

Healthcare, drug getting costlier

State contributes only 23pc of expenditure

Two-thirds of the country's healthcare expenditures are made for curative purposes while less than oneseventh spent on preven-

And the lion's share of the medical expenses is spent from people's pockets with the state contributing less than one-fourth, shows a survey.

According to Bangladesh National hotelyesterday. Health Accounts (BNHA) 1997-2012, expenditure on medicines and curative purposes accounts for 67 percent of the total healthcare expenditure in the country in the 16 years studied.

Spending on medicines and other medical products rose to 41 percent in 2012 from 38 percent in 1997, while the cost of cura-

US-S'pore consortium to build LNG terminal

Unsolicited deal okayed to import costly alternative to natural gas

A US-Singapore consortium is going to build the first-ever floating LNG terminal in Bangladesh and import gas for \$17.1 per million cubic feet (mmcf), 10 times higher than the national gas sales price.

The cabinet committee on economic affairs yesterday approved an unsolicited deal with the US-Singapore consortium of Astra and Excelerate (AEC) under the Power and Energy Fast Supply Enhancement (Special Provision) Act, 2010.

The import of Liquefied Natural Gas (LNG), though at a very expensive rate, is likely to ensure the country's energy security in the long run.

Finance Minister AMA Muhith told reporters after yesterday's meeting that the price of the imported gas would have been much higher, but not that much as it would be mixed with local

According to an energy ministry proposal, if LNG was mixed with local gas, the average cost of gas will rise to \$4.39 per mmcfd from \$1.7, implying that the government will have to hike gas price in future.

However, the minister said the gas price would not go much higher for the consumers.

Prime Minister's Energy Adviser Towfique-e-Elahi Chowdhury said the gas would take two years to reach the country and the price would be fixed in

line with the oil price on internationa market.

After yesterday's approval, Petrobangla will now sign an agreement with the AEC for setting up the terminal and the company is expected to start supplying gas by mid-2016.

The AEC would install the terminal at Maheshkhali in Cox's Bazar to facilitate LNG import from Qatar with which Bangladesh signed a memorandum of understanding in 2011.

Finance Minister Muhith said the government's agreement with Qatar would expire this month. He added fresh negotiations would start for extension of the tenure and expressed the hope that it would be done in time.

CONTAINER AT CTG PORT

Experts identify radiation source

Experts, who started working for the recovery of suspected radioactive substances from a container at Chittagong port yesterday, hope to complete it by today. The 36-member team, comprising specialists from

Bangladesh, US and Sri Lanka alongside customs and port officials, yesterday opened the container and removed most of the scrap metals from it before suspending the day's operation around 6:00pm. One Mabia Steel Company Chittagong in April last year

exported the container carrying 19 tonnes of scrapped stainless steel for India via Colombo Port. On April 29, the Colombo port authorities detected radiation from the container and sent it back to Bangladesh. Masud Kamal, director of Radioactivity Testing and

Monitoring Laboratory in Chittagong, said they have identified the source of the radiation. "It is positioned at the rear part of the container. So we

need to remove all the scrapped materials first ... We hope to reach the source by tomorrow [today], " he said.

21 kg gold seized in Dhaka, Ctg

Some 185 gold bars, weighing over 21 kg, were seized in the capital's Hazrat Shahjalal International Airport and Chittagong city yesterday.

Acting on a tip-off, a joint team of Customs and Customs Intelligence officials conducted a search in a flight of Biman Bangladesh Airlines at the Shahjalal airport and seized 120 gold bars, weighing around 14 kg. The bars were wrapped in cloths, said Kazi Md Ziauddin, joint commissioner of Customs.

The plane from Dubai via Chittagong landed at the airport around 12:30pm.

A small number of people were at local marketplaces with the district administration tightening security and local politicians hoping for calmer days ahead.

This correspondent visited the College Gate weekly bazaar yesterday only to find a handful of people there. "This is very unusual for a Wednesday morning. A lot of

people are supposed to be here on this day," said Md Borhan, standing outside his small restaurant named Panahar Sweets.

The people of Rangamati usually gather at the weekly bazaars in College Gate Tabalchhari, Banarupa and Reservebazar, looking for kitchen items and other daily essentials, he said.

"But today the market opened after three days but the presence of people is very disappointing," said Borhan, blaming the situation on the recent violence.
