OIL SPILL in SUNDARBANS

Fund crunch hits recovery

Foresters have yet to receive a grant from the government even a week after an oil tanker sank and spilled around 3.56 lakh litres of furnace oil in the Shela river in the Sundarbans.

Officials at the local Chandpai forest station said they had been "managing the expenses locally". But scores of hired workers alleged they had got only a partial payment, while some claimed they did not get any payment at all.

However, the divisional forest officer at Chandpai said the environment and forest ministry had allocated funds to handle the disaster. "We have got Tk 2 lakh to pay for the workers and other

costs. We have got clearance papers at our Bagerhat forest office," said Divisional Forest Officer Amir Hossain Chowdhury of Chandpai Range in the Sundarbans.

An existing fund crunch has so far been affecting the oil cleaning efforts taken by the Department of Forest.

The workers alleged they were working upon verbal assurance from the local foresters but not getting the payment accordingly. "Though we were supposed to get Tk 500 per day they

only paid Tk 250," said a worker, identifying himself as Kamal Khan. Another worker, Md Sohel Rana, said he was supposed to

get Tk 1,000 for a boat and Tk 500 for each worker. "We have stopped working for the forest department as they have given us only half of that amount." Several workers, who initially joined the clean-up opera-

Recalls Pak journalist


On March 23, 1971, the flag of Bangladesh was put up in East Pakistan. At the time, Ali Ahmed Khan was a journalist in Dhaka. "I worked for a progressive

Urdu weekly, Pasban, which promoted the rights of East Pakistan and consistently campaigned for the restoration of democracy under military rule," he says, with a sense of fondness.

But as the memories take a turn for the grim, his eyes cloud over.

"It was the night of March 25. From my own home, in a predominantly Urduspeaking part of Dhaka, all we could hear was gunfire," he says. From the direction of the slums where most working-class Bengalis lived, he saw flames leaping upwards.

"Smoke filled the air and the sky turned

red, this is what I remember of Operation Searchlight," he recalls.

"Ours was a divided family; some lived in East Pakistan and some in the west. In East Pakistan, my family home was in the town of Dinajpur. After the operation, the country erupted into a violent reaction as the liberation movement was launched and many Urdu-

speaking families were attacked. I heard from people coming into Dhaka that the town had seen some terrible violence."

"I boarded a train and rushed to my family. I remember walking into the garden and smelling the pineapples my parents had fondly planted. The home was all but destroyed. Our things were strewn about everywhere; my father's books, my brother's SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

Murder case against 45

A classmate of Taposh Chandra Sarker, a Chittagong University Chhatra League activist shot dead in Sunday's factional fight on the campus, has filed a murder case accusing 45 leaders and activists of the ruling Awami League's student wing.

Hafizul Islam, a Sanskrit department student, lodged the case with Hathazari Police Station yesterday accusing 30 named and 15 unnamed BCL men, said Habibur Rahman, officerin-charge of the police station.

The accused include cultural secretary of the dissolved committee of CU BCL Ashrafuzzaman Asha,

Road crash kills 7 in Habiganj

Seven people, including two of a family, were killed and nine others injured as a truck rammed a human hauler and a CNG-run auto-rickshaw on Dhaka-Sylhet highway at Habiganj Sadar upazila yesterday morning. The accident took place in Sutang Bridge area around

7:30am when the speedy Dhaka-bound truck hit the other two vehicles from behind in the fog, said SM Nazim Uddin, officer-in-charge of Habiganj Sadar Police Station. The human hauler was overtaking the CNG-run auto-

and five others succumbed to their injuries on way to the hospital, he added. Among the dead, four were the passengers of the autorickshaw while the others were travelling by the human

hauler. The injured were being treated at Sylhet MAG Osmani Medical College Hospital and Habiganj Sadar Hospital. Even though the truck was seized, the driver fled, added the OC.

Immediately after the accident, aggrieved locals blocked the highway for nearly two hours. They left the highway on police assurance.

The dead are Nokul Bibi, 45, and her daughter Ambia Khatun, 20, of Rahmatpur village under Baniachang upazila of Habiganj, Muklis Ali, 60, of Osmanpur under

66 journos killed across globe this year

At least 66 journalists have been murdered across the world this year while performing their duties, says a report of Reporters Without Borders.

With the latest figure, a total of 720 journalists have been killed in connection with their work in the last one decade. rickshaw at that time. Two people were killed on the spot

This year alone saw the abduction of 119 journalists -- 35 percent higher than last year's. Forty journalists are still held hostage, said the report released by the Parisbased press freedom watchdog yesterday.

Bangladesh was ranked 146th among the 180 countries in 2014 Press Freedom Index of the organisation that promotes and defends the freedom of the press and SEE PAGE 10 COL 1


An 11-year-old girl with an impeccable sales pitch has been running her own successful company for six years.
