growth, while 38.5 percent are underweight, according to a new study titled "Undernutrition Maps of Bangladesh 2012".

In Chittagong, 42.1 percent children are suffering from stunted growth and 36.8 percent are underweight, as per the analysis based on the data from the Population and Housing Census 2011, SEE PAGE 11 COL 5

SC upholds indictment in Zia Charitable Trust case
