To execute the plan, Saifullah smuggled five firearms and ammunitions into the country through Hilly Border in Dinajpur a couple of days ago and already had sold two. He was arrested at the

Detectives are investigating whether the ammunitions have been smuggled to create anarchy during the political programmes centering January 5, the first anniversary of 10th parliamentary election.

HARTAL, COMMENT OVER AZHARUL VERDICT

Contempt charges sought against Jamaat

Also against 3 Jamaat, 2 Shibir leaders, counsel

In an unprecedented move, the prosecution yesterday filed a petition with the International Crimes Tribunal-1 seeking to initiate contempt of court proceedings against Jamaat-e-Islami, three Jamaat and two Shibir leaders and a lawyer representing war crimes convict ATM Azharul Islam over a hartal and comment centring the verdict.

"Since Jamaat called hartal after the verdict, we have sought contempt rule against the party and five others," said prosecutor Zead Al Malum.

The Jamaat leaders are acting ameer Moqbul Ahmed, acting secretary general Shafiqur Rahman and Nayeb-e-Ameer Mujibur Rahman while those of pro-Jamaat student organisation Islami Chhatra Shibir are President Abdul Jabbar and Secretary General Atiqur Rahman.

"We have sought contempt rule against

(the counsel) Tajul (Islam) for his indecent and unprofessional comments before the media over the verdict," he added.

Malum said they believe Tajul's "deroga-

tory" comment over the verdict was contemptuous and calling a hartal after the verdict was also tantamount to contempt of The three-member tribunal on Tuesday

handed down capital punishment on Jamaat leader Azharul, following which Jamaat called a dawn-to-dusk hartal on Wednesday and yesterday.

Tajul on Wednesday told the media that he has always been respectful towards the tribunals and did not mention anything that could malign the tribunal's image.

The tribunals, on several occasions, said calling hartals and engaging in violence could not be a way to react over any decision or verdict of the courts.

Road crashes kill five in capital

At least five people were killed in four road accidents in the capital yesterday and Wednesday.

In Bhatara, Abul Hasnat Sohag, 28, a joint-secretary of Titumir College, and his friend Mirajul Islam died as a truck hit their motorcycle. Sohag, also a Master's student of the college, died on

the spot while his friend Mirajul, a business man, was declared dead at Dhaka Medical College Hospital (DMCH) after an hour. In Kamrangir Char Lohar Pool area, Mohammad Dulal, 20, a factory worker, died when a truck ran him

over after it hit his bicycle and he fell on the road on Wednesday. Doctors at DMCH declared him dead around 1:00am

yesterday. In Darussalam, trader Amir Hossain Babu, 48, was run over by another truck yesterday while he was crossing the road. He died on the spot.

In Motijheel Shapla Chattar, private company employee Ranjan Debnath, 40, a resident of Dania, Jatrabari, was hit by a bus while crossing the road around 7:00pm and declared dead at DMCH shortly after.

Defamation suit against Chumki dismissed

A Dhaka court yesterday dismissed a case hours after it was filed against State Minister for Women and Children Affairs Meher Afroz Chumki for branding BNP Chairperson Khaleda Zia "a worthless leader" and her son Tarique Rahman, "an impudent person".

Advocate Sabina Yasmin Chowdhury Bina, a leader of BNP's women wing Jatiyatabadi Mohila Dal, filed the case with the Metropolitan Magistrate's Court.

In the complaint, Yasmin alleged that Chumki made the derogatory remarks against the BNP chief and its senior vice-chairman at a discussion in Kaliganj upazila of Gazipur on Tuesday.

Law Commission boss exits press conference

Disagrees with member over recommendation implementation

Leaving journalists baffled at the scene, Law Commission Chairman Justice ABM Khairul Haque yesterday abruptly left a press conference following a disagreement with Member Prof M Shah Alam over whether the government was implementing the commission's recommendations and giving feedbacks.

Members Shah Alam and Justice ATM Fazle Kabir also left the place after a few minutes without saying anything. The briefing was organised by the

commission at its conference room in the Judicial Administration Training Institute building in the capital's College Road to reveal its performance last year and plans for the current year.

After Khairul described the commission's performance and future

plans, a journalist questioned whether the government gave feedbacks on implementation of the recommendations made by the commission last year for formulating new laws and amending some existing ones.

The Law Commission chairman said he does not know whether there was any feedback and there was also no law making it mandatory for either the government to give a response or the commission to collect one.

He also advised journalists to ask the government about the state of implementation of the Law Commission's recommendations.

At one stage, Shah Alam said he has been serving as a member of the commission for the last six years and during this time the commission has sent 39 recommendations to the

WORKPLACE ACCIDENTS IN 2014

165 construction workers killed

Reveals OSHE

Lack of safety at the workplace led to death of at least 165 construction workers last year, revealed Occupational Safety, Health and Environment Foundation (OSHE) yesterday.

Most of the victims either fell from under-construction buildings, it said, adding that some workers were electrocuted. The total number of people who died

due to workplace accidents in 2014 is 465, said the organisation. The findings were disclosed at a press

conference on occupational hazard organised by OSHE at Dhaka Reporters' Unity. OSHE monitored 16 national newspapers throughout the year to keep an account

of occupational deaths, said the organisations Programme Manager Omar Faruq. He said more than 440 workers were

injured in workplace accidents. "The actual number of casualties could be much higher, as some of the incidents may have been missed by newspapers," he added.
