## Group of youths showed the way

They did not have any rescue operation experience. Nor did they have any technical sophistication to do what trained professionals equipped with the best-available equipment in the country failed to.

But in an example of mind over matter, five youths made a claw out of scraps and pulled out a four-year-old boy yesterday from an around 300-foot well shaft 23 hours after his fall.

The boy, Jihad, could not be saved. But that they successfully located and pulled out the boy in less than half an hour after the government called off the rescue bid saying there was no sign of the boy inside the borehole, made them heroes in public eyes.

It was a coordinated effort of Anwar Hossain, Nur Mohammad Litu, Abu Bakar Siddique Bablu, Shafiqul Islam Faroque and Kabir Murad Bhuiyan, aged between 17 and 35.

Anwar is a CCTV camera technician, Litu a ninth grader of Shahjahanpur Railway Colony High School, Bablu a supplier to super shops, Murad a Textile Engineering student of Ahsanullah Science and Technology University, and Faroque, a trader.

They did not know one another until they all gathered at Shahjahanpur Railway Colony from different areas in the capital hours after the news of Jihad's fall spread. SEE PAGE 2 COL 1

### Ill-equipped for rescue

Tragedy exposes it again

Jihad's case is just the latest in a series that starkly shows how ill-prepared the country is for dealing with any rescue operation.

One can recall the Rana Plaza incident when the building collapsed trapping thousands inside. The equipment that the fire service had was inadequate. In the end private companies like Beximco and Orion supplied huge cranes to pull apart the beams and slabs.

On top of that, as official rescuers looked on, hordes of brave hearts risked their lives, searched every nook and corner and rescued many of the trapped souls. One of the volunteers even died trying to pull off a daring rescue.

When the Rangs building tragedy hap-

pened at Bijoy Sarani during the caretaker government rule, rescue operation was frustrating. The scene of dead workers SEE PAGE 10 COL 5

# Foggy country shivers in cold

The mercury dropped further yesterday and most parts of the country remained blanketed in thick fog.

The situation is unlikely to change in the next two days, according to the Met office.

The lowest temperature was recorded in Ishwardi of Pabna at 7.2 degrees Celsius yesterday while the temperature of Dhaka was 12.6 degrees Celsius.

On Friday, the lowest temperature was 9.4 degrees Celsius in Jessore and Dhaka's temperature was 13.4 degrees Celsius.

Due to a light depression over the

Bay, the cold wave is sweeping all over the country, Mohammad Shah Alam, director of Bangladesh Meteorological Department, told The Daily Star.

"There is a possibility of rain at the end of this month, and after that, the temperature of some regions may go down further," he said.

The country may experience another cold wave either on January 4 or 5 next year, Alam added. The ongoing winter chill has bat-

tered life in many places, especially in Pabna, Jessore and Kushtia, report our correspondents.

Farmers and day labourers are mainly bearing the brunt of the ongoing cold spell. Many poor people are

trying to combat the bone-chilling cold with the heat from burning straw and old rubber tyres.

Many preferred to stay indoors

The price of warm clothes in different markets and roadside shops in the capital has also shot up.

In some districts, dozens of hospital admissions were reported. Most of the victims were elderly people and children suffering from cold-related complications.

Meanwhile, two international flights -- Biman Bangladesh Airlines 'BG 028' from Abu Dhabi and an Air Arabia flight from Sharjah, UAE -- were

'Captain', 'chief engineer' of capsized Cambodian ship found to be Bangladeshi labourers


