No talks with those who kill people

Says NHRC boss BSS, Dhaka

National Human Rights Commission (NHRC) Chairman Prof Mizanur Rahman yesterday said dialogue cannot be held with the terrorists who are killing people through arson attack and blasting bombs.

"Things that are taking place in the country right now in the name of democracy are pure terrorism. Terrorists do not know the language of democracy. There can be no dialogue with the terrorists. Sitting for dialogue with them is like bowing to terrorism," he said.


The rights campaigner came up with the views while addressing a seminar at the National Press Club in the capital.

No dev project without consulting CHT council

CHT Commission says locals must benefit from any development project in the region

Before taking up big "development" projects such as establishing a medical college in the Chittagong Hill Tracts, the government should discuss the matter with the CHT regional council as per the 1997 Peace Accord. It is necessary to assess public opinion on whether a project in the name of "development" in the region would actually benefit the locals.

The CHT commission said this yesterday afternoon at a press conference in the capital's Jatiya Press Club.

Titled "Violence in Rangamati and the human rights situation in the Chittagong Hill Tracts", the conference was organised following the January 10 and 11 attacks on indigenous peo-

ple after Hill Students Council protested the inauguration of a medical college in the district.

Difference of opinion between proruling student body Chhatra League and Parbatya Chattagram Jana Sanghati Samity's student wing Hill Students Council turned into a communal conflict between hill people

Cold wave this week



The north, north-east and north-west regions of the country may experience a cold-wave from the middle of this week.

"The cold-wave that may start from January 20 will remain for some three days," said an official of the Bangladesh Meteorological Department (BMD).

Apart from that, the country may see the weather get clearer from Sunday onwards and the temperature fall by 1-3 degrees Celsius, he told The Daily Star yesterday.

The clouds, fog and drizzles at places across the country were caused due to "trough of low pressure" in the Bay. Over the Bay of Bengal, the trough caused formation of clouds that moved towards land, he said. SEE PAGE 10 COL 4

BNP-Jamaat men kill AL leader's son

The teenage son of an Awami League leader, who was beaten up allegedly by BNP and Jamaat-Shibir men in Shibganj municipality on Thursday, died on Friday night.

The dead, Rajon Ali Roky, 15, was the son of Ruhul Amin, who is the president of ward-5 of the ruling AL's Shibganj municipality unit. Ruhul is a resident of Sheikhtola in the municipality. Roky was a class-IX student of Babupur High School.

Roky's family said a joint team of police, Rab and BGB raided Rasulpur on Thursday morning to catch criminals who were allegedly carrying out subversive activities during the ongoing countrywide blockade by the 20-party alliance.

The BNP and Jamaat-Shibir men beat up Roky mercilessly when he went there to know what had happened during the drive, his family alleged.

Locals took Roky to Shibganj Upazila Health Complex. As his condition deteriorated, the on-duty doctors referred him to Rajshahi Medical College Hospital where Roky died.

Violent demos against Charlie Hebdo

Churches torched as protests spread from Niger to Pakistan; Obama urges Europe to better integrate Muslims

A violent mob torched at least 8 churches in Niger's capital Niamey yesterday during fresh protests against Charlie Hebdo magazine, as France's president stressed his commitment to "freedom of expression."

Around 1,000 youths wielding iron bars, clubs and axes rampaged through the city, hurling rocks at police who responded with tear gas in a second day of violent demonstrations against the satirical magazine's publication of the Prophet Mohammad.
