Shilpacharya's birth centenary celebrations

A son of the soil remembered

Hundreds of visitors and young painters crowded Charutola at Brahmaputra Park of the town as a 13-day elaborate celebration programme marking the birth centenary of Shilpacharya Zainul Abedin began on December 19. The celebrations are aptly in Shilpacharya's home town of Mymensingh and will conclude on December 31.

Brammahshaily, an art movement of young painters here organised the programmes on the banks of Brahmaputra River.

Brammahshaily has constructed a first of its kind open art gallery at Charutola.

The birth centenary celebrations include a colourful rally, discussions, an art exhibition and workshop, painting competition, photography exhibition

and screening of a documentary on Shilpacharya.

A reception for eight eminent artistes of Mymensingh region will also be held for their contribution to the fine arts.

Teachers and students of nine universities, including Dhaka University; Shilpacharya Zainul Abedin Fine Arts Institute and other colleges are participating in the open art exhibition, said artiste Hossain Muhammad Farook, joint convener of the celebrations. Eminent artistes Aloptogin Tushar,

Shahjahan Ahmed Bikash and Biswajit Goswami will conduct an art workshop on December 25. Jahanara Abedin, wife of Shilpacharya

inaugurated the 13-day programme. A discussion was held marking the

opening session. Minister for Religious affairs principal Motiur Rahman was present as chief guest. Terming Shilpacharya a pioneer of the

Bangladeshi modern art movement, the speakers said Shilpacharya used art as a mode of expression on a range of subjects, focusing primarily on scenes of rural Bangladesh, the War of Liberation of 1971 and the Bengali famine of 1943, encouraging people to fight against oppression.

Zainul was not only a promoter of modern art, he also worked tirelessly to encourage folk art in Bangladesh, the speakers said. "Zainul is the son of this fertile soil

and we want to spread Zainul's works throughout the country from Mymensingh through various activities including establishing open art galleries," said artiste Saidul Islam, convener of the celebration committee.

The Daily Star organised a solo classical music soiree at its AS Mahmud Seminar



One of the most authentic exponents of khayal, Pandit Bandyopadhyay follows a distinctive rendition style of his own.


Birth Centenary of Shilpacharya Bengal exhibits

To mark the birth centenary of Shilpacharya Zainul Abedin, Bengal Foundation with the support of the artist's family, has been presenting a series of celebratory events. The foundation's celebration of this pioneer of modern art in South Asia and leading figure in the fields of art and culture of Bangladesh was launched with the release of a monograph, "Great Masters of Bangladesh: Zainul Abedin", jointly published by Bengal Foundation and Italian publication house Skira Editore.

In addition, an exhibition was held at the Bengal Gallery that showcased the paintings by other artists of Zainul Abedin's family. Bengal Publications also released the Bengali-language book "Zainul Abedin" by



Abul Mansur. The monthly magazine Kali O Kalam has issued a special birth centenary volume. Working with the artist's family, Bengal Foundation has been preparing a series of exhibitions that will be shown at the Foundation's three exhibition spaces in Dhaka.

The first of this special series exhibition will take place at Bengal Gallery of Fine Arts, Dhanmondi, featuring selected Nakshi Kantha from the personal collection of Shilpacharya Zainul Abedin. Abul Maal Abdul Muhith, Minister of Finance, as chief guest and Jahanara Abedin, wife of Shilpacharya, as special guest, will inaugurate the exhibition at 6pm on December 23. The exhibition will remain open from 12pm to 8pm everyday till January 10, 2015.

Dividing lines, Photography marking boundaries exhibition "On Borders"

Photography exhibition "On Borders" was inaugurated on December 10 at The Daily Star-Bengal Arts Precinct, jointly organised by the Goethe-Institut and Bengal Foundation. The show features the works of 10 photographers from Ostkreuz Agency, Germany. Every participant of the exhibit has been honoured with international or national prizes. The unusual perspectives show the lives of

people along the borders. The display will be on till January 4.

The border is an imaginary line drawn to mark geographical differences. Once the border is constructed, it can only be crossed at a checkpoint.

In one of the photos, Lina Schroeder shows a Roma person wearing a reptile suit. There are two paradoxical symbols in one body: life and death, with only a few centimetres to divide them. The woman was deported from Germany in 2011.

The Roma people were nomads who apparently had

their origins in India eons ago, and travelled aimlessly for reasons long forgotten. They have no country of their own. They are driven out of their homes,

on the grass, with eastern rugs put out to dry. He is wearing warm red and black clothes.

Part of a house with children and grown men are shown with Dutch prints on the walls for

live in poverty in Europe, in Italy, Hungary, Germany, Slovanika and Hungary. Two-thirds of them do not finish school.

The representatives of the Romas are depicted in the photos as living in precarious conditions. There is one of them out

decoration. A brother and sister are shown playing, the boy on his bent knee, on a sofa, placing a floral curtain, with large pink flowers around his sister.

A block of flats are shown, with children on grass and migratory birds on dry branches Catholics and Protestants in Belfast (Ireland) built walls to separate themselves from each other although they lived in the same city. In Korea, the communist north and capitalist south have been living in separate demilitarised zones, although they have the same culture that go back many thousands of years. In Sudan, the south broke off forming a state of its own, after 25 years of civil war.


