Nasir starts making selectors happy

There were a number of performances that would have impressed the selectors after the first round of the Dhaka Premier League's Super Sixes on Monday.

Prime Doleshwar's Mehedi Maruf and Rony Talukdar stitched a rare 200-run stand for the opening wicket, with both scoring centuries. Talukdar in particular seems on a roll, as he scored his second consecutive century of the competition.

Prime Bank Cricket Club's Soumya Sarkar put in a fine all-round performance, hammering 81 with the bat and scalping two crucial wickets with his medium pacers. Abul Hasan surprisingly put in a good performance with the bat, scoring an 80-ball 72. With the selectors looking for a pace-bowling all-rounder for the World Cup, more performances like these could make a difference.

However, of all the performances, it was Nasir Hossain's defiant 82 not out that got the selectors excited. The out-of-favour batsman seemed to have gone back to his old days as he rescued Abahani from a precarious position against archrivals Mohammedan Sporting Club.

With more than 40 runs required in the last four overs, Nasir hammered three consecutive sixes and changed the complexion of the game.

"Nasir played well. What his innings has done is that it has added an option for us. We always want a number of players to fight for one place and this is a good sign," said selector Habibul Bashar.

Chief selector Faruque Ahmed echoed Bashar's thoughts.

Sammy given Roach's spot

All-rounder Darren Sammy has replaced Kemar Roach in the West Indies' 15member one-day international squad to face South Africa next month, in another twist in the ongoing selection saga.

The West Indies Cricket Board (WICB) announced the move on Wednesday, even as allegations of victimisation regarding Sammy and fellow allrounders Dwayne Bravo and Kieron Pollard, continued to swirl around the region, reports in the Caribbean media said.

Sammy, Bravo and Pollard were all left out of the initial 14-man squad announced last Saturday, prompting the players attorney Ralph Thorne to accuse the WICB of victimisation, stemming from their roles in the abandoned tour of India last October.

"It becomes cynical, it is an insidious form of victimisation. It doesn't make sense to include them in the 30-man squad for the World Cup -- three very, very senior players -- and then relegate them to mere T20 participation. It doesn't make sense," the prominent Queen's Counsel complained in a recent radio interview here.

Yusuf slaps spectator

Yusuf Pathan allegedly reacted to "indecent comments" by a young spectator by slapping him during a Ranji Trophy match between Baroda and Jammu and Kashmir in Vadodara. The Baroda all-rounder was upset by remarks passed by the spectator when he was batting.

According to Snehal Parikh, the Baroda Cricket Association secretary, the spectator had been passing "indecent comments" against Yusuf as well as other players during the match.

"This youngster had been shouting and passing indecent comments against Pathan and other players, such as Ambati Rayudu, when they were batting," Parikh said. "Pathan was in no mood to tolerate such behaviour. Thus, after he got out, he called that youngster inside the dressing room and

allegedly slapped him twice." According to Parikh, when Yusuf's younger brother Irfan Pathan learnt about the incident, he rushed to the dressing room to bring the situation under control.

India's Test of survival

Stung by two successive defeats and hit by a dressing room unrest, India go into the must-win third Test against Australia in Melbourne on Friday seeking to salvage a tour which seems to be falling

apart both on and off the field. With a 2-0 lead in hand, Australia need

merely a draw to regain the Border-Gavaskar Trophy while India have to win both the remaining two Tests to hold on to the tro-

to avoid yet another overseas Test-series loss, a situation which is familiar territory for Mahendra Singh Dhoni's men. The hosts won by 48 runs in Adelaide and

by four wickets in Brisbane and can win back the Border-Gavaskar Trophy here at the Melbourne Cricket Ground.

Stretching back to England in 2011-12, India have lost their last five overseas Test series without exception. The last time this happened was when they were minnows and had just started playing Test cricket.

They lost six consecutive overseas Test series starting from their inaugural tour to England in 1932 until the first West Indies tour in 1953, a run spanning defeats in 12 Tests out of 21 played.

But a lot has changed for Indian cricket since. They are not the lowly ranked newcomers in this sport anymore. They are the

alpha male of cricket, dominating the game outside the boundary ropes.

It is only to be expected then that they should go on to perform equally well on the field, irrespective of conditions.

Yet, results haven't matched expectations for the past four seasons.

During this time, the golden generation of the past two decades has either retired or been brushed aside, and the transition got underway. Even that latter bit is coming to an end now, as the Indian team prepares to play the last two of their consecutive run of overseas Tests in a calendar year.

From South Africa to New Zealand to The trophy aside, India would be looking England, it has been a steep learning curve with important lessons at every stage.

Pakistan to add Ajmal?

Saeed Ajmal, Pakistan's ace off-spinner, is set to be included in the 15-man squad for the ICC World Cup 2015. As per reports by Geo News, if Ajmal's action isn't cleared then, International Cricket Council (ICC) will allow Pakistan to name a replace ment for the veteran offspinner.

Earlier, Ajmal was suspended from international cricket in September after tests on his bowling action in Brisbane found that the 36-year-old spinner straightened his arm by more than 15 degrees. Since then, Ajmal has been working hard to rectify his action.

Recently, Ajmal played a few One-Day games against Kenya. Both Ajma and his teammate, Mohammad Hafeez, will arrive in India at the end of this month to undergo unofficial tests on their bowling actions.

Selection deferred due to infighting

Differences of opinions between coach and selectors have seemingly led to the deferment of national hockey team's final squad for next month's Hockey World League (Round-2) The points of contention are the inclusion of four senior players -- Rasel Mahmud Jimmy,

Imran Hasan Pintoo, Kamruzzaman Rana and skipper Mamunur Rahman Chayan. It has been learnt that an 18member squad has been finalised, keeping the senior four but two of the five selectors refused to sign on the list, leading to the deferral of the announcement. A source inside the Bangladesh Hockey Federation, on

condition of anonymity, informed that head coach Gobinathan Krishnamurthi is adamant on keeping Chayan, the penalty corner specialist defender, despite not having good fitness level and displaying poor performance in recent times, against the will of majority of selectors. Young Khorshedur Rahman's excellent performances recently has also made Chayan a less favourable option for selectors. While Jimmy's performance is satisfactory, it has been learns

that a faction of selectors are not satisfied with the performance of Pintoo and Rana, even though they have been kept in the 18.

Jimmy, Pintoo, Rana, along with goalkeeper Zahid Hossain, were drafted into the preliminary 39-member squad on December 3, a week after their suspensions were withdrawn. The squad has been thus far been reduced to 25 members as Zahid has already been dropped.

Bangladesh will play against Singapore, Japan, Malaysia, Oman, Poland and Ukraine in HWL, which will be held in Singapore from January 17-25. The Bangladesh team is likely to leave for Malaysia on January 10 to play two practice matches -- against Malaysia youth team and a Malaysian club team -- before reaching Singapore on January 14.
