4 suspected ISIS men arrested

Detectives arrested four suspected members of militant outfit ISIS, including its coordinator in Bangladesh, from the city's Jatrabari on Sunday night.

The arrestees were identified as Sakhawatul Kabir, a representative and coordinator of ISIS in Bangladesh, Nazrul Islam, a financier, Anwar Hossain alias Baten, a convict of an explosive case, and Rabiul Islam.

Detectives claimed that they recovered a huge quantity of leaflets, videos on militant training, laptops, four mobile phone sets, one passport, and a visa application form of Pakistan embassy from their possession.

Kabir went to Pakistan several times, received militant training and worked for al-

Qaeda under the leadership of Javed Akhter Ejaz, who along with three other Bangladeshis -- Ejaz's nephew Ovi, Baten's brother-in-law Sayem and Kabir's brotherin-law Shamim Ahmed -- were killed in a police shootout in Karachi on January 9, DB men said.

the Udyan.

Detectives in cooperation with the Police Headquarters were conducting drives in and around the city to arrest aides of Ejaz, also known as Kargil or Sajjad in the Pakistani police records, after learning about his death.

Ejaz went to Pakistan during antimilitancy drives in Bangladesh in 2009. According to Karachi police, he joined al-Qaeda as an active JMB leader and eventually ended up becoming the Karachi commander of al-Qaeda in South Asia, a new

The wealthiest 1% will soon own more than the rest of the world's population, according to a study by anti-poverty charity Oxfam.

The charity's research shows that the share of the world's wealth owned by the richest 1% increased from 44% in 2009 to 48% last year.

On current trends, Oxfam says it expects the wealthiest 1% to own more than 50% of the world's wealth by 2016. The research coincides with the start of the World Economic Forum in Davos.

The annual gathering attracts top political and business leaders from around the world. Oxfam's executive director Winnie Byanyima, who will co-chair the

Davos event, said she would use the charity's high-profile role at the forum to demand urgent action to narrow the gap between rich and poor. In a statement ahead of the gathering, Byanyima said the scale of global

"It is time our leaders took on the powerful vested interests that stand in the way of a fairer and more prosperous world.

Forkan's war trial begins

Witness accuses him of rape in Patuakhali

The trial of war crimes accused Forkan Mallik opened yesterday with the first prosecution witness accusing him of taking part in a gang-rape of a woman in Patuakhali for three days during the Liberation War.

Witness Habibur Rahman Badshah of Kakrabunia village in Mirzaganj upazila of Patuakhali also told the International Crimes Tribunal-2 that Forkan had shot the woman's father dead when he tried to save his daughter from being taken to a Pakistani army camp.

Earlier on the day, prosecutor Mukleshur Rahman Badal made the opening statement with a brief account of the accused, his alleged role in 1971 and the charges framed against him.

An alleged Razakar commander from Mirzaganj, Forkan faces five charges including murders committed in the southern district during the war. The 63-year-old accused, however, pleaded not guilty.

Urges broad alliance with Muslim nations to tackle 'foreign fighters'

EU ministers meet to

EU foreign ministers met yesterday on building an alliance -- including with Muslim countries -- against a growing Islamist militant threat, with Europe on high alert after deadly Paris attacks and antiterrorism raids in Belgium.

The immediate focus for the 28-nation European Union is how to prevent citizens known as "foreign fighters" returning home from the battlefields of Syria and Iraq even

more radicalised and well trained.

"We will start with a discussion on how to counter terrorism not only in Europe but in other parts of the world," EU foreign affairs head Federica Mogherini said as she arrived for the meeting.

"We need to share information more, we need to cooperate more," Mogherini said, welcoming the presence of Arab League secretary general Nabil al-Arabi at the talks.

Two planets hiding in our solar system?


