There have been increasing calls for the former Arsenal star to be recalled for a farewell appearance for Les Bleus in the friendly against Brazil in March, with Zinedine Zidane and Arsene Wenger amongst the big names to publicly back the idea.

Deschamps says it is a possibility to recall the 37year-old, but added he would not rush into a decision. "It has become such a

big media subject," he told RMC. "Thierry Henry is a great player. He has marked the history of the France team, as have some others.

"It is worth thinking about. I'll take the time to discuss it with the federation president.

"After people have ideas, they end up in the press. I won't close the door but I don't want to put pressure on this issue. "We will take the time to

'Barca look bored'

ace Paul Scholes believes that Barcelona are a "ghost" of the side they were, and are suffering from "boredom".

Barca failed to claim a single major honour last season and are now finding their feet under new boss Luis Enrique.

Scholes went to watch the Blaugrana in person at the Mestalla last weekend and was distinctly unimpressed by the attitude of the players during a 1-0 win that came courtesy of a last-minute goal from Sergio Busquets.

"For much of the game I felt they were a ghost of the side they had once been," the former England international wrote.

"They still pass the ball relentlessly, but that old drive and tempo are not nearly as urgent. The breathtaking speed and penetration have gone. When I try to find a way of summarising the attitude of the team, I keep alighting on the word "bored".

"It just seems the most accurate way to describe the way the team seem to treat the style of football that once made them the best side on the planet."



Totti sets sight on Piola landmark

Francesco Totti turned 38 in September but Roma's leader still has two burning ambitions before he retires - to lead the capital side to another Serie A title and overtake Silvio Piola as the league's all-time scorer.

His angry reaction to being substituted during the second half of their home game against Torino last

month showed that his passion and commitment still runs deep. "I'd be a liar if I said that I don't think about it (setting the goal record). I know it won't be easy, but nobody believed I could have scored as many goals I have," he wrote in the Corriere Dello Sport on Friday.

Totti has scored two goals so far in the league in nine games he has played this season and two more in the Champions League. He stands at 237 Serie A goals, 37 short of former Italy interna-

In his last three seasons Totti has been able to suck on his thumb, his unique way of celebrating goals, 28 times.

At current pace, he would have to play four more seasons, including this one, to realistically have a shot at Piola, who scored 143 of his goals for Roma's rivals, Lazio, between 1934 and 1943.

"There are no secrets to my longevity," Totti said. "I lead a professional life and my desire to keep playing is the same I had when I started."

Totti hopes that Roma's new stadium will be ready by 2016.

With the frantic Christmas fixture schedule looming on the horizon, Chelsea and Manchester City will look to consolidate their positions

as Premier League pace-setters in this weekend's matches. The two teams enjoyed breezy wins in

mid-week, Chelsea beating Tottenham Hotspur 3-0 and City winning 4-1 at Sunderland, and while the London club remain six points clear of the champions, both sides look a class apart. Chelsea visit Newcastle United on

Saturday, when they will attempt to set a new club record by extending their unbeaten run in all competitions to 24 matches.

Jose Mourinho's side will welcome back top scorer Diego Costa after he sat out the Tottenham game through suspension, although he was barely missed in Wednesday's match at Stamford Bridge.

"We know that we can score at any time," said French striker Loic Remy, who scored Chelsea's third goal against Spurs after replacing Didier Drogba in the second half.

"The squad is really strong and that makes the difference between us and the other teams. We will keep going to try and keep the distance from our closest opponent."

Newcastle have gone two games without victory, having previously won five matches in a row, but they have been beaten only once at home this season -- by City on the opening weekend. Following a poor run of results, City

appear to have rediscovered the form that swept them to last season's title, having won their last four games in all competitions, scoring 12 goals in the process.

The second game of that run was a rousing 3-2 win at home to Bayern Munich in the Champions League that gave Manuel Pellegrini's side a fighting chance of reaching the last 16 ahead of next week's showdown with Roma.

Ahead of Saturday's home match with Everton, Stevan Jovetic said that the victory over Bayern could prove a turning point in City's campaign.

"Honestly, in the Champions League we have not played well this season, but the game against Bayern helped us a lot," the Montenegro forward told the club website.

"Now we are in a very good moment, but we must continue like this because we are playing every three days and that can change."

