
The man whose powerful lyrics kept up the freedom fighters' morale during our Liberation War is no more.

Arsonists to face stern actions

PM warns, says hands of arsonists should be burnt to make them feel pain

UNB, Dhaka

Questioning the logic behind the BNP-Jamaat alliance's ongoing blockade, Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina yesterday issued a fresh warning that stern actions will be taken against those engaged in killing people and torching vehicles across the country.

"We won't tolerate any militant and terrorist acts ... I've not yet found any issue behind their (BNP-Jamaat's) ongoing agitation programmes," she said.

The PM said this while formally inaugurating the construction work on a multi-storey building of the National Security Intelligence in the city's Segun Bagicha through unveiling the plaque of its foundation stone.

Referring to the death of an unborn baby as its mother was critically injured in a petrol bomb attack, Hasina said she got deeply hurt after she came to know about this tragic incident.

They're talking like politicians

20-party slates comments of IGP, Rab chief

The BNP-led 20-party alliance yesterday criticised the chiefs of police, Rab and BGB for their "audacious" comments and said they would have been brought to book if a

government by the people were in place. While exchanging views at Mithapukur in Rangpur on Friday, Inspector General of Police AKM Shahidul Haque came down heavily on BNP chief Khaled Zia for "making the mistake" of not taking part in the January 5, 2014 election.

He lambasted the alliance saying it had seized schools, colleges and madrasas and had burnt those to stop the national election.

"You [BNP-led alliance] had killed people, presiding officers and had prevented people from voting. Why? You have made the mistake. Why will people pay? What can people expect from the chief of a political party [BNP] if she herself indulges in illegal activities," the police boss said.

Reconstitutes 2 SC benches

On the first day of his taking office as the chief justice, Surendra Kumar Sinha, known as SK Sinha, yesterday reconstituted two benches of the Supreme Court's Appellate Division.

President Abdul Hamid administered him the oath of office as the 21st chief justice at the Darbar hall of the Bangabhaban in the morning. Cabinet Secretary M Mosharraf Hossain Bhuiyan conducted the swearing-in.

US blasts move to probe Israel as 'tragic irony'

Her decision comes after Palestine formally joined the ICC earlier this month, allowing it to lodge war crimes and crimes against humanity complaints against Israel as of April.

Nearly 2,200 Palestinians and 73 Israelis were killed during last summer's war in Gaza.

The US criticized the decision late Friday, saying it opposed actions against Israel at the ICC as "counterproductive to the cause of peace".
