A 22-year-old woman named Sathi, rickshaw-puller Harun-ur Rashid, 45, and pedestrian Ruma, 28, were injured in the blasts near TSC and Shibbari Residential areas, police said. In another incident, criminals,

believed to be pro-hartal pickets, set fire to a bus carrying government staff at Purana Paltan. There was no report of injuries in

the incident, said Morshed Alam, officer-in-charge of Paltan Police Station.

He said the bus carrying staff of the public administration ministry was set ablaze at the Purana Paltan intersection around 6:00pm. Later, two fire engines doused the blaze.

In Rajshahi's Shaheb Bazar area, BNP men clashed with police, leaving at least 13 injured. Police fired teargas and rubber bullets as pickets burnt tires on streets and vandalised some vehicles.

Pro-hartal pickets hurled a petrol bomb at the home of Habiganj superintended of police in the afternoon. ARRESTS

Law enforcement agencies arrested at least 20 BNP leaders and activists Saturday night and yesterday for their alleged involvement in "subversive activities".

The arrestees include pro-BNP Jubo Dal chief Moazzem Hossain

Police also detained 10 BNP men from different parts of Jessore, and another in Munshiganj. In Meherpur Sadar, four pickets were arrested and five Molotov cocktails were recovered from their possession.

Meanwhile, the BNP claimed that many leaders and activists of the party were being detained unlawfully.

At a press conference at the party's Nayapaltan central office last night, BNP Joint Secretary General Rizvi Ahmed also accused "government agents" of vandalism and arson attacks on vehicles across the country.

with the High Court seeking a number of directives, including asking the government to give adequate compensation to Jihad's family and take actions against officials who failed to rescue the boy. AUTOPSY REPORT

Rust particles were found under Jihad's fingernails, proving that the boy desperately tried to hold on to the wall of steel pipe, used to reinforce the shaft, during the plunge, the forensic experts said. He also sustained head injuries

and is believed to have fallen unconscious inside the well. Later, he drowned in the water at the bottom. "The presence of water inside the

boy's stomach, respiratory system and lungs indicates that his death was caused by drowning," said Prof Habibuzzman Chowdhury who led the forensic team. The professor of Forensic Medicine

Department of the DMCH told The Daily Star that Jihad might have died two hours into his fall.

WRITS WITH HIGH COURT

Rights organisation Children's Charity Bangladesh Foundation (CCBF) and Supreme Court lawyer Syed Mayeenul Huq filed writs as public interest litigations in connection with the tragic death of Jihad. The CCBF pleaded with the HC to

issue a rule upon the authorities to explain why they should not be directed to give compensation of Tk 30 lakh to Jihad's family for "gross negligence and violation of human rights and right to life guaranteed by the constitution", and to give proper honour, appreciation and recognition to the volunteers who recovered Jihad's body.

It also prayed that the court ask the government as to why it should not be directed to file a murder case against the director general of Fire Service and Civil Defence and its director (operation and maintenance); the director general of Bangladesh Railway and the managing director of Dhaka Water Supply

For several hours, his family was in the dark as to where he was. Later, they came to know that police took him away.

"Nasir lost his son, he is not a criminal. Police cannot confine him for so long and quiz him. This is an additional shock for a human being," a relative said, requesting

anonymity. Jihad's mother Khadiza Begum said they told the police repeatedly that her son fell into the well, but they would not believe it.

"I sent my brother to the police station but they refused to release my husband.... Police rather told my brother that we hid the boy somewhere and that they will not release my husband until my kid was found," she told The Daily Star. A teacher of Motijheel Model

School and College, where Nasir works as security guard, also went to the police station after learning about his arrest.

"Police told us that they took him for interrogation," he said.

After Jihad's body was pulled out, locals expressed their anger over the police action and demanded an investigation to know the real motive of the police.

The search halted around 11 hours later, with no sign of the plane. It would resume at 7am Monday, or even earlier if the weather was good, Indonesian transport ministry official Hadi Mustofa told AFP.

Air traffic controllers lost contact with the twin-engine aircraft around an hour after it left Surabaya's Juanda international airport at about 5:20am (2220 GMT Saturday). No signal was received from it.

Shortly before disappearing, the pilot asked to ascend by 6,000 feet to 38,000 feet to avoid heavy clouds, according to an Indonesian transport ministry official.
