Yaba trade run by 25 influentials

1,250 pieces of Yaba seized at DU

Around 25 politically and economically influential persons have been controlling the Yaba pills inflow in the country, according to a list prepared by the Department of Narcotics Control.

A lawmaker from Cox's Bazar has been named in the DNC list of Yaba smugglers prepared in September this year, said a DNC official.

"We found at least 600 big and small scale Yaba traders in the country. But the menace could be controlled effectively by taking steps against the influentials," said the official, requesting anonymity.

Against such a backdrop, Shahbagh police yesterday arrested seven people with 1,250 pieces of Yaba tablets at Dhaka University. They bought the pills from the university dormitory, police said.

Meanwhile, DNC officials mentioned the Bangladesh-Myanmar border," he said, list at a view exchange meeting at its head-

quarters in the capital's Tejgaon yesterday.

The list has been submitted to the Ministry of Home Affairs recently, said Bazlur Rahman, director general of the DNC.

The DNC officials believe there has been a serious increase in the inflow of the contraband tablets in the country in recent times. According to its annual drug report, the amount of the seizure of Yaba in 2013 was 2076.36 percent more than that of five years ago.

In 2009, around 1.3 lakh Yaba pills were seized across the country by all agencies.

Last year, the DNC seized over 1.53 lakh pieces of Yaba pills while the seizure by all agencies was above 28 lakh. This year till November, the seizure exceeded 53 lakh, said Pranab Kumar Niyogi, director (operations) of the DNC.

"Almost all the Yaba consignments are being smuggled into the country through
