'Raped' girl dies at DMCH STAFF CORRESPONDENT

A 15-year-old girl died at Dhaka Medical College Hospital yesterday after she, what her sister said, had been raped and fed something by one of her colleagues on Sunday.

Talking to The Daily Star, her sister said the victim worked at a tile factory in Turag.

She claimed that Ramzan raped the girl with false promises of marriage. He then offered her a substance, saying it was a contraceptive, she added.

Locals handed over Ramzan to Turag police.

Officer-in-Charge Mahbub-e-Khuda said following a case filed by the family a Dhaka court sent Ramzan to jail after he had been produced before it.

Bid to release 700 tonnes of 'inedible' govt rice foiled in Khulna

Probe body formed

Some officials at Central Storage Depot (CSD) in Khulna city's Manikitala Moheshwarpa area allegedly tried to release some 700 tonnes of rice "unsuitable for consumption" at wholesale markets on Tuesday.

On information from CSD Manager AKM Mizanur Rahman, the district Food Controller Kazi Nurul Islam visited the spot and formed a four-member committee to investigate the incident.

The manager said the rice lost its original colour.

The committee of the District Food Controller's Office headed by Assistant Food Controller Saiful Kabir Khan will investigate whether the rice is unsuitable, and if there was any corruption.

A section of CSD staff, seeking anonymity, said some of their corrupt colleagues were involved in the attempt.

The accused, however, denied the allegation.

At first glance the rice seemed to be unsuitable for consumption, said Saiful, adding that after tests they would be sure about it.

Happy not raped recently
Claims DMC forensic report

Forensic Department of Dhaka Medical College yesterday handed over a report to Mirpur police, which claimed that film actress Happy was not raped recently, said the law enforcers.

Happy lodged a case against Bangladesh cricketer Rubel Hossain under Women & Children Repression Prevention Act earlier with Mirpur Police Station on December 13. Doctors at DMC conducted the forensic test the following day.

Criticising the report, Happy told The Daily Star, "I have not said that I had physical relation with Rubel recently. I said that we were involved in a physical relationship for the last nine months as Rubel had promised to marry me."

"When I raised the marriage issue on December 1, he refused to do so. Then I tried to solve the matter before filing the case. So there is no reason of getting a report of recent physical relation," she added.

On December 15, High Court granted Rubel Hossain an anticipatory bail for four weeks in the case.

Free legal aid can boost social services

Discussants tell iPro bono roundtable

Considered problem solvers and voices playing a pivotal role in bringing positive change, Bangladesh's lawyers, law firms and academics can offer free services and skills, including research and corporate advice, to civil society and non-government organisations from time to time, enhancing operations and ensuring legal rights of the disadvantaged and marginalised communities.

The recommendations came at a

roundtable, "Lawyers as Changemakers", organised by iPro bono at The Daily Star Centre in the capital yesterday.

Pro bono means for the public good and the online platform tends to do just that, connecting non-profits, social enterprises and civil society organisations with providers of free legal support.

Operating globally since 2009 with field offices in London and New Delhi and with support from the Ford Foundation and Commonwealth

Foundation, iPro bono is now expanding its services in Bangladesh.

Eleven law firms and non-government and legal aid organisations attended the roundtable to discuss the existing pro bono culture, challenges and potential solutions to implement such initiatives.

Providing a lot of scope to learn and improve the breadth and depth of legal practice skills, such assignments can be taken up by young lawyers, said Ahnaf Chowdhury, a trainee

preferred public transport over private car." Meanwhile, at a discussion also held at Jatiya Press Club, Passenger Welfare Association of Bangladesh urged the government, transport operators and law enforcers to take comprehensive measures to minimise road accidents.

It also demanded staging massive awareness campaigns to bring behavioural change in passengers and drivers.

The association organised the function titled "Passengers Rights, Human Rights" marking its fifth founding anniversary.

Addressing the function, noted columnist Syed Abul Maksud said if all stakeholders were sincere, around 75 percent of

He further viewed that if road accidents could be reduced, hundreds of lives would be saved and the country's economic progress would improve.

Mozammel Haque Chowdhury, secretary of the association, demanded inclusion of passengers' representatives in all decision making processes of transport sectors.

All footbridges, footpaths and underpasses must be repaired and freed from illegal structures to ensure smooth movement of pedestrians, he added.

Other demands include stopping operation of illegal and unfit vehicles, bringing an end to charging additional fare and improving railway and waterways transport systems.

New military equipment purchase underway
PM tells passing out parade of army cadets

The import of military equipment from countries like China and Serbia is underway to make the army more modernised and efficient on all sides, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina told the commissioning of new cadets at Bangladesh Military Academy in Chittagong yesterday.

The government has signed a \$1 billion deal with Russia to purchase ultra-modern military equipment, which will increase the army's capability a great deal, she said, adding that the force had already got modern tanks, armoured personnel carriers, and

multi-barrel rocket launchers.

Referring to the Awami League's role in army's modernisation, she said National Defense College, the Military Institute of Science and Technology, Armed Forces Medical College and the Bangladesh Institute of Peace Support Operation Training were set up in its 1996-2001 tenure.

Hasina said that in line with Bangabandhu's 1974 defence policy, the government formulated the "Forces Goal 2030" and, as part of this, established an infantry division in Sylhet and six units with

Ctg city failing to reach full dev potentials

Though Chittagong has a huge potential to become a prominent port city, it is not growing as per expectation for a slew of reasons including unplanned and uncoordinated development activities, and a lack of vision, speakers told a roundtable yesterday.

The roundtable titled "Progress of Chittagong: Obstacles & Opportunities" was jointly organised by The Daily Star and Independent University Alumni Association (IUAA) in the city's Chittagong Independent University (CIU).

Mahbubul Alam, Chittagong Chamber of Commerce and Industry president, said besides building new ports, the government should also increase the capacity and efficiency of Chittagong Port and thereby make it fit for future challenges.

Nasir Uddin Chowdhury, the first vice president of Bangladesh Garment Manufacturers and Exporters Association, recommended developing communications between Chittagong and the rest of the country.

Eng Ali Ahmed opined that the Chittagong-Dhaka Highway should be widened in preference to constructing the Padma bridge.

Many development works are being carried out in the city defying the government's master plan and taking advantage of incoordination among the government bodies, said Eng Delwar Majumder.

Focusing on upgrading Chittagong airport to the international standard, and building a five star hotel and a modern convention centre in the city, Wahed Malek, managing editor of The Daily Azadi, said politics should be kept aside during taking decisions about development.

SM Abu Toyab, president of Rotary Club, Chittagong suggested that the other side of the Karnaphuli river bank be developed as well.

AKM Raisul Huq Bahar, Chittagong Bureau chief of The Daily Star, moderated the roundtable where Syed Mohammad Tanvir, Pacific Jeans director; Kohinur Kamal, Meridian Group chairman; ABM Wadud Ullah, former chairman of Bangladesh Shipping Agents Association; Dr Irshad Kamal Khan, CIU pro-vice chancellor; Dr Mahmud Hassan, an assistant professor of CIU; Eng Shubhash Barua; Alihussain Akberali, BSRM Group chairman; and Dr Shamsul Hossain, former curator of Chittagong University Museum, spoke among others.