Third-place Southampton lost ground on the top two after going down 1-0 at Arsenal on Wednesday and now find Manchester United breathing down their necks ahead of the two sides' confrontation at St Mary's on Monday. United currently trail Chelsea by 11 points

but although midfielder Marouane Fellaini is eager to bridge that gap, he acknowledges that Louis van Gaal's side must first safeguard their position in the top four. "I think we wait for a mistake (from the

leading teams), but we have to look after us," he said after his side's 2-1 win at home to Stoke City.

"After Boxing Day (December 26), we have a lot of games and we have to keep winning. Southampton as well, they are better in the table than us and we'll see on Monday as well."

Pep, Joachim welcome goal-line tech

Bayern Munich coach Pep Guardiola and Germany's Joachim Loew have both welcomed the decision to introduce goal-line technology into the Bundesliga for next season. The 18 clubs in

Germany's top-flight on Thursday voted to use the Hawk-Eye system, which notifies the referee if the ball has crossed the goalline, for the 2015/16 season. "If I find any technical

change or innovation good, then it's goal-line technology," said Loew, who coached Germany to their fourth World Cup title in Brazil in July. "Everything else I don't

really like, as the game should be left the way it is, but that's not the case with goal-line technology.

"There have been many refereeing decisions which have led to lots of discussions, so if you can get a quick and clear decision on a goal, then that's good."

Bundesliga clubs had originally voted to reject goal-line technology last season, but a fresh proposal from champions Bayern Munich led to a 15-3 vote from Germany's top 18 clubs to adopt the system.

"It's a good decision, I agree with it," said Guardiola on Friday.

Real eye new record Barcelona host Espanyol in the Catalan

City join Real Down Under

English Premier League champions Manchester City will join European champions Real Madrid at next year's International Champions Cup in Melbourne, organisers said on Friday.

Manchester City is the second team announced for the three-team tournament to take place at the 100,000-capacity Melbourne Cricket Ground from July 18-24. The third team for the series has yet to be confirmed, but

reports have linked Italian Serie A side Inter Milan. Owner Sheikh Mansour bin Zayed al-Nahyan has invested over £1 billion (\$1.5 billion) since acquiring Manchester City in 2008.

Since Mansour's arrival, City have won two Premier League titles, in 2012 and 2014, as well as the 2011 FA Cup and this year's League Cup.

Manchester City also have a stake in Australia's A-League after the club's Abu Dhabi-based owners purchased and rebranded Melbourne Heart as Melbourne City early this year. "We are looking forward, once again, to being a part of

the tournament," Ferran Soriano, chief executive of Manchester City, said in a statement. "We are particularly excited to be visiting Melbourne,

which is home to our sister club, Melbourne City."

With the securing of Real Madrid and Manchester City's huge box-office appeal, organisers are hoping to build on the local appetite for top European clubs after a crowd of 95,000 watched English Premier League Liverpool's 2-0 win over Australia's Melbourne Victory at the MCG last year.

Stramaccioni back for revenge

Former Inter Milan handler Andrea Stramaccioni has admitted the challenge of toppling his former club won't be easy when he returns to the San Siro for the first time since his sacking last year.

Stramaccioni became the youngest coach in Serie A two years ago when he replaced Claudio Ranieri in March 2012, but was sacked by the end of the following season when Inter struggled to a ninth place finish.

After a solid start, his Udinese side have taken only two points from their last five games and have dropped to ninth, 16 points behind leaders Juventus.

A trip to Inter would always be a tough prospect for the northerners, but they face a side that is beginning to find its feet under new coach Roberto Mancini. Stramaccioni, 38, believes Inter, who

drew 1-1 with Milan in the city derby two weeks ago, showed plenty of improvement even in a 4-2 defeat away to Roma last week.

"It will be a tough game because from the derby to Roma last week, Inter have shown they have improved," Stramaccioni told

reporters. "But we'll be going to the San Siro to play our game and with our heads held high."

On what is his second spell at the club, Mancini suffered his first defeat at the Olympic Stadium last week where he was sent off for dissent. The defeat dropped Inter to 11th, 17

points behind leaders Juventus but only six behind Napoli in the third and last Champions League spot. However the Italian, who won seven trophies including three consecutive
