With upright, spiky leaves of a dull green and lots of personality, Aloe Vera is the plant for you if your home décor leans toward the rustic and the ethnic.

CACTUS: True to their form, cactus plants are blessedly low maintenance. The adorable, small cacti available in tiny pots are a great accessory at your study table or the office desk. You only have to water them once a week or so. Make sure your cactus gets some sunlight though; as a plant that originated in the desert, it needs its regular dose of sun rays.
