



Unhappy start to new year

Schools across country see thin attendance; children, guardians in panic

The New Year has not been as thrilling and pleasant as Rimon thought it would be. For the fifth grader at a private school in Dhaka, the year started with fear. On January 1, he collected new books from his school amid a nationwide shutdown.

Still, he tried to overcome the fear and be happy. He started committing his time to reading the new books with a resolve to do better this year. But his joy soon began to fade away. The 11-year-old cannot concentrate on study, as he could not go to school in the last 11 days except on the day of admission. Politics has left him baffled.

"It was fun getting new textbooks. But I don't feel good staying home all day," he says. "My Abbu and Ammu did not send me

to school. They fear. I also feel scared as I watched on TV scenes of bomb explosions." Like Rimon, most of the over four crore primary and high school students are feeling helpless at the beginning of their new academic year. Politics has dampened their

SK Sinha new chief justice

Justice Surendra Kumar Sinha, known as SK Sinha, the most senior judge of the Appellate Division, has been appointed as the 21st chief justice of the country.

He is the first Hindu to hold the top judicial post in the history of Bangladesh, Law Minister Anisul Huq told The Daily Star.

President Abdul Hamid made the appointment as per the constitution and will administer the oath of office to the new chief justice at his official residence

Bangabhaban on January 17. The law ministry issued a gazette notification in this regard yesterday.

The appointment will come into effect on January 17, as the incumbent chief justice, Md Muzammel Hossain, will retire the day before.

Blockade hits border trade

Govt to deploy BGB personnel in 22 dists

The government has been incurring heavy revenue losses over the last week with the country's export-import through the major land ports badly disrupted due to the BNP-led combine's indefinite blockade since January 6.

Several hundred goods-laden Indian trucks remain stuck at Benapole, Sonamasjid and Hili Land Ports as required number of Bangladeshi trucks could not get there for unloading goods due to the blockade that has left several several districts. trucks torched and vandalised over the

past few days.

The authorities, however, have continued their efforts to keep the ports functional by providing police protection to the goods-laden trucks.

Escorted by police vehicles, a small number of trucks transported goods to different destinations on the seventh day of the blockade yesterday. One more life was lost to violence

Hasina asks Khaleda, addressing rally in city; says Khaleda free to go home

Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday asked all to identify bomb attackers, conspirators and those involved in violence, and hand them over to police. Terming her archrival Khaleda

Zia the queen of militancy and terrorism, Hasina said, "Please stop violence in the name of blockade. Otherwise, you [Khaleda] will face dire consequences if people get angry."

Hasina, president of the ruling Awami

League, was speaking at an AL rally organised to mark Bangabandhu's homecoming.

Addressing the rally at Suhrawardy Udyan, AL General Secretary Syed Ashraful Islam asked party men to be prepared to

face any situation. Terming the BNP an "evil" political party, he said it could

create chaos any time.

Noab worried over threat to media

Recent incidents 'restrict freedom of expression' STAFF CORRESPONDENT

The Newspaper Owners Association of Bangladesh (Noab) yesterday expressed concern over threats to media's freedom of expression.

Citing the police attempt to search the daily New Age office in the capital on December 28, and law enforcers threatening its journalists with repercussions when barred from entering the office and filming the journalists, it said such acts were condemnable.

"Noab considers that these incidents restrict opinion and freedom of expression of the media," it said in a statement yesterday after a meeting in the capital.

It also expressed concern over the recent administrative and legal actions taken to threaten the media. Restrictions on televi-

sion talk shows and live broadcast are meant to pressurise the electronic media, it said, referring to the arrest of ETV Chairman Abdus Salam on January 6. The association also

stressed the importance of responsible broadcasting by TV channels.

Curfew again in tense Rangamati

An all-night curfew was imposed in Rangamati again yesterday.

The town was placed under curfew from 7:30pm till 8:00am on Sunday after clashes broke out between indigenous and Bangalee youths.

Though no big untoward incident took place yesterday with the army, Border guards and police deployed at key points, the district administration clamped the fresh curfew -- effective from 5:00pm for 14 hours.

In day time, Section 144 prohibiting public gatherings remained enforced. Roads were almost empty; no vehicles except for a

few motorbikes were noticed. Shops were mostly closed.

All the market places have been shut for over two days, leaving people faced with crisis of daily goods. Small shops in lanes and bi-lanes are already running out of oil, onions, eggs, salt and vegetables, locals said.

Law enforcers have arrested some 35 people for defying Sunday night's curfew. However, police declined to provide details about the arrestees.

"The situation is under control. There will be no curfew if the situation improves further," Shamsul Arefin, deputy commis-

sioner, Rangamati told journalists. SEE PAGE 2 COL 3
