## Sylhet city-suburbs bus service about to close

*Old vehicles, fear of losses main reasons*

The bus operation between Sylhet city and its suburbs is on the brink of closure with 19 minibuses plying only two routes where there were 35 vehicles on 10 routes six years ago, causing sufferings to the commuters.

The buses shuttled to Hetimganj, Hajiganj, Jalalpur, Tukerbazar, Airport, Lalabazar, Kamalbazar, Bagha, Bateswar and Medical Road areas. Now they run only to Hetimganj and Hajiganj.

On March 26, 2008, a group of bus owners under Sylhet Town Bus Owners' Association launched the service, which became popular, particularly among students and low-income people. But within only six years, it started losing passengers because of frequent schedule collapses and deterioration of services.

Commuters alleged that the drivers and staff were not sincere.

Abdul Hasib, a trader, said he wanted to travel to Mohajonpatti from Hetimganj by bus. Due to unavailability of the vehicles in time, "I take a rickshaw or an easy bike and then an auto-rickshaw to reach there."

"I am forced to pay Tk 30 for the trip

instead of the Tk 15 bus fare to save time."

Md Anwar Hossain changes vehicles thrice to reach his workplace near the Shahjalal University of Science and Technology from his Alampur residence.

"If I catch a direct bus I can get to my office timely without stopping at Kodomtoli, Keane Bridge and City Point," he said.

The same happens to Marzan, a twelfth grader, who has to change vehicles at four places to reach Sylhet Government College at Tilagar from Hetimganj.

The owners said they were reducing the number of buses due to losses day after day, inadequate parking spaces, absence of passenger sheds, and traffic jam.

They also reported that the number of bus passengers was declining with an increase of battery- and CNG-run auto-rickshaws and human haulers.

In the meantime, "most of our buses need repairs for being too old," said Shah Ziaul Kabir, president of the association. But the owners are reluctant to do the repairs, fearing further losses, he added.

On the back of this, most owners are

## Road crashes kill 10

Ten people were killed and five others injured in road accidents in the country yesterday and Thursday.

Our Bogra correspondent reports three people died and three others were injured when a truck rammed into an auto-rickshaw on Bogra-Dhaka highway in Mohipur area on Thursday.

The deceased were Hasib, 17, and Shibir Hossain, 15, of Nishindhara area of Bogra town and Kajal Kumar, 30, of Jamalpur.

Meanwhile, Abdul Aziz, 25, of Dharmakam died when a truck collided head-on with a bus on Bogra-Dhaka highway in Sherpur municipality area on Thursday.

The deceased was the helper of the bus.

Our Savar correspondent reports, Alomgir Hosen 34, of Singair died when a bus hit his motorcycle from behind on Dhaka-Aricha highway in BPATC area on Thursday.

Meanwhile, an unidentified youth, aged around 22, was killed when a bus run him over while he was crossing Dhaka-Aricha highway in Thana Bus Stand area of Savar yesterday.

Our Benapole correspondent reports, Fantu Roy, 26, of Bagdanga village in Jessor was killed after falling from the roof of a running bus on Benapole-Jessore road in Benapole area on Thursday.

BSS reports, two persons died and another was injured when a bus rammed into a CNG-run auto-rickshaw on the Dhaka-Sylhet highway in Kararchar area in Narsingdi yesterday.

The victims were Maherunnesa, 24, Khokan 35, and Apu 30.

Our Barisal correspondent adds a member of police force died and his wife was injured when a truck hit his motorcycle on Barisal-Dhaka highway in Kashipur area yesterday.

The deceased was Munshi Md Jewel, 35, of Kathalia of Jhalakathi and was working at armed police battalion in Barisal.



Zohra Tajuddin's anniversary of death today

Today is the first death anniversary of Syeda Zohra Tajuddin, wife of the country's first Prime Minister Tajuddin Ahmad.

After the assassination of Bangabandhu Sheikh Mujibur Rahman and nearly all his family, and the four national leaders including Tajuddin in 1975, Zohra held the Awami League together in the hard times that followed, says a press release. Born on December 24, 1932, she united and organised the party after being elected its convener in 1977, and remained a presidium member till her death.

## Woman wrongly declared dead before she actually died buried

A woman, who survived nearly 26 hours after she had been wrongly pronounced dead at Dhaka Medical College Hospital around 2:00pm on December 4, was finally buried at the capital's Jurain graveyard yesterday.

The unidentified woman, around 45, breathed her last at 4:00pm on December 5. Anjuman Mufidul Islam, a charity, buried the body.

Patients and their attendants in the ward of DMCH's new building where she was being treated alleged that doctors and nurses were reluctant to even go near the woman as she had some searing wounds.

Over a hundred police personnel held back several hundred Islamists who tried to head towards the brothel and attack the sex workers.

Earlier, Imam of the mosque Maulana Shamsuzzaman in his "khutba" (sermons) said as Muslims it was their religious duty to protest against sex trade and urged the people of Tangail to resist any bid to re-establishment of the brothel.

"The brothel, situated in the middle of the densely populated traditional town, was a den of unethical activities, drug trade and criminals. Poor and helpless girls including the under-aged were sold at the brothel, and they were forced into sex trade by some influential outsiders," he said.

Religious zealots under the banner of Asamajik Karjokol Protirodh Committee (AKPC) evicted around 1,500 residents of the brothel, including 700 sex workers, on July 11.

On December 9, Fawzia Karim Feroze, president of Bangladesh National Women Lawyers Association, filed a writ petition with the High Court on behalf of the sex workers, seeking directions for their safe living at the brothel.

Following the HC order, the evicted sex workers started returning to the brothel on Monday, and the number of the returnees rose to over 150 by yesterday.

'Boyfriend' kills teenager after rape in Jhenidah

A teenager was killed after being raped allegedly by her boyfriend at Baghadanga village in Moheshpur upazila of Jhenidah on Thursday night.

Mongla Ali, of the village, raped Alpona Khatun, 19, daughter of Sultan Ahmed, at a nearby field as she wanted to marry him, said the victim's family, adding that Mongla with his two cohorts then poined her.

Moheshpur police recovered the body, which had been sent to Jhenidah sadar hospital morgue for autopsy, and also a syringe from the spot. A case was filed. Mongla is absconding.
