Fear, threats trigger Adivasi displacement

Over 150 indigenous families in different villages of the district's Godagari upazila have migrated to India following persecution by Bangalee settlers and communal attacks during political turmoil in the last two years.

Many more are prepared to go amid the ongoing flare-up of violence. Indigenous people had been the majority in at least a dozen villages since the British era. But things changed as hundreds of shoal (char) people,

mostly victims of river erosion in Chapainawabganj, started settling in the villages a few years back. Threats from these settlers made the already-vulnerable Adivasi commu-

nities feel more insecure. Then there were BNP-Jamaat-led attacks on

minorities in 2013 and early last year, especially after the war crimes verdict against Delawar Hossain Sayedee and the January 5 polls. Selling out land and properties, the indigenous families in the Godagari villages have left ancestral homes secretly at night for different places in India, particularly Murshidabad, Burdwan and Malda by crossing the bor-

der via brokers. "This is not a country for us to live in," said a frustrated Proshanto Murari of Shialipara village. His father Anonto Murari already went to India seven months ago and he is likely to leave anytime along with his brother and two

Fourteen Munda families out of 22 in Shialipara village, six out of eight in Notun Shialipara village and nine out of 32 in Bottoli have left while the rest are bidding for their time.

DHAKA-N'GANJ RAIL TRACKS

Ecnec okays Tk 378cr dual-gauge project

The Ecnec yesterday approved a project to lay a dual-gauge track on the Dhaka-Narayanganj route to increase railway's passenger carrying capacity fourfold. Once the track is laid, Bangladesh

Railway will be able to transport 93,000 passengers on the route every day against its current capacity of 23,000 commuters, said a planning ministry statement.

Chaired by Prime Minister Sheikh Hasina, a meeting of the Executive Committee of the National Economic Council (Ecnec) gave the

nod to the Tk 378 crore project. Of the amount, Japan will provide the railway with Tk 249 crore as grant.

Under the project, a dual-gauge track will be laid parallel to the existing meter-gauge track. Seventy-six trains would run on the route every day after completion of the project in June 2017. At present, 32 trains ply the route.

Planning Minister AHM Mustafa Kamal said the new track would save valuable time wasted in traffic jam on the Dhaka-Narayanganj road.

Winter chill bites poor

A moderate cold wave continued to shiver people in different parts of the country yesterday, disrupting normal life.

Many people, especially the poor, were struggling to secure their daily bread as they could not come out of their houses due to the inclement weather.

An official at Bangladesh Meteorological Department said the cold spell is likely to continue today in Dhaka, Rajshahi and Rangpur divisions and some other districts. However, the mercury may rise slightly in Dhaka tomorrow.

The country's lowest temperature yesterday was recorded at 6.7 degrees Celsius in Sagarpara of Rajshahi. The lowest temperature recorded in the capital was 13.4 degrees Celsius.

Some areas in Rajshahi and Rangpur divisions have been experiencing a mild to moderate cold wave, said the Met official.

The temperature ranging between eight and 10 degrees Celsius is considered a mild cold wave, while the temperature between six and eight degrees Celsius is considered moderate. Anything below the range is a severe cold wave, he mentioned.

Sea last month with 162 people on board climbed at a faster than normal speed and then stalled, the Indonesian transport minister said yesterday.

"In the final minutes, the plane climbed Flight QZ8501 went down on December at a speed which was beyond normal," Transport Minister Ignasius Jonan told reporters, citing radar data.

"The plane suddenly went up at a speed above the normal limit that it was able to climb to. Then it stalled."
