Farming nearly mechanised

Farmers bag more crops; come new jobs, go old ones

Gone are the days when farmers had to put in backbreaking labour and depend fully on animals to prepare land and thresh harvested crops.

Farmers now thresh more than 90 percent of their grain crops by machines and till nearly 90 percent of cultivable land by power tillers and tractors -- a transition that took place over the last two and a half decades.

This has enabled growers to produce more crops in a year and bag more produce with lower production cost, according to experts at agro-research institutions and Bangladesh Agricultural University (BAU).

Aware of the benefits of mechanised farming, more and more farmers are now using machines for harvesting, seeding and planting.

"It has become a big boon for our farming. Using power tillers, we can prepare land quicker than we do by using animals. Use of machines has reduced our time for tilling and given us scope to grow more crops," said ASM Sisnabi Mandal of Dinajpur district, a major crop zone in the northwest.

The 40-year-old farmer grew only two rice crops -- Aman and Boro-- in a year on his 10-acre farmland when he had to depend on bulls or buffaloes for land preparation. Now by using power tiller, he gets one additional crop every year.

"Now I grow potato or mustard after harvesting Aman rice. It is possible because less time is required for land preparation by using machines," he said. Sisnabi is one of the tens of thousands of farmers in the country who are reaping the advantage of using modern tools in farming.

No official estimate on agricultural mechanisation is available. But

KHALEDA'S MEETING WITH GOVT OFFICIALS

March plan was on agenda

BNP officially denies, privately admits; govt warns of legal action

The public officials who met BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia on Thursday night assured her of support from the Bangladesh Secretariat for an "upcoming" anti-government movement.

Convinced that the government will hold a general election in March under national and international pressure, the BNP is preparing for an all-out movement targeting the month, party insiders said.

It wants to mobilise pro-BNP officials and employees to turn the screw on the government. It even plans to have the movement centred on the Secretariat, the country's administrative hub, they added.

Some BNP leaders believe movements involving public servants like what the Awami League did in 1996 by forming the Janatar Mancha (people's platform) would be more effective than street agitation.

"Thursday's meeting between the BNP chief and some aggrieved government officials was part of

that plan," said a BNP leader preferring anonymity.

The media was not allowed in the meeting, but the matter leaked out, putting the party high-ups in an unpleasant situation. The same night Khaleda held a separate meeting with some ex-army officials leaning towards BNP, sources said.

Meanwhile, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday warned of action against the public officials who would be found to have participated in the meeting.

"If any government official has violated law by attending the meeting, legal action will be taken," she told a press conference at her Gono Bhaban residence. "Law will take its own course."

The public administration ministry said it would probe the reported meeting and decide on punishments that may include withholding of promotion, salary slash or forced retirement.

"The government won't take this lightly. It is a matter of discipline within the service," said State SEE PAGE 11 COL 1




Diplomatic sources said the Bhutanese PM will lead a 26member high-profile team of ministers, business delegates and media persons to renew the bilateral trade agreement

Rosul said he along with his wife was taking Shuvo, a class-two student of Asmani Shishu Niketon in the town, to a coaching centre on his motorbike around 6:00am. Shuvo was seated between him and his wife on the motorbike.

Little did Shuvo know that it would be his last journey with his mother. After around 15 minutes of the ride, a bicycle hit their motorcycle on Satkhira-Kaligang road in Itagachha Bazar area. Ruma fell on the road.
