




Contemporary art may not be the most thriving of scenes in Bangladesh, but Naeem Mohaiemen has taken his country to one of the top platforms in the Asia Pacific region, being selected as one of the 15 finalists for the prestigious Signature Art Prize organised by the Asia Pacific Breweries (APB) Foundation, which is currently being exhibited at the Singapore Art Museum (SAM).

While there are three grand prizes that will be decided by the jury, there is a People's Choice Award, worth 10,000 Singapore Dollars, that will be decided entirely on the basis of online votes. The voting lines opened on November 14 (when the exhibition opened) and will continue till January 21. So far, Naeem Mohaiemen's artwork "Rankin Street, 1953" (mixed media installation with video, blueprint drawings, vintage photographs and matching sandstone moulds) is in fifth position in the race. There's stiff competition for the top spot in the People's Choice category between "Custos Cavum"
("Guardian of the Hole") by South
Korea's Choe u-Ram, and "Mirage –
Disused Public Property in Taiwan"
by Yao Jui-chung and Lost Society
Document.

Voters can log in using their social media accounts or create accounts using email addresses at --singaporeartmuseum.sg/signaturear tprize/gallery.php -- and can vote for their favourite artwork once every 24 hours. Every week, three winners will be chosen via lottery, who will win exclusive SAM merchandise, while one lucky voter will win an Apple iPad 2 Air 16GB tablet computer.

In a country like Bangladesh where contemporary art is still a relatively new concept, a win for Naeem Mohaiemen -- particularly in a public voting category -- at a significant competition of the region could be very good news for art connoisseurs and practitioners alike, as it will expectedly open up new avenues of exposure for the practice of a new medium of arts.





Exhibition on 1971 Genocide opens at BNM

Special exhibition, "1971: Genocide and Torture", marking the month of victory opened on December 9 afternoon at the Nalinikanta Bhattashali Gallery of Bangladesh National Museum (BNM).

The event is being organised jointly by BNM, and Genocide and Torture Archive and Museum Trust.

The exhibition features 70 books by noted historian Professor Muntasir Mamun, 38 souvenirs of the Liberation War along with rare photos of the War and replicas of artworks by eminent artists of the country.

On Borders opens today at The Daily Star-Bengal Arts Precinct

Photography exhibition "On Borders" will open at Daily Star-Bengal Arts Precinct today at 6pm. The exhibit, being organised jointly by Goethe-Institute Dhaka and Bengal Foundation will display 47 images by 10 photographers from OSTKREUZ Agency of Berlin, Germany.

Linn Schroeder of OSTKREUZ Agency, whose work 'Self Portrait with Twins and Breast' will be featured in this exhibition, will speak on the occasion.

These photographers have explored what borders mean to people and how people shape their lives along the borders. And the



images they took show their unique perspective on the borders that run through the world today.

The exhibition will be accompanied by a three-day workshop on Portrait Photography with Linn Schroeder from December 11-13 at the same venue and a seminar, "Working in an Artistic Collective with Linn Schroeder", on the 13th.

The photos in the exhibition show a border as an imaginary line drawn to mark a difference. When one border ends here, something else starts over there — a different country with different people, different languages and different beliefs and race.

Human beings have gradually settled over the entire planet. No ocean, no desert, no mountain range could not stop them.

They have transcended every limitation that nature dictated, but they have not yet been able to overcome the borders that they have set up between themselves. The exhibition questions those man-made borders.

"On Borders" remains on display from Monday to Saturday from 12pm to 8pm till January 04, 2015.

will perform solos and in groups.


The dance carnival will have

A pioneer of modern dance in India, Uday Shankar who passed away in 1977, had laid the roots of creative dance movement in India.

Honoured with the Padma
Vibhushan and the Sangeet Natak
Akademi Fellowship for lifetime
achievement, he is best remembered
for adapting Western theatrical techniques to traditional Indian classical
dance. Shankar is credited with popularising Indian classical dance forms
in India, Europe and the United
States in the 1920s and 1930s.

Carrying on the legacy left by her father, his daughter and renowned danseuse Mamata Shankar runs Udayan Dance Company in Kolkata.


Halder and renowned poet Helal Hafiz.
