### 'I'll leave if players don't back me'

# Chelsea regain lead

Chelsea took sole possession of first place in the Premier League table after they beat Newcastle United 2-0 on Saturday and

Manchester City drew 1-1 at Everton. Chelsea began the day dead-level with

dropping points for only the second time in 10 matches, Jose Mourinho's side moved two points clear.

Newcastle had beaten Chelsea 2-1 in the reverse fixture and despite still being without a manager following Alan Pardew's departure, they threatened to pull off a repeat in the first half at Stamford Bridge.

Petr Cech was deputising in goal for Chelsea due to a finger injury to Thibaut Courtois and he had to save from Remy Cabella and Yoan Gouffran, while Moussa Sissoko slammed a shot against the post.

Chelsea lost Cesar Azpilicueta to an apparent groin injury in the 37th minute, but they went ahead four minutes later when Oscar tapped in Branislav Ivanovic's

cross after Willian took a quick corner. Mourinho's side improved after the break and added a delightfully constructed second goal just before the hour, with Diego Costa gathering a clever back-heel from Oscar and drilling in his 15th goal of the campaign.

At Goodison Park, Everton enjoyed the best of the first half against City, with Seamus Coleman hitting the bar.

City went ahead in the 74th minute when Fernandinho helped a shot from David Silva over the line with his head, but Steven Naismith equalised four minutes later, glancing home a cross from Leighton

Baines. Serbian winger Lazar Markovic scored his first league goal as improving Liverpool closed to within four points of the top four by City, but with the defending champions winning 1-0 at Sunderland, who had Liam Bridcutt sent off for two bookable offences.

> Markovic poked the ball between the legs of Sunderland goalkeeper Costel Pantilimon in the ninth minute at a gusty Stadium of Light as Liverpool extended their unbeaten run to five league games.

West Ham United spurned a chance to climb to fifth place after being held to a 1-1 draw at Swansea City.

Andy Carroll put West Ham ahead in the 43rd minute with a fine effort, chesting down a high ball and then dancing across the box before slamming a left-foot shot into the top-right corner from 15 yards.

### LA LIGA Real back on track

La Liga leaders Real Madrid returned to winning ways after consecutive defeats when they shrugged off playing most of the second half with 10 men to secure a 3-0 win at home to midtable Espanyol on Saturday.

Beaten 2-1 at Valencia in La Liga last weekend and 2-0 at Atletico Madrid in a King's Cup last 16, first leg in midweek, Real took the lead at their Bernabeu arena when Cristiano Ronaldo set James Rodriguez up to score in the 12th minute.

Gareth Bale arrowed a free kick over the wall and into the net off a post to make it 2-0 in the 28th minute before fullback Fabio Coentrao was shown a straight red card for a dangerous tackle eight minutes into the second half.

Despite that setback, Real remained in control and substitute Nacho clipped home a third goal for the world and European champions 14 minutes from time.

## Goalies shine brightly

Birthday boy Wang Dalei's penalty stop helped China upset Saudi Arabia 1-0 as a string of top saves made all the difference at the Asian Cup on Saturday.

South Korea and Uzbekistan also had their goalkeepers to thank as they both won by the same 1-0 scoreline on a cliff-hanging day two in Australia.

Surprise result of the day belonged to China, who edged three-time winners Saudi Arabia in Brisbane courtesy of Yu Hai's deflected second-half free kick.

Just moments before the goal Wang, who was celebrating his 26th birthday, kept China in it when he dived to his left to save Naif Hazazi's tame penalty.

Victory put a huge smiles on the faces of Alain Perrin's China, who have never won the Asian Cup and will now be eyeing their first appearance in the knockout stages since hosting the tournament in 2004.

"Our tactics worked very well, we hit them on the counter-attack and caused a lot of trouble for our opponents," Perrin told reporters. "The match was very, very difficult for us but we gained a lot of joy from it. We've been preparing for this tournament for a long time."

South Korea, World Cup semifinalists in 2002 but seeking a first Asian title in 55 years, got off to an unconvincing start as they beat Oman 1-0 through Cho Young-

"I don't want to have an advantage -- no, no. I ask for equity," stormed the Frenchman. "It's a 100 percent penalty, no hesitation. But (we didn't get it) because of what? Because we are Oman? It's a very, very bad decision at this level."

Uzbekistan also relied heavily on goalkeeper Ignatiy Nesterov as they ground out a 1-0 win over unfancied North Korea in torrential rain.

Nesterov saw little action in the Group B tie but he was alert enough to acrobatically palm away Pak Kwang-Ryong's powerful header just before the final whistle.

#### Neuer urged to savour Ballon d'Or



## Maria's Brisbane joy

Maria Sharapova won the 34th title of her career on Saturday when she outlasted Ana Ivanovic in the thrilling final match of the Brisbane International.

Sharapova won 6-7 (4/7), 6-3, 6-3, clinching victory in two hours and 38 minutes in front of a packed crowd at the steamy Pat Rafter Arena.

It was the 13th year in a row that the Russian has won at least one WTA title.

The match, played in typically hot and humid conditions in the Queensland capital, was the perfect Australian Open preparation for the two top seeds, who met in the Melbourne final in 2008.

"I came into this final expecting a tough

match," Sharapova said. "The matches we had last year were always very intense and high quality. That's what you expect in a final atmosphere.

"I love coming back here, starting here," she added.

"I played four good matches against very

different types of opponents -- couldn't have asked for better preparation."

Sharapova started brilliantly and raced to a 4-1 lead before Ivanovic struck back and

levelled the set. She then took control of the tiebreak to

strike first blood in the final. Sharapova broke early in the second set and kept the advantage to level the match at

one set apiece. Ivanovic took a medical time out at the end of the set to have an abdominal strain re-taped and when she returned, Sharapova promptly broke and went ahead 3-1.

Ivanovic fought back once more to get the set back on serve, but some fierce groundstrokes from the world number two saw Sharapova break again, and this time there was no coming back for Ivanovic.

"I really thought it was a high quality match from the first moment on," Ivanovic said.

"There were not many unforced errors, I would say.

"The last two sets were a lot closer than maybe the score indicates. There were really a few points that decided it here and there."
